

Fake Kidnaping In Italy Results In Win For Cupid

REGGIO CALABRIA, Italy (AP)—A lovelorn mayor has won permission to marry the school marm he carried off to the mountains last week.

Police dropped the case after 28-year-old Francesca Zavattieri and Pietro Nucera, 40-year-old mayor of Roghudi, said they made for the hills in hopes of breaking her family's resistance to the match.

Nucera and several comrades staged the "abduction" in which she cooperated. They waylaid Francesca and someone fired a pistol as the couple fled to the hills.

Police received an anonymous note saying they could find Francesca in a cave on the Aspromonte (Harsh) Mountain. They found her and later Nucera strolled into the Reggio police station.

Francesca's family finally gave their blessing and announced that the wedding will be held soon.

Monday Dedication For Glide Church

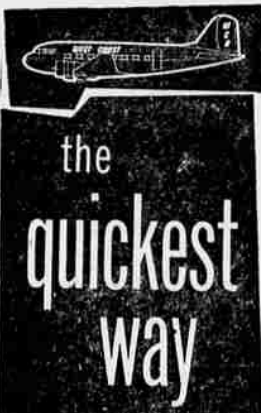
Glide Assembly of God Church will hold its opening service and dedication Monday at 2:30 p.m.

Jordan's Move Widens Breach With Cairo Govt.

AMMAN (AP)—Jordan's strained relations with Egypt widened further today as she moved to close her embassy in Cairo.

The latest move in the mounting feud between Jordan and the Egyptian-Syrian alliance threatened to dissolve what little remains of the Arab unity proclaimed in Cairo four months ago by Egyptian President Nasser, Syrian President Kuwaty and King Hussein of Jordan and Saud of Saudi Arabia.

The controlled Egyptian press

made plain, however, King Hussein's rift with Nasser would cost him Egypt's share of the annual 36-million-dollar Arab subsidy promised him when Jordan broke her defense pact with Britain.

U.S. Payment Begun

Informed quarters predicted oil-rich, pro-Western Iraq will grant Jordan aid to compensate for Syria's share. The United States already has paid Hussein half the 10 million dollars it promised him after he ousted leftist, pro-Egyptian leaders from his government in the spring.

Jordan's relations with Egypt chilled last April when Hussein cleaned his political house and made veiled charges that Egypt

and Syria were plotting against his throne.

The situation reached a critical point last week when Jordan accused Egypt's military attaché in Amman of conspiring to assassinate members of the royal family and government. Egypt said the whole thing was fabricated.

Rose Festival Closes In Lure Of Lively Events

PORTLAND (AP)—The annual Portland Rose Festival closed Sunday with crowds dividing attention among several events.

More than 6,000 went to Mt. Hood for the Golden Rose downhill ski race, won by Christian Prayda of Sun Valley. Lorne O'Connor, Vancouver, B.C., was second and Art Breitsprecher, Seattle, third.

The Navy jet precision flying team, the Blue Angels, flew in exhibition over the Portland Airport, drawing an estimated 50,000 persons.

Other thousands watched other events, including a marine show on the Willamette River in downtown Portland.

Alec Cameron, 15 Portland, won the AU outboard class race with John Hall, Salem, second, and Cliff Plagman, Albany, third.

In the class B hydroplane race Dick Larsen, Seattle, won, with Hall again second and Dick Pharris, Albany, third.

The unlimited class hydroplane, Kawai Kai III, made a few exhibition runs at high speed. The craft, owned by Edgar F. Kaiser of Oakland, Calif., is to be entered in the Gold Cup race at Seattle, Aug. 10-11.

Flu Epidemic Reaches Europe, North America

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP)—The Asian influenza epidemic has reached Europe and North America, and cannot be prevented from spreading through most of the world, the U.N. World Health Organization reported Friday.

The newly identified type of Virus A, a cause of the epidemic which struck nearly every country in Asia the past two months, has been definitely identified in the Netherlands. It is assumed now to be spreading throughout Europe and the United States with the large numbers of travelers arriving daily from Asia.

Asian Flu Epidemic Hits Korean Children

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—The flu is reported to have come to South Korea. Doctors and medicines were rushed Monday to Hamgyong, 150 miles south of Seoul, where 215 school children were ill. Korea had been unaffected by the epidemic which struck other Asian nations this spring.

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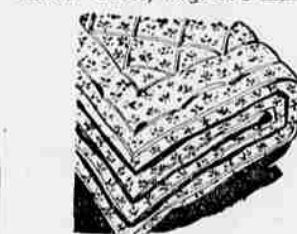
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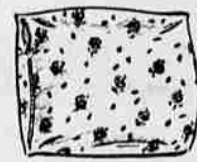
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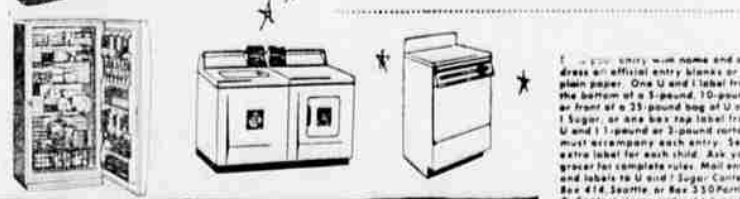
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
