

Missing Jet Pilot Rescued At Sea

Second Man Found Dead After Plunge

Eisenhower Extends
Contratulations On
Navy Rescue Efforts

MAYPORT, Fla. (AP) — The Navy announced Friday a jet pilot whose plane plunged into the Atlantic Thursday night has been found dead.

The announcement came as President Eisenhower debarked here from the aircraft carrier Saratoga.

Only an hour earlier the President had thanked the Saratoga task force for rescuing another Navy pilot who went down in the same area Thursday night.

Eisenhower had expressed "prayerful hope" the other man—then still missing—would be found alive and well.

Eisenhower spoke to the crew of the Saratoga over the ship's public address system a few hours after the dramatic rescue of a fighter plane pilot, Capt. J. E. Tefft, at sea. He was picked up by a helicopter from a life raft where he had spent the long night.

The Saratoga diverted 16 of the 18 ships from its escort to join in the effort, and sent out its own planes in relay of four to help. The resulting cut in force, made with Eisenhower's approval, brought about a sharp cut in the maneuver schedule the President had flown from Washington to see.

Tefft was found about 120 miles northeast of Jacksonville, Fla., his home base. The second pilot, whose identity had not been disclosed by the Navy, still was missing at midday.

Neither pilot was attached to the Saratoga's task force. They flew out of the Navy's Cecil Field at Jacksonville.

"I want to express my personal and my official thanks," Eisenhower said, "to the officers and crews of all the ships that we know have been hunting the two pilots that we know have been down in this region."

Corporation To Promote New Industry

Land optioned by the group will be offered for sale at cost to industries expressing interest in moving into the area.

Cary said that "this fits in with the overall plan of the committee to promote industry."

Beryl Frazier is president of the group and H. C. Wells is treasurer. Cary, T. H. Pargeter and Earl Wiley signed the articles of incorporation.

Roseburg Man Pleads Guilty To Driving Count

A 22-year-old Roseburg man today pleaded guilty in district court to reckless driving, and Judge Warren A. Woodruff fined him \$70 and \$5 costs.

Jude Chester Kaus, 2033 SE Douglas Ave., still faces a charge of escape in Roseburg city court. Roseburg police officer M. D. Jensen told the judge that he had arrested Kaus on a reckless driving charge May 22, and Kaus followed the officer back to the city hall in his own car.

But when Jensen parked his car at the city hall, Kaus drove off, he was told. The reckless driving complaint was dismissed in city court and transferred into district court when Kaus was arrested Thursday.

Batista Won't Talk With Rebel Leader

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Times today Cuban President Fulgencio Batista has declared his government is "not about to sit down and discuss politics" with rebel leader Fidel Castro.

In a dispatch from Havana by Herbert L. Matthews, the Times quoted Batista as saying his government is always willing to enter discussions with "legitimate, decent opposition groups in an effort to find solutions which would benefit the nation."

But as for Castro, Batista said, "It is difficult to believe that anyone save a few of Castro's admirers would expect the government to sit down with this criminal and work out an arrangement which would grant him special privileges because of his past crimes."

Bakers' Official Received Huge Gift

\$60,000 Said Pressured From Employer Group

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators digging into Bakers Union affairs came up Friday with a story of a dinner that raised \$60,000 for union vice president Max Kralstein—money derived chiefly from "pressuring" employers to buy tickets and souvenir ads.

Frank Dutto, union chairman for the lavish dinner that added this sum to Kralstein's capital assets, took the Fifth Amendment when asked whether he was a Communist prior to 1950.

But Dutto said, "I am not now a member of the Communist Party," and that since 1950 he has filed non-Communist affidavits with the government.

The dinner in honor of Kralstein, New York national vice president of the union, was thrown by New York Local No. 3 in June of last year at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. Dutto is organizing director of the local.

Kralstein was called to the witness stand after the story had been developed from other sources. He vigorously defended the propriety of his accepting the \$60,000.

Kralstein said the idea of tossing dinners at which costly gifts are given the guest of honor is much older than he is. He named some others he said have benefited from such dinners—among

Preliminary Act Of Stumbo Strip Tease Moves Into Court For Brief Showing

A preliminary act of the Stumbo strip tease moved into circuit court here Wednesday for a brief appearance. Attorneys for the Stumbo clan and the Oregon Highway Commission appeared before Judge Carl E. Wimberly to argue on a state motion to strike portions from the Stumbo's answer to the condemnation suit complaint.

Arguing for the deletions was Charles Peterson, chief of the trial section of the highway commission's legal department. Alan Holmes, Medford attorney, played the defensive role for the Stumbos.

Judge Wimberly, pending receipt of further memoranda from the two attorneys, took the matter under advisement.

At stake are some highly important features to both parties to the suit. Probably the most important one is the matter of "use." The Stumbos in their answer claim that the selling of their land in two-inch square plots is the "highest and best use of said premises."

The highway commission on the other hand wants to consider the parcel of land just as ordinary land used for highway purposes. Scrapping over the land broke into the courts last November when the commission filed its condemnation suit. This brought a halt to the Stumbos' sales of quit claim deeds to the tiny bits of Highway 99.

The legal action, however, was just a continuation of the clan's feud with the commission. It started when the Stumbos discovered that a chunk of their land north of Wolf Creek had been taken over for highway use in 1946 without so much as a by-your-leave from the highway commission.

With the Stumbos, this called for direct action. They took it by erecting a blockade and halting Pacific Highway traffic while armed Stumbos marched around to let the motoring world know it was using private land.

The barricade was not left up very long but it served to pile up a lot of vehicles and let everyone

Rev. Tilton Given Church Assignment In Moscow, Idaho

A reassignment is scheduled for the Rev. Ellsworth Tilton, minister of the First Methodist Church of Roseburg, which will take him to Moscow, Idaho, starting June 23.

The Rev. Mr. Tilton served here for four years after having been transferred from Springfield.

Announcement of a replacement will not be made until next Friday when appointments will be read by the Oregon Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

The Rev. Mr. Tilton has been active in both church and non-church work in his stay here. He has been a member of the Rotary Club and has served on the school evaluation committee for educational children. He has also served on the inter-agency Community Group which works in the field of child guidance and clinics.

Two important projects have been completed during his tenure at the church. Completion of a two-story educational building unit was reached with consecration in March and formation of an organization of Methodist men was realized.

On a statewide basis, the Rev. Mr. Tilton has been in charge of Methodist Church's camping program in Oregon.

Jim Shoulders Among Top Cowboys On Rodeo Slate

All-around rodeo champion cowboy Jim Shoulders of Henrietta, Okla., heads a long list of rodeo stars and champions whose scheduled appearance at the Douglas County Rodeo, June 22-23, is giving promise of making this year's event the best ever.

Current world champions in all of the rodeo events are scheduled to appear at the Douglas County Fairgrounds show.

Shoulders won the world championship last year as all-around cowboy and in brashua bull riding and bareback riding. These are two of the five events in which the cowboys will compete for rodeo honors. The others are steer wrestling, calf roping and saddle bronc riding.

If things go as scheduled, the 1957 rodeo will number well over the record number of 97 contestants who participated last year, according to Rodeo Chairman Bob Raffensperger. The \$4,000 purse for the two-day performances, plus the entry fee split, is proving to be a big lure in making the local event one of the biggest and richest rodeos in the nation.

Camas Valley School Budget Due For Revote

Camas Valley School District residents must vote again on a portion of the district's budget because of a typing error which resulted in votes on two different money figures.

This was the report today from Douglas County School Supt. Kenneth Barneburg. He said he had contacted the legal department of the State Dept. of Education, which advised the district to vote again.

The action is necessary because of the use of one erroneous figure on about half the ballots marked by voters May 24.

The correct figure, which appeared on the other half of the ballots, was \$8,256.63. The figure had been correctly advertised and posted, but because of a typing error on one of the stencils from which the ballots were mimeographed, some of the ballots contained the figure \$5,256.63. A count of the ballots after the election showed approval, 71-46.

The error came to light Wednesday when two voters were discussing the budget. They recalled they had voted on different figures, so they contacted School Clerk Robert Wheeler. He checked the ballots and found the error. Barneburg was contacted, and he, in turn, contacted the State Dept. of Education's legal department.

Barneburg said the district would

Parents Seek Child's Return

A writ of habeas corpus was issued Thursday ordering a married couple to appear in circuit court here with a child they allegedly are illegally holding.

Judge Charles S. Woodruff, upon a petition filed by Mary Batchelor, ordered Delmer and Ethel Steach to bring Ricki Batchelor before him immediately and show cause why the child is detained by them and has not been delivered to its mother.

In her petition, Mrs. Batchelor claims that she and her husband, Robert, are California residents and that Mr. and Mrs. Steach live in the Wolf Creek area. She charges that in April 1956 she left Ricki with the Steachs at their home near Glendale with the understanding they were to care for him until she and her husband became settled in California and that they would then return the child.

Mrs. Batchelor maintains that when she returned to Oregon in June or early July of that year to get Ricki, the Steachs prevailed upon her to leave the child with them until after the birth of a baby she was expecting.

The baby was born March 8, 1957, she states. After that date, she claims to have received a letter from an attorney representing the Steachs requesting that she and her husband sign a consent for the adoption of Ricki by Mr. and Mrs. Steach. This was refused, she states.

On May 17, the petition claims, she came to get Ricki and the Steachs refused to surrender the child. Mrs. Batchelor was told by the Steachs, according to the petition, "that if he attempted to take the child from them they would charge him with kidnapping."

Mrs. Batchelor maintains that the Steachs have no legal right to hold her child and that "the apparent cause or pretense of the restraint (of the child by the Steachs) is the belief that they have a legal right to keep custody."

FISHERMAN MISSING

EUGENE (AP) — Search was underway in an area 45 miles up the McKenzie River Friday for a missing fisherman. Haskell Dowdy, 46, of Springfield.

A fishing companion, Pete Roach of Springfield, reported him missing at about 6:30 p. m. Thursday.

Dowdy, Roach said, was subject to mild heart attacks.

Startling Figures Listed On Consumption Of Alcohol In U.S. By Hospital Head

Alcoholic drinking is becoming a problem of considerable magnitude in the United States, judging from a report Thursday by Dr. R. G. St. Pierre, manager of the Roseburg Veterans Hospital.

He cited these figures to prove his point:

A total of 65 million people over the age of 15 consume liquor in some quantities.

No less than 8 million are habitual drinkers.

Half of these (4 million) have lost control of their drinking, including 31,000 in Oregon.

One out of every 16 drinkers in the United States is an alcoholic, a stage which is achieved after six to 20 years of drinking.

The startling figures were given by Dr. St. Pierre at the regular meeting of the Roseburg Rotary Club in the Hotel Umpqua.

He also had some other facts concerning drinking habits of the American.

He said the average age for those with alcoholism was between 35 to 55 years. He also contended that a strong case can be made that the "Americanization process" ap-

peared to affect the rate of drinking upward.

Dr. St. Pierre also explored the reasons for the high rate of drinking. He cited tensions and anxieties as two of the reasons. It "serves a psychological need," he said by relieving tensions effectively.

At the same time, he said, it has a tendency to lead to social and physical deterioration. He said it becomes an illness seated in the mental processes. It may become a physical craving, he said, but the original craving for the "narcotic effect" is mental.

He listed many ways of treating alcoholism, but he cited Alcoholics Anonymous as the most effective treatment. He said 50 per cent who join AA are cured because of the "hope, assistance and help" given.

"It is the most effective method known today," Dr. St. Pierre said. The secret, he said, is that a person wants to quit drinking.

Meanwhile, though, the rate of drinking continues to rise "alarmingly," Dr. St. Pierre said, and some 12,000 people a year in the United States die as a direct result of it.
