Rifle Match Tryouts Set

A team consisting of 10 persons will be chosen to represent Oregon in the national pistol and rifle matches at Camp Perry, Ohio from August 9 through September 19.

Try-outs for the team will be held next Sunday at Camp Withcombe, Clackamas, and are open to any resident of the state, 16 years or older.

The team will be chosen by the Oregon State Rifle and Pistol Association and will consist of 10 men, to use either high power rifle, with an M-1 service rifle, or pistol, fired with a 45-caliber service automatic, or a combination of both.

The government will handle the cost of the team travel—five cents per mile and \$1.50 per day, per team member. The ammunition for the try-outs will be furnished.

If a contestant fires a good enough score to make the team he may or may not accept the Perry trip, and the next lowest shooter will be chosen.

High power shooters should be at the range at 7:30 a.m. for squad arrangements. Pistol shooters may report to the range any time after 8 a.m. with firing to start at 9 a.m.

Food Prices Climb Higher During Week

NEW YORK — Wholesale food prices were sharply higher this week, Dun & Bradstreet reported Wednesday.

Thanks in part to big jumps in hog and lamb prices, the organization's wholesale food index stood at \$6.20 compared with \$6.11 a week ago. The figure was three-tenths of one per cent over the \$6.18 level a year ago this week.

This week's figure was the highest since the 1957 peak of \$6.22 established the week of March 26. The yearly low was \$6.08 May 14.

The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use.

Skin Diver Finds Fish In Spring Under Big Lake

SUMMER LAKE, Ore. — A skin diver's daring exploit has let the state Game Commission know that all the roach in Ana Reservoir probably cannot be killed by poisoning.

The diver, Clifford Richmond of Portland, found the main spring deep under the surface of Ana Reservoir and explored far inside the spring channel underground.

Richmond reported the spring was eight feet across at the mouth. He found the entrance some 50 feet below the surface of the reservoir and then swam another 30 feet down into the earth in the tube of the spring.

When the tube, which had been going down at a 90-degree angle, began to level out, Richmond decided he had best get back to safety.

Bob Borovicka, biologist for the Game Commission, said the reservoir in Lake County will be treated with rotenone this summer to kill roach. Later the reservoir will be stocked with trout.

Some of the poison will be forced into the spring, but the chances are some of the roach will escape poisoning, Borovicka concluded.

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Russia Playing Old Shell Game, Asserts Nixon

ASHEVILLE, N. C. — Vice President Nixon said last night Russia's proposal for Allied and Soviet troop withdrawals in Europe would "leave the free countries of Europe at the mercy of the Communist world."

He said Russia boss Nikita S. Khrushchev was playing "the old shell game" when he made the proposal.

Noting that the United States has always been ready "to meet the Soviet Union halfway on any reasonable basis" in disarmament talks, the vice president said: "We owe a duty to our allies and to ourselves not to be sucked into the old shell game trade of one horse for one rabbit, which is what Mr. Khrushchev offered last Sunday when he suggested that we should withdraw our forces from Europe's 3,000 miles in return for the Soviet moving theirs from the satellite countries 300 miles away."

TROOPS REMOVED

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The last contingents of the 33,000 Chinese Nationalist troops rushed here to quell anti-American demonstrations May 24 were withdrawn from the city today. Troops normally stationed in Taipei remained after the riots also remained in force, but conditions generally were normal.

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
