## Turner Awarded Split Decision

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. — A "blood swelling" on the forehead put Gil Turner in a hospital Wednesday night after the busy Philadelphia batter had beaten out a split decision over Yama Bahama in a 10-round television fight.

Dr. Samuel Kaplan, physician for the Miami Beach Boxing Commission, said Turner had a blood blister "the size of half an apple" on his forehead when he emerged from the vigorous scrap with his opponent from Bimini in the Bahama Islands.

On the chance that Turner might have suffered a concussion, Kaplan ordered him into a hospital.

Kaplan described the injury as a "hematoma," a blood swelling under the skin but outside the skull. He said it is possible in such cases that there might be an injury to the brain.

Turner's victory, avenge a beating he took from Bahama a year ago but there was a great difference of opinion over who actually won Wednesday night's rousing scrap in the Miami Beach Auditorium.

San Francisco's Seals and Vancouver's Mounties are rapidly making a two-team race out of the Pacific Coast League pennant chase.

Only half a game separates front-running San Francisco from Vancouver, while third-place Hollywood lags five games off the pace.

The Seals shaded the Stars 3-2 Wednesday night, their second straight series win by a lone run, and the Mounties blanked Portland 8-0 in a series opener.

Sacramento took a hard-won 5-4 decision over San Diego in 10 innings for the only other league game. Rain at Seattle forced postponement of the Rainiers' contest with Los Angeles.

Seals' Windy McCall and Bill Abernathie limited Hollywood to five hits. The chumby Abernathie gained credit for his fourth win without a loss after relieving McCall in the third inning and giving up only three hits and one run the rest of the way.

Ken Aspromonte homered in the second frame and singled across another run in the third to put the Seals ahead 2-0. The Stars tied it up briefly in the fifth inning but Jack Phillips' third straight hit drove in the Seals' winning run in the sixth.

Mountie pitcher Ed Erault yielded only four singles, struck out four and didn't walk a man in whitewashing the Beavers. Only one Beaver got as far as third as Erault chalked up his second victory against one defeat.

The right-hander almost ruined his shutout in the ninth when he threw Solly Drake's hunt wild but Solly made it to third. But

then Erault retired the next two batters for the final out.

Jim Marshall's three-run homer in the third featured a 10-hit Vancouver collection of three Portland hurriers.

Al Heist saved the Solons twice with defensive plays, then lined a bases-loaded single in the 10th for the victory, second straight over San Diego.

The Solons came from a one-run deficit in the fourth when Artie Wilson doubled home three mates. The Padres tied it 3-3 in the sixth inning and Heist singled home the 30-ahead run for Sacramento in the eighth. Bob Lennon's single for San Diego in the ninth sent the contest into extra innings.

Ashburn was sent back to third and Hamner to second when the umpires ruled a ground rule double. On the next play Ashburn scored on a slow roller but Hamner who would have been on third but for the interference never reached home.

Cincinnati later won 4-2 in 11 innings.

And Harrison? He was escorted from the park by an usher and turned over to police, who charged him with disorderly conduct.

Harrison was probably glad of the police protection from the Phillies' fans, who saw their team lose a chance to come within a half game of league-leading Cincinnati and drop to third place and last.

## Yanks Respond To Scolding; 'Alum' Jabs At Team, Boss

CLEVELAND — The famous pride of the Yankees appears to have been hurt by a series of recent events—latest a scolding by their former shortstop Phil Rizzuto—and they've responded by winning three games in a row, bashing out 12 and 16 hits in the last two.

After Tuesday night's 7-4 victory here, old Casey Stengel said that maybe the addition of ex-Yankee Charley (King Kong) Keller to the coaching staff had helped make the Yankees act more like Yankees.

After last night's 13-3 pasting of the Indians, Manager Stengel may be considering finding some sort of consolation prize for the team who dropped a few remarks in a luncheon speech yesterday that reportedly shook up the world champs.

The Scooter, now a sports announcer, scooted into hot water with the underdog Yankees at his alma mater by saying the current Yankees "have been reading too many newspapers" and "think all the other players are going to roll over and play dead."

He also had a jab for Stengel, who, he said, contributed to a hurtful cockiness by saying in

spring training that this year's team was "the greatest of all time."

"Now he probably wishes he could eat those words," Rizzuto said at a Cleveland Jaycee luncheon honoring Bob Feller, retired Tribe strikeout king.

## Berra Incurs Broken Nose In Cleveland Game

CLEVELAND — Yogi Berra, New York Yankee catcher, suffered a compound fracture of the nose in Wednesday night's game with Cleveland and will be unable to catch for at least four days, Berra may be able to pinch hit, however, in a day or two.

Berra spent the night at the Evangelical Deaconess Hospital after he was injured by a foul tip hit by the bat of Larry Raines in the third inning. The ball broke the lower bar of Berra's mask, ramming into Yogi's nose.

NEW YORK — Television, long considered the chief cause of slumping gate receipts by baseball, now looms as the prime mover in the National League's projected expansion to the West Coast.

The gimmick is pay TV. The pay-as-you-watch plan has been tested by the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants.

Walter O'Malley, Dodger president, has denied pay TV enters into his possible franchise shift to Los Angeles. But Variety, the theatrical periodical, has reported that the Dodgers already have given exclusive TV rights to Skat-TV Inc.

Variety said "regardless of whether the Brooklyn Dodgers move their base to the coast, the toll-TV rights to their games still are tied up by Matty Fox's Skat-TV Inc."

Fox has a signed contract with the Dodgers and also with the Giants which gives him the exclusive pay-as-you-watch rights to their games if and when the clubs make their move away from New York.

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## Athletic World Defends Itself On 'Pill' Charges

### Charges Termed 'Silly' By Bowden

NEW YORK — Athletes and sports officials were on record today as saying they get their pep from training and physical conditioning, not from pills as stated in a resolution by delegates of the American Medical Assn.

The AMA yesterday ordered a study by its trustees into "shocking" reports of dangerous abuse of potent pep-up pills by athletes. They called for a halt to any abuse of drugs to make players superathletes.

Dr. Herbert Berger, chairman of the New York State Medical Society, said, "The recent rash of four-minute miles is no coincidence. When I was a college boy, the four-minute mile was as unlikely as flying to the moon."

His society introduced the resolution.

Don Bowden, University of California miler who was the first American to break the four-minute barrier, called the statements "ridiculous and silly."

"I don't believe anything could help you run a four-minute mile except top physical condition," he said.

**Boxing Worst**

Dr. Berger said he thinks the worst abuse is by boxing, secondly by professional and college football and other athletes, and thirdly by high school athletes.

James E. Farley Jr. of the New York State Athletic Commission said, "We have a competent and able medical staff checking fighters before and after every bout and I am convinced they could detect any violation of our rules which forbid the use of drugs before a fight."

Walt Byers, executive director of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn., and well known track coach George Eastman of Manhattan both said they never heard of such a thing in intercollegiate athletics. Eastman said he would ask for an investigation when the college track coaches meet next week in Austin, Tex.

Explaining the medical association's move, Dr. Berger said some drug addicts may get started by taking amphetamine and other stimulants while performing in athletics. "Amphetamine is by far the most dangerous drug existing today," he said, adding that there are widespread reports it is being used throughout the country by either athletes themselves or their coaches.

Bert Bell, commissioner of the National Football League, which televises many of its games, said, "I am just as much against indiscriminate use of pep pills as anybody else—but I never heard of their use in athletics."

**American Medical Assn. Makes Drug Use Charge**

NEW YORK — The American Medical Assn., Wednesday condemned "the shocking" and "vicious practice" of use of a powerful stimulant drug by professional, college and even high school athletes.

The drug, amphetamine, turns them into super-athletes but can be terribly dangerous, the House of Delegates declared in a resolution.

Dr. Herbert Berger, of Staten Island, an authority on narcotic addiction, declared many addicts may get their start from taking amphetamine as college and high school athletes.

"Amphetamine is by far the most dangerous drug existing today," he said. "When it stimulates a high pitched person, it can produce violent, rapacious and criminal behavior" and may also cause serious physical damage.

He said the pepup pills are being used indiscriminately by athletes and some coaches in all sections of the country.

"A boy taking an amphetamine will fight anyone, taking on someone far bigger, drive a car 95 miles an hour, and do almost anything," Dr. Berger said.

Amphetamine is sold to the public only on prescription.

It is only Cleveland's beat-up pitching staff that makes the New York Yankees look good, or have the world champions finally decided to cut the comedy and get down to business in the American League pennant race?

It wasn't until they quit home and pulled into Cleveland that the Yankees managed to regain any kind of an attack, running up 20 runs on 28 hits in two games. The champs had scored only 20 runs in the previous six games—against tailenders Baltimore and Washington—and had lost four of them.

Then they started swinging against the Indians' weary staff, overworked with the loss of injured Herb Score and Bob Lemon and without a complete game since May 26.

Early Wynn lost his sixth last night as the Yankees unloaded four home runs and 16 hits for a 13-3 breeze. It was their third in a row, but left them five games behind the first-place White Sox and also left them without catcher Yogi Berra, who suffered a broken nose when a foul tip broke his mask.

The White Sox kept their surprising pace-winning 19 of 24—with a 4-2 victory over the Boston Red Sox. Detroit moved into a fourth place tie with Boston by defeating Washington 3-2 in 11 innings. Kansas City defeated Baltimore 3-2.

In the National, Cincinnati's Redlegs cooled off Philadelphia 4-2 in 11 innings for a two-game lead.

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
