

### Government Denies Evidence On Hoffa Gained By Wiretap

WASHINGTON — James R. Hoffa's lawyer Wednesday claimed evidence against him was obtained by wire tapping, but the government promptly denied it. Hoffa, Midwest Teamsters Union boss, arrived a half hour early this morning for the start of his federal district court trial. The government charges he bribed and conspired to plant a paid informer on the Senate racketeers committee staff. Hoffa's attorneys filed a motion to quash any government evidence obtained through wire tapping. They also subpoenaed Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell to testify on whether there have been any wire tapping authorizations to the FBI. But the government promptly filed an answering motion to quash the Brownell subpoena. This contained a denial by Brownell that there has been any FBI wire tapping. The cocky, dapper Hoffa's future as a Teamster leader largely hangs on the outcome of this trial. Conviction probably would end his power; an acquittal likely would put him in line to become the next president of the Teamsters. But he also is under a federal wire tapping indictment in New York. At the start of Wednesday's trial, Judge Burnita S. Matthews rejected new moves for a delay.

### LUMBER FALL KILLS MAN

GRANTS PASS — Duane L. Barnhart, 26, a self employed trucker, was killed Tuesday afternoon when a load of lumber slipped from a truck and fell on him as he was loading it. He was working for the M and Y mill at Selma at the time of the accident. The widow and three children survive.

### Hundreds Flee Haiti Capital

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti — Hundreds of workers and peasants have fled this seething capital city in fear that fresh violence may erupt. Loaded with personal belongings, they began streaming out of Port Au Prince Tuesday as the ruling military junta started jailing political partisans on a wide scale. Those fleeing to the countryside included supporters of both presidential candidate Louis Dejoie and his arch rival, ousted provisional President Daniel Fignole. Dejoie himself was in hiding. Six of his top advisers and scores of his followers were among those arrested. The military rulers apparently concentrated on Dejoie's backers to keep them from again organizing general strikes. Most business firms in the capital followed orders from Dejoie in the recent strikes stayed during the political turmoil that has unsettled six governments since December. The ruling junta has outlawed strikes. Heavily armed troops and police patrolled the streets forcing stores and shops to remain open.

### Japan Court Sentences Americans To 15 Years

OTSU, Japan — The Japanese District Court today sentenced an American soldier to 15 years imprisonment for robbing and murdering a Buddhist priest. The soldier, identified as Pvt. Randall B. Boyles, 24, Kanton, Del., was convicted of assaulting the priest last December, robbing him and tossing his unconscious body into Lake Biwa, where he drowned. The prosecution demanded a light sentence. Judge Toshio Yanagida said he imposed a lighter sentence because Boyles had displayed a "penitent attitude" and presented \$300 in sympathy money to the priest's widow. The army paid her \$3,333.

ASCOT, England — The babe with the biggest bust in British show business gate-crashed the hallowed royal enclosure at the Ascot races here. It was sensational, and the place may never be the same again. The girl with the bust is Sabrina, nee Norma Sykes, known the length and breadth of the British Isles as "Television's Dumb Blonde." She has become famous by the simple process of standing in front of the cameras and breathing. The vital statistic is 41 inches. Sabrina's appearance before the royal family and among the peers of the realm created a bigger shock than the victory of an 8-year-old gelding named Bonhomie in the day's feature race, and Bonhomie paid 7-1 on the tote. They won't let you in the royal enclosure at all if you are divorced. Dressed in a low-necked flowered organdy, Sabrina walked into the enclosure without a ticket while the gate man was groping around the royal turf for his eyeballs. "Scandalous!" hissed 17 duchesses, or it may have been 18. "Shocking!" muttered six viscountesses, or maybe it was seven. "Yes, m'deah," murmured their titled escorts as they kept on looking. A reporter who encountered the show girl asked her what in the world she was doing in the royal enclosure. "Looking," giggled Sabrina, "for the ladies' powder room."

### Kiwanian Members Hear Discussion On City Budget

The subject of the forthcoming Roseburg city budget election, to take place next Tuesday, was the main presentation to members of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club Tuesday at their weekly luncheon. Heard in speaking roles on the subject were City Manager George Farrell, City Attorney Paul Geddes, budget committee chairman Joe Boatwright, budget committee members Ed Wyatt and Pete Peterson and City Councilman Pete Serafin. All agreed that the budget to be voted on was "very desirable" and all urged that a big vote would be helpful to its passing. The measure to be voted on calls for a total of \$95,780.44 outside the six percent limitation from a total budget of \$253,471.44. It was described by Geddes as "one of the lowest figures beyond the six per cent limitation we have ever had." The total budget figure, however, is the highest overall budget ever proposed by the city for election. But much of the total the speakers pointed out Tuesday was based on two big items. The biggest of these is for the authorization of a \$75,000 sinking fund measure for sewer service charge. The other is for a \$25,000 sinking fund figure for a new city hall, an item approved in the last election. Outside these two items, the overall budget is less than the 1956-57 budget. Aside from these two items, the budget's biggest single item, the proposed salary increase allotment for city employees. This accounts for \$43,000 increase in total wages for city employees during the 1957-58 fiscal year. Both Farrell and Geddes heartily defended the salary increase item as both "necessary" and "justified," in order to bring Roseburg city employees' salaries up to the standards of other cities of comparable size. Geddes also cited the reduction in the budget brought about by the approval of franchises with California Oregon Power Co. and Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. The millage rate will be a fraction below last year's in the proposed budget and Geddes pointed out in this regard that the budget committee has succeeded in reaching a "balance" between keeping the millage rate at a level and still building toward the future. One of the items channelled toward "progress" and accounted for in the budget is a \$25,000 item for the improvement of the new city park. This, all speakers agreed, to include a baseball park and golf course eventually, will be an asset to the city in tourist trade and reputation beyond accounting.

### Autos Battered, But Occupants Escape Tuesday

Two accidents Tuesday, battered cars but didn't seriously hurt occupants. State police Tuesday afternoon arrested Richard Fosket Ferguson, 64, San Francisco, after an accident at the south city limits of Myrtle Creek. Police said he had apparently tried to pass a Pacific Intermountain Express Co. truck and trailer on a curve. It was operated by Floyd Ivan Harper, 49, Portland. Police reported that Ferguson's car allegedly came alongside the truck and met a string of cars going in the opposite lane. The car apparently cut sharply and hooked the fender of the truck. Then the car went out of control. This was its course. 1. It went over the right shoulder. 2. Hit a concrete shoulder post, knocking it over. 3. Bounced across the highway to the left shoulder and off the road. 4. Jumped a deep ditch. 5. Went through a fence. 6. Rolled over a front porch and steps of a nearby house. Police said the car was probably a total wreck. It was hauled away by Myrtle Creek Body Shop wreckers. Ferguson was charged with being drunk on a public highway and with reckless driving. He was released after payment of \$200 bail. Another accident just north of Roberts Mountain hospitalized Eric Ovelee George, 57, Myrtle Creek, when she also failed to pass successfully. She was taken to Myrtle Creek Hospital by Walt's Ambulance for treatment of multiple lacerations, abrasions and contusions. State police said she was trying to pass a car driven by Francis Gerald Hutson, 35, of Sekiu, Wash. According to the report the George car's fender brushed the Hutson car and went out of control. It banged into a rock bank and turned over on its top. The car was badly damaged. Meanwhile, an empty logging truck driven by Paul Gallagher of Oakland turned over Monday on the Buckhorn Road about four miles east of Dixonville, according to Mrs. Charles Forrest, correspondent. The truck is owned by Lane Mountain Logging Co. Gallagher was not hurt.

### Judge Redding Orders Maloney To Plea Friday

PORTLAND — Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding Tuesday ordered Thomas E. Maloney of Spokane to enter pleas on Friday to indictments charging him with conspiring with a public official to permit illegal gambling in Portland. Maloney, a former Seattle race track clerk, was not in court at the time. His attorney, Robert Clapperton, said Maloney was in Seattle, where he is under subpoena to testify before a King County grand jury investigating activities of Teamster Union officials. The indictment against Maloney accuses him, Joseph P. McLaughlin, Seattle card room operator, and former Dist. Atty. William Langley, with conspiracy to permit gambling. Clapperton failed in his attempt to have the indictments dismissed. In other action in Judge Redding's court three Teamster Union officials filed demurrers to perjury charges against them. They are Lewis Cornelius, secretary of Local 162; Frank P. Malloy, business agent; and Clyde C. Crosby, international representative. Crosby also is accused of false swearing.

WASHINGTON — The government moved with all speed today in an effort to upset a court ruling barring U.S. authorities from turning over GI William S. Girard to Japan for trial on manslaughter charges. All indications pointed to a direct appeal to the Supreme Court, with hopes for a final decision before the court ends its present term next Monday. The final decision on whether to go directly to the Supreme Court rather than going through the U.S. Court of Appeals here rested with Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin. His decision is expected today. Appeal machinery was set in motion within an hour after U.S. Dist. Judge Joseph C. McGarraghy handed down his decision in favor of Girard yesterday afternoon.


### Fires Break Out In 7 Counties Of California

LOS ANGELES — Firemen in three counties manned firelines Wednesday at seven major Southern California fires. Acreage burned totaled more than 7,500. Weary firemen patrolled six blazes which were brought under control Tuesday or during the night. A seventh—near Elsinore, 65 miles southeast of Los Angeles—blazed on out of control. The unchecked fire is in Temescal Canyon, not far from a blaze which was controlled Tuesday after burning across 1,850 acres. The canyon fire has burned 2,500 acres. No homes are menaced. Elsinore, the nearest town, is some 10 miles away. Other fires in the Southern California area: At Conejo Grade, across the Ventura County line from the San Fernando Valley and Los Angeles; 1,000 acres burned. In Griffith Park, Los Angeles, also 1,000 acres. At Barrett Lake, in San Diego County, 500 acres. In Chavez Ravine, only a mile from the Los Angeles City Hall, 400 acres. At El Sereno, northeast of Los Angeles, 300 acres.

### Suez Traffic Resumed After Freighter Grounds

SUEZ, Egypt — Traffic was resumed in the Suez Canal Wednesday after a 12-hour stoppage caused when a British tanker ran aground 25 miles north of Suez. The 10,799-ton "Tribulus" was set free and began moving south followed by 10 ships held up. It was the first major stoppage since the waterway was opened to full-scale traffic April 9, following removal of ships sunk in it during the British-French-Israeli invasion.


