The bride attended Myrtle Creek High School and the bridegroom received his education in Colville. He has been employed as a plywood worker at Ford's Mill.



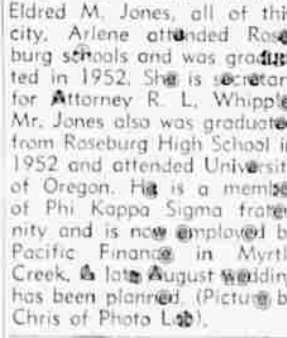
