Navy All-Oregon Company Being Formed

Applications for enlistment in a Navy "All-Oregon" company are now being accepted, chief Charles Warren, Roseburg Navy Recruiter, reports.

Men enlisting in the company will take their basic training together at San Diego, Calif. The group will leave Roseburg July 8, to be enlisted in Portland July 10. The company will represent Oregon in competition against mixed companies from all the western states.

Farmers To Vote Today On Quotas

WASHINGTON — Farmers vote Thursday on marketing quotas on the 1958 wheat crop in a referendum that could affect the future of federal crop controls.

The quotas—now in effect for the fourth consecutive wheat crop—require approval of at least two-thirds of the growers voting. Polling places were provided by the Agriculture Department in local areas in the 36 commercial wheat-producing states.

Quotas would limit sales to the amount of wheat grown on a farm's acreage allotment. Excess sales would be subject to a penalty tax of around \$1.05 a bushel.

Wheat farmers have never turned down quotas. In a similar referendum a year ago, 87 per cent voted for them for this year's crop.

A strong factor influencing a favorable vote is the price support program. Should quotas be approved, the national support rate would average about \$1.78 a bushel, but only about \$1.19 should they be rejected. Prices now average about \$2.

It is planned to have about 150 men for the company which will be known as the "Webfoots."

Applications for enlistment in the company have been taken from men living in Roseburg, Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin, Yoncalla and Elkton. A group of five men left Roseburg Wednesday for pre-enlistment processing in Portland. Other groups will leave from time to time until July 5, Chief Warren said. All applications must be in by that date, the chief added.

Qualified high school graduates may select their enlistment branch before enlistment. These include naval aviation, electronics, hospital and dental work, mechanical courses and administrative work. The applicants are assured of the opportunity to attend technical schools in the branch of their choice after completion of basic training, Chief Warren said.

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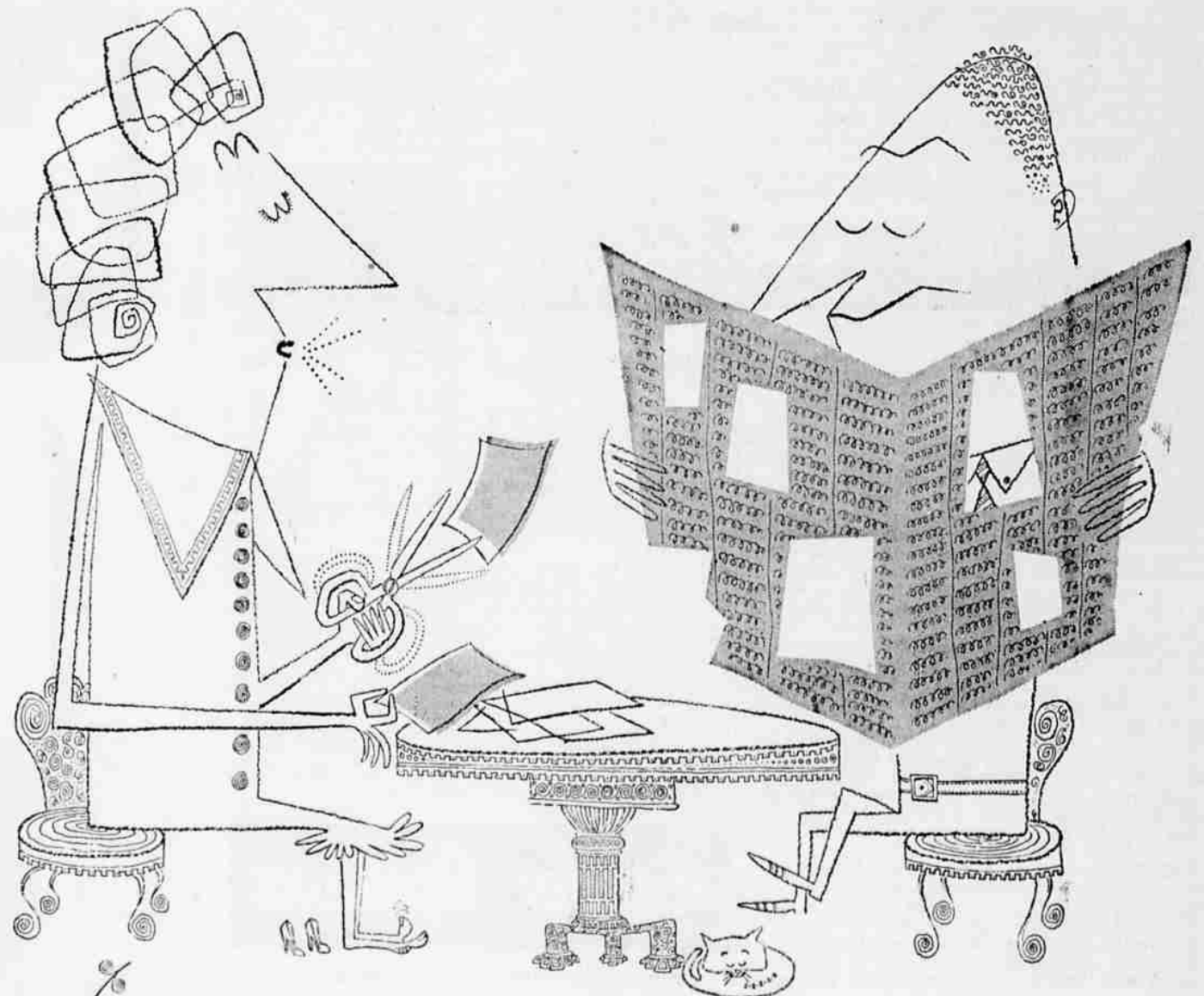
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
