

National Open Golf Tournament Underway; Hogan Withdraws

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP)—Amid some murmuring among the athletes about closely cropped greens and uncropped rough, a field of 162 started today in quest of the 57th National Open Golf Championship at historic Inverness Club.

Eight champions were on hand. The others ranged in age from 17-year-old amateur Jackie Nicklaus of Columbus, Ohio, to 62-year-old wee Bobby Cruickshank of Pittsburgh, who tied for the title 34 years ago but lost the play-off to Bobby Jones.

The Inverness Course measures 6,919 yards of treacherous terrain, windswept as a rule, and studded with 117 traps and hundreds of trees. A small stream meanders across seven fairways.

"Old Man Par" is 70. But the experts are picking him to whip the field.

Everyone seems to think the new champ, at the end of the 72-hole medal play test which winds

up with Saturday's 36-hole marathon, will come from a talented bracket including four-time champion Ben Hogan, four-time runner-up Sam Snead, Masters champion Doug Ford, PGA champion Jack Burke whose dad tied for second here 37 years ago, and Peter Thomson of Australia, three-time winner of the British Open.

The big hazard is the small and slick putting surfaces. In yesterday's last free fling around the course, most of the field failed to find the answers.

One pro, after three-putting from 12 feet, said: "The best way to handle these greens is to hold the putter a bit above and behind the ball, then tap the ball lightly with the shadow."

Neuralgia Forces Ben To Take Tourney Leave

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP)—Ben Hogan withdrew from the 57th National Open Golf Championship Thursday after being stricken with severe back and chest pains.

After receiving a 54-minute delay in his starting time to permit diathermy treatment, the four-time champion from Fort Worth, Tex., returned to the Inverness Course, dressed and took some practice shots.

Then, obviously in great pain, he turned to officials of the U.S. Golf Assn. and said:

"I'm afraid I can't make it."

Hogan came up with severe pains in the chest and back shortly after arriving at the Inverness Course. A hurried call for a doctor was made over the loud speaker system.

Dr. Harry M. Scott, a Toledo physician and club member, diagnosed the ailment as neuralgia in his chest wall. He prescribed diathermy treatment.

State troopers, with sirens screaming, took the Texas golfer into town for treatment.

Attendants in the locker room said Hogan originally arrived in apparent good health and, without any practice except a brief spell on the putting green, began to dress when pains struck him. The former champion was unable to raise his arms over his head.

Moyer Would Match McMurty Against Winner

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Eight promoter Tommy Moyer said Wednesday he would like to match the winner of the Bobo Olson-Joe Maxim fight here July 18 with Irish Pat McMurty of Tacoma.

Moyer said if the bout could be arranged and should McMurty win, Moyer would like to pair McMurty with Archie Moore, light heavyweight titleholder, in a bout for the light heavy championship.

Moyer said McMurty, now fighting as a heavyweight, could easily trim down to the 175-pound light heavy limit.

The Lewiston Broncs belted Yakima for the second straight time Wednesday night and climbed out of the Northwest League cellar in the process.

Lewiston prevailed by a 14-3 score.

The Yakima loss, coupled with Eugene's 2-1 decision over the Tri-City Braves, trimmed the Bears' lead over the second-place Emeralds to one slim game.

Tri-City took over cellar duties.

In the other league contest, the Wenatchee Chiefs shaded Salem's Senators, 3-2.

The Broncs were unstoppable as they banged three Yakima pitchers for 18 hits, including homers by Hills Layne, Richie Morris and Bruce McIntosh. Layne also got a double and three singles in three ABs. Tom Mulcahy was credited with the victory as he limited Yakima to five hits and fanned 10.

Pitcher Ollie Brantley won his own game for the Emeralds, driving in the winning run in the last of the ninth inning with a sacrifice fly. Chuck Stacy's triple and Mel Krause's single produced Eugene's other run in the sixth inning. Bill Sperling took the loss, although he held the Emeralds to three hits.

Herb Anderson's solo belt in the first inning and Ted Tappe's two-run blast in the sixth produced all of Wenatchee's runs. Jim Jones took the victory with a nine-hitter. Lee Walker, who gave up eight hits, was the loser. Both pitchers went the distance.

Versatile Frank Thomas Makes Pirates Threat

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Manager Bobby Bragan said today the main reason his hustling Pittsburgh Pirates have beaten the Cincinnati Redlegs three consecutive games is Frank Thomas, whom he called "one of the most versatile and best players in the majors."

"The worm is turning just a little," said Bragan. "We're getting a few breaks that went the other way earlier in the season. Now we've tied our season's longest winning streaks at four games and one of the big reasons is Thomas."

In last night's game, won by the Pirates 4-3 in 10 innings, Thomas had two singles in three times at bat to boost his batting average to .338, fifth best in the National League. His hits drove in two runs to give him a total of 29 RBIs.

"And look what he did in the 10th when Dee Fondy got a lead-off walk," Bragan continued. "I knew Thomas might be a cinch to get a hit but the strategy called for a sacrifice and Frank laid down a good one. It paid off because Gene Fresse came through a moment later with the game-winning single."

Thomas, who has to take a look at the lineup daily to determine where he's playing, was in left field last night. He turned in a brilliant play in the second inning. Ed Bailey was on first when Don Hoak sent a scorching liner toward Thomas, who caught the ball at his shoetaps and threw to first to double Bailey.

"That's the kind of an arm the boy has," Bragan said. "In the infield he's terrific, especially getting that ball over from third to first."

Bold Ruler, Gallant Man At Belmont

NEW YORK (AP)—A field of seven colts, smallest being the great Native Dancer best five rivals in 1953, appeared to be about the size of it for the 88th running of the \$100,000-added Belmont Stakes Saturday.

Narrowing it down further, it looks like a two-horse duel between the Wheatley Stable's Bold Ruler and Ralph Lowe's Gallant Man, plus a battle of skill matching a veteran Belmont combination against a trainer and jockey taking their first stab at the famed classic.

Trainer Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons, 82, and jockey Eddie Arcaro each will be shooting for their seventh Belmont with Bold Ruler, Johnny Nerud, who trains Gallant Man, and his rider Willie Shoemaker have never had a colt in the mile and one half race.

This final number in the Derby is to be televised and broadcast nationally from 3:30-4 p.m. (EST).

It probably will determine the 3-year-old championship, as it has done in 10 of the last 11 years.

Nerud said he planned to enter Bold Nero, another colt owned by Lowe, so actually there will be only six betting interests. Bold Nero and Gallant Man both were bred overseas by the Aga Khan.

Others expected to be entered officially tomorrow morning are the Greenree Stable's Cohoes, the Cain Hoy Stable's Lucky Dip, a French-bred colt, the D. & M. Stable's Inside Tract, and Mrs. Jules Schwartz's Nah Hiss.

With seven facing the starter, the Belmont will have a gross value of \$114,350. Second, third and fourth place is worth \$20,000, \$10,000 and \$5,000.

Bold Ruler rules an even money favorite at the moment, with the Lowe entry 7-5, and Cohoes with Ted Atkinson up 8-1.

Atkins Pounds Walter Byars

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Virgil (Honeybear) Atkins of St. Louis was a step closer to a shot at the welterweight title Thursday following a close but unanimous decision over Walter Byars of Boston, but his manager said his future plans are somewhat indefinite.

Eddie Yarwitz said he expected to send Atkins next against either Gaspar Ortega or the No. 1 challenger for Carmen Basilio's welterweight crown, Tony DeMarco—a recent upset victim of Byars.

Atkins, the nation's fifth ranked welterweight, scored repeatedly to the head in the late rounds of Wednesday night's televised fight that was a sports feature of International Naval Review Week.

A near capacity crowd of 3,000 fans roundly booed the decision. Referee Paddy Mills had Atkins ahead 98-93 under the 10-point "must" system. Judge Johnny Burton had Atkins in front 99-96 and Judge Charles E. Ford gave Atkins a 96-94 edge. The Associated Press scored it 99-96 for Atkins.

Braves, Giants Fail In Trade

BROOKLYN (AP)—The Milwaukee Braves, striving desperately to plug a weakness at second base, admitted Wednesday they had reached an impasse in their efforts to wrest Red Schoendienst from the New York Giants.

A club official disclosed that a Braves' proposal of four players for Schoendienst had been rejected by the Giants and added that a New York counter proposal was, in turn, vetoed by Milwaukee.

"The four players we offered were pitchers Gene Conley and Joey Jay, infielder Danny O'Connell and outfielder Wes Covington," the official said. "I think that was a pretty good offer for just one guy. Darn good, in fact. But they said 'no.' They said they'd be willing to let us have Schoendienst if we threw in Bob Buhl instead of Conley."

"As much as we'd like to have Red, we just can't see giving up a top flight pitcher like Buhl for a 34-year-old guy. Pitching is our chief asset but it would no longer be if we gave up Buhl."
