Construction Slated At Olympic Ski Site
SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Construction is expected to start on the 1960 winter Olympics site at Squaw Valley within the next several weeks.
Sen. Harold T. Johnson, who successfully guided a \$2,900,000 Olympic bill through the legislature, said Tuesday the State Olympic Commission intends to open bids for work on the sports facilities by the first of next week.

Research, Lower Interest Rates Listed For Solving Farm Ills, Grangers Told

BEND — Research, expansion of commodity commissions and reduction of interest rates are the principal keys for solving the farmers' problems, the Oregon State Grange was told Tuesday.

Elmer McClure, state master, said in his annual address prepared for delivery to delegates from every county in the state, that "the greatest source of help for agriculture lies in the field of science."

He recalled that a year ago he expressed doubt of the effectiveness of the soil bank program, and "my fears have since been confirmed." So far as wheat is concerned, he said, "the solution is to be found in the domestic parity or multiple price plan."

County Road Crew Testing Salt Use

A county road maintenance crew has been making a test plot of two sections of road in Lookingglass Valley the past week.

The roads are being surfaced with the salt process in place of oil. Approximately two miles of the road leading from the valley west to Flourney Valley have been surfaced with the deep dust mixture of coarse salt drenched with water. The road skirting the valley on the west for a little over a mile has been treated with a surface application of salt.

Neuberger Asks Knowland To Withdraw Plan

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) urged Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) Tuesday to withdraw his "unfortunate suggestion" that Norway be neutralized in exchange for Soviet troop withdrawals from Hungary.

Neuberger told the Senate he hopes Knowland, the Republican leader, "will acknowledge that his suggestion was in error, lest it do incalculable damage to our prestige abroad."

Knowland listened in silence as Neuberger went on to say: "Surely it is a serious thing for our standing among nations when a responsible leader of the administration's party in the Senate implies that a valiant nation like Norway is a pawn, to be moved about at will by the United States."

"During World War II, the men and women of Norway bravely opposed Nazi invasion. Only a few months ago, these same people courageously rejected a Soviet threat of atomic retaliation unless Norway would submit to the Russian orbit, is such a country to be regarded as a mere missile in the rivalry between the United States and the Soviet Union?"

VA Hospital Men Win For Writings

Three patients at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital have won awards in the 11th annual hospitalized veterans writing project contest.

The contest is open to all veterans in hospitals throughout the United States.

Winners among local hospital veterans claimed these prizes: A \$5 award in the newspaper section as "newspaper of the year," another \$5 check for an entry in the "cartoon and poem" section; and a third man for a poem "A Glimmer of Omnipotence," won a subscription to "Spirit," a poetry magazine.

Kluszewski Optimistic About Active Return

PITTSBURGH — Big Ted Kluszewski, who has been treating his ailing back with "hump and grind" treatments, said Tuesday he's ready to play for the Cincinnati Redlegs but his manager adopted a wait and see attitude.

Informing that "Big Ted" was optimistic about his health, Redlegs Manager Birdie Tobbetta — slightly upset by Monday night's 5-2 loss to the Pittsburgh Pirates — declared:

"That's good. When will we put Ted back on the active list? Well, I'll wait and see how he looks and how he feels."

Agentinian Win 9th

NEW YORK — With just one year of pro experience behind him, Argentina's handsome, husky Alex Miteff appeared headed Tuesday for a ranking among the world's top ten heavyweight contenders.

The undefeated, 6-1 invader decisively whipped Germany's Willi Besmanoff at St. Nicholas Arena Monday night to chalk up his ninth victory in as many fights.

PORTLAND — Wayne Sengstock, 29, who played professional baseball for four years before joining the Portland school system as a teacher last year, will be the new baseball coach at Washington High School here.

Circuit Judge Rules Against Shrunk Motion

PORTLAND — Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding Monday ruled against a motion by attorneys for Portland Mayor Terry Schrunk, which had sought to restrict publication of news stories and statements made by prosecutors.

The mayor is scheduled to go on trial June 17 on a charge of perjury. He is accused of lying to a grand jury when he stated that he did not take a bribe in the course of a raid on a gambling club here in 1955 when Schrunk was sheriff of Multnomah County.

Schrunk's attorney, Edwin D. Hicks, contended that news stories published by The Oregonian and a letter from Asst. Atty. Gen. Elliot Cummings was damaging to Schrunk and might prevent him from getting a fair trial.

Hicks asked the court to prohibit publication of such stories. But Judge Redding said there was no law giving him the power to direct what should be published in the future. He said that if there was anything improper published, contempt action could be brought.

Army Unwraps Hawk Guided Missile System

WASHINGTON — The Army Tuesday took some of the wraps off of its Hawk guided missile system designed to track down and destroy low-flying enemy aircraft.

The Hawk, a thin weapon 16 feet long and 14 inches in diameter, will be used to guard key city and defense areas, such as New York City and the Washington-Baltimore area. It may also be adapted for use by the Army and the Marine Corps in the field.

Success of the Hawk system is directly tied in to recent developments in radar capable of tracking low-flying objects. The Hawk will complement the much larger and longer-ranged Nike which is designed for use against aircraft attacking from the upper altitudes.

The Army said it has started selection of sites around New York and Washington.

In its fixed-place version, each Hawk battery will require about 40 acres. To reduce land requirements and increase the safety factor, Hawk missiles will be stored underground.

The Raytheon Manufacturing Co. of Massachusetts has been given a production contract for the Hawk after successful tests of development missiles produced in the company's plant in Andover, Mass. The Northrop Aircraft Co. of California is the major subcontractor for the new missile.

Norway Dismisses Plan For Neutralization

OSLO — Foreign Minister Halvard M. Lange Tuesday dismissed a proposal by Sen. William Knowland (R-Calif.) that Norway be neutralized in exchange for a withdrawal of Soviet troops from Hungary and other satellite countries.

"To protest against such a careless and superficial idea would be to overemphasize the matter," Lange told the newspaper Morgenbladet.

Knowland told a television audience Sunday he had written Secretary of State Dulles saying a troop withdrawal proposal made by Soviet Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev should be put to a "test of good faith."

Lumber Negotiators Slate Meet Wednesday

PORTLAND — Negotiators for the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union will meet Wednesday with the union's executive board to consider rejection by an employers committee of a request for a 5-cent hourly wage increase.

The union negotiators said they would recommend "strong action."

The 5-cent increase is the same figure reached by both the ISAWU and the International Woodworkers of America with Georgia Pacific Corp. and the Willamette Valley Lumber Co. last week.
