Manager Birdie Tebbetts of Cincinnati's Redlegs has been saying of late:

"This is going to be some race. Any of maybe five teams could take it. And just about anybody can beat you."

And now the Pittsburgh Pirates, more of a "nobody" than most, have whipped the Redlegs two in a row — after losing 15 in a row to Cincinnati — and have trimmed Cincinnati's lead to a half game.

The five-hit pitching of Bob Foy helped bring an 8-1 victory for the seventh place Pirates last night and left Cincinnati four percentage points ahead of Milwaukee. The Braves jumped to second place with a 7-2 job on the Brooklyn Dodgers, who slipped to fourth, 1 1/2 games behind, with their fourth defeat in a row.

Fifth place St. Louis, only two games behind, won its seventh in a row with a 5-2 decision over the third place Philadelphia Phillies.

CLEVELAND — Pitcher Herb Score "should be able to resume his baseball workouts July 15," according to the specialist who has been treating the star south-paw's injured right eye.

That means it probably will be August before he will be in condition to return to the baseball wars from which he was shelved May 7 by a line drive off the bat of New York Yankee Gil McDougald.

Dr. Charles I. Thomas examined Score's injured eye yesterday afternoon for the first time in two weeks. Score had been visiting at the home of his uncle in Hagerstown, Md., and returned Monday night.

The doctor found in his testing that "Herb's condition is greatly improved, and his eye has responded well to the medication prescribed for him."

The medication, a liquid applied to the eye with a dropper and some tablets taken internally, will continue in gradually reduced amounts for another four weeks, said Dr. Thomas, "during which period he should gradually regain his strength through limited action."

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Score said he expected to leave tomorrow or Friday for his mother's home in Lake Worth, Fla. He plans to stay there until July when he rejoins the Indians.

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Left-handed Don Gross, who had built an 8-0 streak going back to 1955 with the Redlegs, dropped his third in a row as the Pirates took off on a 13-hit spree. The Redlegs pulled the NL's first triple play of the year, but did little else. Their run was unearned. Purkey, 5-4, walked none.

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"I'll fight them in the courts," he promised. Sick said he had not authorized a report that Seattle would ask \$3,000,000 damages if the majors disrupt the PCL, but he said:

"I hope they're not under the impression they're going to settle with us on the same basis as when they took Baltimore, Kansas City and Milwaukee out of the minors."

Herb Score Sets Workout Return

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Emil Sick Knocks Idea Of Forming NW League

SAN FRANCISCO — Emil Sick, owner of the Seattle Rainiers, wants no part of a Northwest league to replace the Pacific Coast loop if and when Brooklyn's Dodgers and New York's Giants move to San Francisco and Los Angeles, Call Bulletin sports editor Jack McDonald said Monday.

McDonald quoted Sick: "It's easy for sports writing people in California to tell us 'Go form another league,' but Seattle fans don't want a grade of baseball inferior to what they already have, and I am not going to be a part of it."

Sick said that during the 19 years he has owned the Rainiers they have finished in the first division 13 times, "have consistently outdrawn San Francisco and Los Angeles and have paid visiting teams \$200,000 more than we got from them while we were on the road. We think we deserve to keep as good baseball as we already have."

Sick told McDonald there aren't enough cities in the Northwest to form an eight-club league and he refuses to join a six-club loop.

"Spokane hasn't a stadium suitable for baseball. Victoria is out of the question. It is too small a city. Tacoma has no park and buggy days, when the Tacoma Tigers fielded a club, hasn't shown much interest in sports, other than amateur," he observed.

"To incorporate Denver and Salt Lake into a new league would mean the disruption of two minor league circuits, and we have more regard for the feelings of others in baseball than Mr. (Walter) O'Malley of the Brooklyn Dodgers has shown in his move to come to the coast," he went on.

Sick insisted that if San Francisco and Los Angeles go to the majors the Pacific Coast League will lose not just two, but five "San Diego, Sacramento and Hollywood will be out of business,
