Court Upholds Dismissal Of Power Co. Count

SALEM, Ore. — The Oregon Supreme Court Wednesday upheld a Baker County circuit court dismissal of an indictment against the Idaho Power Co.

A Baker County grand jury had returned an indictment against the company, charging it with beginning illegally a power project without a preliminary state license. The circuit court dismissed this, and the state appealed.

The company had obtained a license from the federal government for dams on the Snake River. Oregon Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton contended that Idaho Power also needed a license from the state of Oregon for the projects.

In his opinion, Chief Justice William C. Perry said "it is unnecessary to cite authority for the long settled proposition that powers granted by the people of the United States to the federal government in the Constitution shall be the supreme law of the land."

ENDS HYDROGEN BLASTS
LONDON, (AP) — Britain Wednesday night announced completion of its hydrogen bomb tests in the Central Pacific with the explosion of a third bomb. As in its two previous H-bomb tests in the Christmas Island area, the third blast of a nuclear device took place at high altitude, the Ministry of Supply announced.

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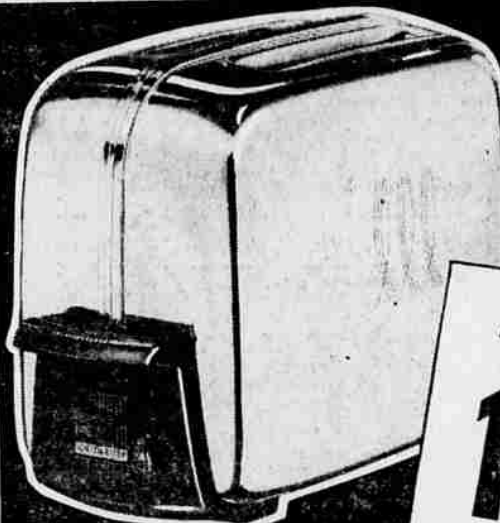
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
