

Oaklanders Ask For A Sidewalk

The Oakland City Council heard requests from First Street property owners for a sidewalk on the west side of First Street between Walnut and Apple streets. They were advised to circulate a petition among property owners, and Cal Bowles, city recorder, would handle the petition. Ray Martin, of Martin Bros. Container and Timber Products Corp., was present to discuss a signal at the railroad crossing near the mill. The matter has been pending with the Southern Pacific for some time, and it was announced the railroad representative would meet with the council to discuss slowing of trains through Oakland. The city hall is being torn down and replaced by a tennis court, with a building on the back of the lot for storage of city property. Bids are to be called for a new police car soon. The final budget meeting will be June 10 at 8 p.m., according to correspondent Edith Dunn.

Teamster Policy Group Resumes Reforms' Study

SAN FRANCISCO — The powerful policy committee of the Western Conference of Teamsters resumes study Friday of recommendations for reforms to be submitted to the membership in San Diego, June 24-28. Reforms include a constitutional revision for electing rather than appointing conference officers and a new system for handling union finances. Frank W. Brewster, conference president appointed by Dave Beck, national union president, said he would do "everything possible" to implement the reforms. Brewster was questioned extensively by the Senate rackets investigating committee when it investigated Beck's activities recently. Brewster told newsmen yesterday he "inherited" most of the union's troubles including "90 per cent of the conference constitution, the policy committee (membership) and set-up of handling finances." He said he would be a candidate for the conference presidency if the office is made elective, as recommended.

U. S. Signs Aid Agreement With Commie Poland

WASHINGTON — The United States Friday signed a \$48,900,000 aid agreement with Communist Poland and promised \$46,100,000 more if and when Congress provides authority and funds. The agreement ended three and a half months of negotiations set off last February by President Eisenhower's promise to help Poland or any other Red nation which demonstrates a will to assert its sovereignty and independence of Soviet domination. The long range purpose behind the U.S. aid program, Eisenhower made clear, is to let the Soviet satellite countries know in the case of Poland—as was done previously in the case of Yugoslavia—that they can look to the United States for support and assistance if they reject total Moscow control. In effect, the United States committed itself to a 95 million dollar Polish aid program. But it could only make a firm pledge for half of that amount because of delay in the House of Representatives on a billion dollar bill to extend the surplus agricultural commodities disposal program. An announcement of the agreement issued at the State Department said the two governments have also agreed on "early negotiations" over settlement of U. S. Polish nationalization measures after World War II, and over the unblocking of about two million dollars worth of Poland's prewar assets in the United States.

Cheaper Mold For Foundries Is Perfected

WATERTOWN, Mass. — Army scientists at the Watertown Arsenal revealed today that they have developed a technique in the making of metal castings which is expected to save American industry millions of dollars. The invention will be available to all American industries making castings. The new process for making sand molds for castings uses low-cost waterglass to hold the sand together. It may save at least 90 per cent of the cost of such molds. More expensive resin-type bonding agents are now used for molds in the automobile, hardware, machinery and tool industries. Philip Carbonaro, director of the arsenal's Rodman Laboratory, said the new process will lend itself to automation, introducing still further foundry efficiency — and savings. The process will especially benefit smaller firms.

Paris Paper Says Stalin Died In Fit Of Rage Over Plan To Deport All Jews

PARIS — The newspaper France - Soir said Friday Joseph Stalin suffered his fatal stroke while in a fit of rage over Politburo opposition to a plan he had to deport all Jews from Russia. Secret Police Chief Lavrenty Beria, the paper said, danced around the stricken dictator's body, laughing and crying. "We are free, finally," the newspaper said its account of the stormy meeting which left the dictator unconscious on the floor was revealed in Warsaw by P. K. Pomorenko, Soviet ambassador to Poland, during an interview with Polish Communist journalists. The newspaper gave its account of the Politburo meeting late in February, 1953: Stalin raged against "Xionist and imperialist plot" directed at the Soviet Union and announced he planned to deport all Jews to the remote region of Birobidzhan, in the Jewish autonomous area in Eastern Siberia. V. M. Molotov, then foreign minister, tremblingly told Stalin such a move would have a "deplorable effect" on public opinion outside Russia. Molotov's wife is Jewish. At that point Soviet Marshal Klementi Voroshilov stood up, hurled his party card to the floor, and said: "If one takes such a step I would be ashamed to remain a member of our party which will be completely dishonored." Stalin flew into a rage. He screamed at Voroshilov: "It is I who will decide when you no longer have the right to keep your membership card."

Auto Industry To Shun Speed In Advertising

DETROIT — The auto industry says that from now on speed is a dirty word. It is to be replaced in the trade's vocabulary by safety, reliability and comfort. This is a decision of the directors of the Automobile Manufacturers Assn. These directors include the presidents of the Big Three in the industry—General Motors, Ford and Chrysler—as well as top executives from every other volume producer of passenger cars. If the decision is adhered to strictly, the days probably are gone when car A will claim it won the Pike's Peak Race while car B says it swept the field at Daytona Beach. The manufacturers have made wide use of race and contest results in their advertising. The emphasis in postwar years had been on speed and increasing horsepower. Engines have jumped from a mere 80 horsepower before World War II to 300 plus in luxury models. Acceleration tests have been ballyhooed.

Three Brothers Killed In Fire

CHICAGO — Three young brothers were killed early Friday and a fourth was injured when he jumped from the second floor of a three-story building which was swept by fire. The victims, sons of Charles W. Yates, 44, a window washer, were identified as Paul Edward, 12, Louis Wayne, 10, and Richard Lee, 8. Phillip Yates, 20, was taken to a hospital with injuries received when he leaped from the family's second floor apartment. Fire officials estimated damage at \$5,000. Yates, his wife, Virgie, and their three other children, Betty, 6, Dennis, 3, and Larvin, 1, were sleeping in a first floor bedroom and escaped unharmed when the fire broke out. The dead brothers were found on the floor of their second-floor room. Cook County Coroner Walter McCarron said 11 families lived in the building on the near north side that had originally been a three-flat. Cause of the fire was not determined immediately.

Only 10 per cent of those attending college with her were Christians, he also reported there is much poverty in India, and the average village people live in mud huts.
