

Bobby Morrow Equals World 100-Yard Mark

AUSTIN, Tex. — Bobby Morrow, the purple streak from the Texas plains, who said he never ran for records — he just ran to win — finally has broken into the world's record class in spite of himself.

He can credit Ira Murchison, the chunky Negro from Western Michigan, for making it so. Murchison got a start like a jack rabbit Friday night in preliminaries of the 100-yard dash in the NCAA meet and led Morrow, Abilene Christian's double sprint champion of the Olympic Games, for 80 yards.

It was all bounding Bobby could do to nip Murchison by less than a foot in the time of 9.3 — which tied the world's record set back in 1948 by Mel Patton of Southern California and since tied by four runners.

"If he hadn't gotten that start on me I might have run relaxed and done no good at all," said Morrow.

The blazing 100, in which Murchison also was credited with 9.3, featured the afternoon and night-long trials of the NCAA, but there were some great marks in other events, two of them within a whisker of world's records.

Greg Bell, the little Negro from Indiana who was the Olympic broad jump champion, leaped 26 feet 7 inches to come within 1 1/4 inches of the storied record set by the great Jesse Owens at Ohio State in 1935. And Ansel Robinson, tall Negro from Fresno State, sped the 220-yard low hurdles in 22.4, which is only two-tenths over the record set by Dave Sims of Duke last year.

San Francisco and Vancouver continued their one-two competition in Pacific Coast League baseball Friday night while a traffic jam developed farther down in the standings.

San Francisco remained on top of the heap after edging Sacramento, 5-4, and Vancouver stayed right behind the Seals with an 8-1 triumph over third-place Hollywood.

The jam developed around fourth place.

San Diego beat Los Angeles, 6-1, to tie with the Angels for the No. 4 rung and Seattle moved to within a half a game of the spot after making it three straight over Portland, 8-6.

The Beavers outthrew the Rainiers, 14-10, but the Seattle club took advantage of 10 walks given up by four Portland pitchers to build a winning margin.

The Mountie victory over the Twinkles was their first in the four-game series. Vancouver pounded out 11 hits, including Owen Friend's fourth home run, triples by Buddy Peterson, Kal Segrist and Carl Povich and a double by Jim Marshall.

A series of well-placed singles on the heels of Portland's costly walks gave the Rainiers a solid 8-3 lead over Portland, just a notch out of the PCL basement. One of Portland's three runs came on a homer by Bill Demars. Then the Beavers suddenly took life with a breathtaking ninth-inning rally. Solly Drake singled and scored on George Freese's homer. Luis Marquez singled in field, reached third unopposed and crossed the plate when Bob Borkowski singled into the infield. But Seattle substituted Bill Kennedy for Charlie Rabe on the mound and he pulled the curtain on Portland.

Braves' Shortstop Fined 100 Bucks

PHILADELPHIA — Johnny Logan, Milwaukee Braves' shortstop, has been fined \$100 for his part in a fight with pitcher Don Drysdale of the Brooklyn Dodgers, and the peppy shortstop called the assessment "unjust."

Logan was notified of the fine Friday night by National League president Warren Giles, who assessed Drysdale \$40. The difference in fines is the sore point.

"I'm mad," Logan said. "Drysdale started the fight. He threw at me. If I get fined \$100, so should he. It's unjust."

The fight took place in Brooklyn Thursday and developed into a brawl by players from both teams. Logan came out of it with a cut over one eye, while Drysdale collected lumps on his chest. In a telegram, Giles told Logan:

"Your challenging remarks were in a large measure responsible and your participation was a repetition of similar and less serious offenses in the past."

Giles references to "similar offenses" apparently was to Logan's tangle with Hal Jeffcoat of the Redlegs two weeks ago.
