Sometimes it is the wisest course to dig up a patchy lawn and replant it.

A few simple steps will help you to achieve the luxuriant green carpet you dream of having around your home.

Step No. 1 is the preparation of a good seed bed.

Spade to a depth of at least 8 inches, turning the soil over and crumbling it thoroughly.

A level surface tends to reduce the danger of seeds washing away, so your next step should be to smooth off the peaks and fill in the hollows of your spaded area.

This can be done easily by dragging a length of ladder or a heavy plank sideways across it.

To keep the soil from drying out, spread a layer of organic matter and work it into the upper inch of soil. Peatmoss, leafmold, screened compost or shredded, well-rotted manure are excellent mulch materials. Any of these can be raked or rolled into the surface layer of your lawn area.

Use a lawn roller to work the earth to a firm, level surface.

Step No. 2 is the seeding. Less than 20 per cent of the seeds you will sow will survive to form a healthy bed of grass. It is therefore necessary to scatter at least five times the amount you expect to grow. Follow the directions of the seed supplier for the suggested proportion of seed per square foot of lawn. This figure will vary with the type of grass used.

Tamp the seed lightly into the earth, but don't rake it in or cover it. Grass seed needs to be exposed to daylight before it can sprout.

Germination is best if the weather is warm during the day and cold at night. The temperature range should be below 90 degrees and above 55 degrees Fahrenheit.

Your third step is the watering. If you started lawn dries for as short a period as one hour, it may be ruined.

At this point a really good sprinkler is a wise investment. A fog-sprayer or mist-sprayer are best. One that covers your entire planting at one setting will help to prevent your walking about the newly sown area.

Keep watering even after your lawn is well started. The average seed mixture contains varieties that take from five to thirty days to sprout.

Finally, if possible, keep children, adults and pets alike from walking on your new lawn, and you will be rewarded with a lush, green carpet.

TWO MATCHES

Save Fisherman Adrift In Ocean

MONTEREY, Calif. — "Two lousy matches" saved a commercial fisherman from the Pacific after five days adrift in his disabled salmon troller.

"I was down to two lousy matches," said Jack Coats, Eureka, Calif., who rescued before dawn yesterday. "But I was real lucky."

After drifting 200 miles through fog and heavy seas, Coats, 32, soaked his shirt in gasoline and waved it for a flare. That was at 1 a.m. yesterday morning when he saw the lights of the destroyer George Anderson bearing down on him 22 miles off Monterey.

Even though he had consumed only raw fish, a nubbin of mouldy bread five vitamin pills and two quarts of brackish water left over from last season, he refused to leave his boat, the Gojoc. The Anderson kept him under her floodlights until a Coast Guard cutter arrived to take him to shore.

Coats was in good condition and drove back to Eureka Sunday with his wife.

Engine, Radio Fail

He vanished last Tuesday afternoon off Arena Cove more than 100 miles north of San Francisco when he took his 36-foot boat out for a test.

His battery failed, the engine wouldn't start, his radio was dead and a fog closed in.

The Coast Guard searched the sea with three cutters and two planes. Fishermen were alerted, but he scudded rapidly southward before a strong wind through heavy seas and fog.

Six From County At Science Session

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Four high school students from Douglas County will complete a special Junior Engineers and Scientists Summer Institute June 22 at Oregon State College.

The students are Frank T. Churchill, Glide; Kenneth Boyd Knechtel, Wilbur; and Richard Lee Meredith, of 148 SE Houck Ave., William R. Meyers of 1446 S. E. Main, Stephanie Briggs of 541 W. Chamber Street, and Michele Collins, 123 W. Liburn, all of Roseburg.

The institute was established last year to give selected high school sophomores and juniors a special orientation on careers and training requirements in engineering and science. A total of 180 students were picked from Oregon and Washington to attend the OSC program this year.

Course work covers various phases of engineering—mechanical, civil, electrical and industrial—along with mathematics, physics, chemistry, zoology, geology, bacteriology, botany and astronomy. OSC professors instruct the classes.

In addition to the course work, students have daily assemblies with speakers and demonstrations from industrial and engineering firms. Field trips are planned to industries in Portland and to the Cascade Mountains. Forty-one girls are included among the 180 students registered this year.

Sponsor of the institute is Scientists of Tomorrow, a non-profit corporation formed to promote educational activities in science and to help secure additional scientists and engineers for this country. The Institute at Oregon State was so successful last year that Utah, Nevada, and Montana are holding similar programs this summer.

Graduate Declines To Sit With School Classmates

PORTLAND — William H. Sturgeon passed up his high school graduating exercises.

"I figured I'd look a little too out of place," said the 43-year-old Sturgeon.

His picture appeared in the Grant High School yearbook, however, puzzling students, who did not recall seeing him. They were further puzzled by the listing of his accomplishments: A member of the track and tennis teams and a veteran of World War II.

Actually, Sturgeon was on the track and tennis teams back in the early 1930s. He didn't get a diploma then, because he lacked two credits. He made those up in summer school, and went on to college.

But he never received his high school diploma. So he went down earlier this year and asked for it.

"I was told I'd have to get the diploma with the June class. I just picked it up Tuesday," he said.

Hershey Reports Calls For Draft May Be Reduced

QUANTICO, Va. — Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey said Saturday monthly draft calls may be cut in half if Pentagon economy efforts produce a sizable reduction in military manpower.

Hershey said it would be "fair" to expect a 50 per cent drop in draft calls if the military carry out a plan now being contemplated to cut manpower by about 200,000 over the next two or three years.

The draft chief said, in an interview with the Washington Evening Star, that with such a cut, Selective Service inductions might drop to 6,000 or 7,000 a month, compared with the current monthly call for 13,000 men.

Hershey was among the top military and civilian leaders of the armed forces gathered at the Quantico Marine base for an annual conference with Secretary of Defense Wilson.

Wilson told reporters he expects "a gradual reduction of personnel" and a "mild stretchout" of military production to keep defense spending within the \$8 billion dollar ceiling set by President Eisenhower for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Wilson did not specify any figure in talking about manpower cuts, but there were indications the reduction would amount to 20,000 or more.

Hershey based his statement on the prospect of halving draft calls on a gradual manpower cut of about 10 per cent. About 2,800,000 men are now under arms.

He indicated that a monthly draft call of 6,000 would be the minimum if the Selective Service apparatus is to be kept operating fully.
