

School Evaluation Subcommittee Seeking Answers By Public On School Questions

The teaching methods subcommittee of the Roseburg School Evaluation Steering Committee has prepared the second in a series of questionnaires designed to acquaint its members with thinking of the public on various school questions.

About 600 copies of the questionnaire have been sent to parents, cost of printing ruling out complete coverage of the community. However, The News-Review will publish the outlines as they are made ready.

Mrs. Jack Cummins, chairman of the subcommittee, asked that answers to the questions be mailed to her at 834 W. Nebo St.

She asked that persons answering the questionnaire take their time in considering and answering the questions, then answer only those questions which they feel they are able to.

The questionnaires answers needn't be signed unless the person wishes.

"If our citizen study will benefit our schools, it will do so partly because the citizens of Roseburg have been kind enough to give sincere thought and time to furnishing answers, comments and suggestions concerning our educational practices and needs," Mrs. Cummins said.

Following are 13 questions:

1. Designate the one or more that fits you: (1) Parent of children in the Roseburg School District; (2) parent of child under school age; (3) parent of child graduated from Roseburg schools; (4) interested citizen.
2. In which grades are your children?
3. How many children under school age do you have?
4. In the following, please answer "enough," "need more" or "too much" to each. State whether you refer to elementary, junior high or senior high in each case. How well do you believe your child's needs on the following are met in Roseburg schools: (1) Homework; (2) Drill in basic subjects; (3) Library books available; (4) Study time in schools; (5) Field trips; (6) Athletics (not physical education). Please comment.
5. What do you think your child studies in the subject of social living: (1) English, history, geography, spelling and writing; or (2) social activities, such as dancing. Please comment.
6. Elementary schools: What type of report card grading do you prefer: (1) Parent-teacher conference; (2) 1-2-3-4-5 with comments; (3) 1-2-3-4-5; or (4) S (for satisfactory) and U (unsatisfactory). Please comment.
7. In the junior and senior high schools, which report card system do you prefer: (1) Pupil's conduct and attitude considered part of his subject grade; (2) citizenship graded separately. Comment.
8. How do you feel about discipline in Roseburg schools: (1) Much too easy; (2) little too easy; (3) about right; (4) too strict. Comment.
9. Are you satisfied with the regulation and control in your child's school room? Please comment.
10. In the following, please answer "too much," "about right" or "too little" to each. State in each case whether you refer to elementary, junior high or senior high. Do you believe the Roseburg schools are emphasizing too much or too little these subjects: (1) English; (2) mathematics or arithmetic; (3) geography; (4) history; (5) health; (6) physical education; (7) science; (8) art; (9) writing (penmanship); (10) music; (11) reading; (12) business; (13) home-making; (14) foreign language; (15) industrial arts. Please comment.
11. Judge Denies Defense Plea For Acquittal Of Brewster

WASHINGTON — Federal District Judge John J. Sirica Tuesday denied a defense plea for acquittal of Frank W. Brewster, top West Coast official of the Teamsters Union who is charged with contempt of Congress.

The ruling, which came at the close of the government's case, means that the defense now must go forward with its testimony.

The 31-count indictment against Brewster, chairman of the 11-state Western Conference of the Teamsters, stems from his refusal to produce records and answer questions before the Senate investigations subcommittee last January. He challenged its authority to look into internal affairs of labor organizations.

Subsequently, the Senate created a special labor racketeers committee to take over the investigation. Brewster testified before that committee for five days, denying testimony linking him with efforts to take over vice operations in Portland, Ore., and with other misdeeds.

Brewster's chief counsel, John K. Pickens, has said that Brewster will testify in his own behalf.

In making the motion for judgment of acquittal, Pickens contended the investigations subcommittee "went on a wild goose chase into labor racketeering with no authority at all."

Pickens also quoted from the Supreme Court's decision Monday acquitting John T. Watkins, a labor organizer, of contempt of Congress.

"I think we have a very different situation here," Judge Sirica said.

The judge said the Congressional Reorganization Act gave the Government Operations Committee, parent of the investigations subcommittee, broad powers to look into economy and efficiency of government operations at all levels.

This, he said, gave the subcommittee authority to determine whether regulations of the Labor Department and the National Labor Relations Board, where labor organizations are required to file financial and other reports, were being complied with.

Sirica said this authority included finding out whether labor organizations "are more or less thumbing their nose at agencies whose aid they are asking."

Red China Fails To Lure Tibet Into Communism

HONG KONG — Red China Monday admitted a sharp new setback in its 6-year-old attempt to bring the hardy lamas of Tibet into the Communist camp.

A brief announcement by Peiping Radio said most of the Chinese personnel now working there will be withdrawn and sent to other parts of China.

The announcement said that "since the central government has resolved not to carry out democratic reform in Tibet within the next few years, the present setup and staff were too big."

Though the number of Chinese in Tibet is not known, the variety of their activities indicates there are many thousands. They include road builders, railway surveyors, farmers, agricultural experts, prospectors, laborers and an army of at least 20,000 soldiers.

Troop withdrawal, an admission of final defeat, seems unlikely.

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Sen. Humphrey Asks For Probe On Policies

WASHINGTON — Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn) said Tuesday he will conduct "a thorough investigation" of U.S. disarmament policies, including "the present role of Harold E. Stassen."

He said top administration officials will be asked to tell the Senate Disarmament Subcommittee "what authority Mr. Stassen now has" as chief U.S. negotiator in the disarmament talks at London.

Humphrey, chairman of that subcommittee, said he will seek a time for hearings after the Senate completes ratification of a pending treaty approving U.S. membership in the International Atomic Energy Agency.

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West Coast Airlines Inc. asks authority to fly from Portland to Oakland-San Francisco; from Klamath Falls, Ore., to Reno and Boise, and from Reno to Boise, Salt Lake City and Stockton; and from Seattle to Bellingham via Whidbey Island.

Bonanza Air Lines Inc. wants permission to fly from Reno to Salt Lake City via Winnemucca, Elko and Ely.

Two carriers seek authority to suspend or eliminate service. Northwest Airlines Inc. would delete Wenatchee from its certificate, while United Airlines asks authority to delete Bellingham and either suspend or delete both Bend-Redmond and Klamath Falls.

Among cities participating in the hearing are Omak, Wash., which seeks scheduled air service; The Dalles, Ore., which seeks scheduled service to Portland and Medford, Ore.; Walla Walla, which asks co-status with Pendleton on United's run, and Ely, Nev., which seeks to have United's authority there made permanent.

Board proposals under consideration include the possibility of adding The Dalles to West Coast's Portland-Yakima route; granting skip-stop authority to West Coast, Bonanza and Southwest; and substituting a local carrier for Northwest at Yakima, and for United at Salem, Elko and Ely, Nev., Bend-Redmond and Klamath Falls.

Dominicans Protest Rep. Porter's Speech

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic — Dominican legislators protested Monday against a recent speech in which Rep. Porter (D-Ore) urged Dominican exiles to unite for action against Gen. Rafael Trujillo's regime.

Porter made the speech in Puerto Rico on June 8. It was broadcast in Spanish by the Puerto Rican radio, which can be heard in the Dominican Republic.

Leaders of the Dominican Senate and House sent protests to the U.S. Congress, accusing Porter of "inciting oppositionist groups against Latin American government to co-ordinate their efforts and unleash subversive action."

They said Porter's words violated inter-American non-intervention pacts. They also said Porter will be held responsible for disorders that follow his indictments.

Holmes Will Attend Governors' Conference

SALEM — Gov. Robert D. Holmes leaves Wednesday for the annual meeting of the Governor's Conference in Williamsburg, Va.

While at the conference the governor will play a leading role in the discussion of education problems, he said. One of the main topics will be the more effective use of school buildings, teachers and facilities the year around.

He will be accompanied on the trip by Mrs. Holmes, executive Assistant Harry R. Swanson Jr., and Mrs. Swanson.

During his absence, Senate President Boyd Overhulse of Madras will fill the governor's chair. When Overhulse is out of the state June 22, House Speaker Pat Dooley of Portland will be acting governor.

VEHICLE STRIKES MINE

ALGIERS — A military vehicle loaded with soldiers struck a mine near Tlemcen in Western Algeria and 10 were killed, French officials reported Tuesday.
