

Final Winter Steelhead Count Is Above Average

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The count of winter steelhead migrating in the North Umpqua River during the 1956-57 season, although above average, was not a record, according to a report from the Oregon Game Commission's Southwest Regional Office at Roseburg.

The winter steelhead season is arbitrarily ended on May 31, while the summer steelhead season starts June 1. It is admitted that there is considerable overlapping of migrations at both ends of the two seasons, but the arbitrary date is set for record-keeping purposes.

The recorded migration of winter steelhead provides a total of 8,923 fish, a figure exceeded in several past years, yet ahead of the average.

The spring chinook salmon run maintained an average movement with 1,294 adult fish tallied over the counting board at Winchester Dam during the last two weeks of May. The total for the season stood at 3,403 on May 31. Usually by that date slightly more than one-half the season's total has been recorded.

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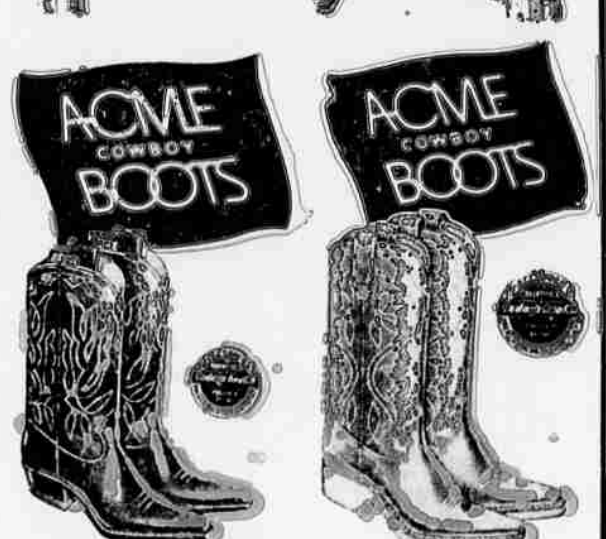

Anthony put himself in line for a championship shot by knocking out Chuck Spieser in Detroit April 5, and the National Boxing Assn. had given Moore until Friday to sign for a title bout.
