The attorney, Edwin D. Hicks, asked an order forbidding the prosecutors in the state's case against Schrank from making press releases attacking the integrity of the mayor or his lawyers. Hicks earlier had protested a press release by the prosecution. In his motion, he named prosecutors Elliott Cummins, Ralph Wyckoff and John J. Pickett. He also cited several articles and an editorial in the Oregonian, and asked that the newspaper be told not to publish such. Hicks contended publication of such releases may prejudice the chance of the mayor getting a fair trial. Schrank is scheduled to go on trial on a perjury charge June 17. He is accused of lying to a grand jury when he swore he did not accept a bribe."

After toying with the idea of making their section of Highway 99 a toll road, the Stumbos played their ace. They started selling fancy deeds to lots just two-inches square. Before the commission brought this to a screeching halt, the Wolf Creek clan had disposed of 290 lots at \$2 per copy. Because they were stopped from thus disposing of the disputed land, the Stumbos claim they have been damaged in the tidy sum of \$250,274. They also want \$3,000 rent and income. Robert Stumbo has quit pleading the case for the family, \$25,000 for attorney fees. It was some of the Stumbo contentions that the highway commission argued against Thursday. Peterson argued that improvements to the land made by the highway commission should not be considered in assessing the value of the land. He contended that the value should be based upon the worth of the land in 1946 when it was taken for highway use. The Stumbo answer has set up a basis for compensation which is "wholly erroneous," charged Peterson. The Stumbos shouldn't be allowed to show that parcels were sold or that because of the highway being there the land is more valuable, declared Peterson.
