

Nixon Says Communists Must Demonstrate By Deeds Not Words In Peace Effort

PLYMOUTH, Mass. (AP) — Vice President Nixon said Saturday the United States must measure its dealings with Communist nations "by the simple, yet profound, test offered by President Eisenhower: deeds, not words."

"We can hope the Communist world will change," Nixon said. "We would be foolish not to use every opportunity to bring about this change in a peaceful manner... but it would be foolish to substitute the hope for the deed, the word for the act."

"In carrying out our program of waging peace," Nixon continued, "we cannot expect complete certainty and agreement at every step."

Mayor Schunk's Trial In Recess

PORTLAND (AP) — The trial of Mayor Terry Schunk on a charge of lying when he denied that he picked up a bribe Sept. 11, 1955, is in recess until Monday.

Defense witnesses Friday contradicted prosecution testimony about what took place in front of the 8212 Club, an illegal gambling operation, after Schunk, who then was sheriff, had raided the place.

Sheriff's Deputy Edward Grohs said he was with Schunk the entire time that night and that Schunk did not—as prosecution witnesses said he did—cross the street and pick up an envelope containing bribe money placed there by Clifford O. Bennett, operator of the club.

Youth Held On Charge Of Armed Robbery

EUGENE (AP) — Mervin Kenneth Arnold, 21, Friday was arraigned on an armed robbery charge after a service station near Vida was robbed at gun point of \$97.

The Mercury, Calif., man was bound over to a grand jury after he waived a preliminary hearing on the charge. Bail was set at \$7,500.

George Larson, 62, earlier told police he had been robbed when a motorist came into his service station, asked for an oil check, and then pulled a gun.

Man Missing After Wrack Found In Bed At Home

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Sheriff's deputies Friday ended a five-day search for Melvin Groth when they found him in his bed at home.

Deputies said he was in good condition except for badly blistered feet. They said they had no immediate knowledge of how he got to his home from a Monday auto accident near Lakeview, 15 miles away.

Cairo Court Sentences Briton For Spies

CAIRO (AP) — A Cairo court today sentenced two Britons to prison on charges of spying against Egypt. Two others were acquitted.

James Swinburn, accused of masterminding a British spy ring, was given a five-year sentence. James Zarb, who was accused of helping Swinburn in getting information about Soviet arms shipments to Egypt last year, was given a 10-year term.

Charles Pittuck and John Stanley were acquitted.

NATO Commander Thinks Russian Attack Unlikely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Lauris Norstad says it is "most unlikely, if not impossible" that the Soviets would decide to attack free Europe.

Norstad, supreme commander of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), gave this estimate in asking the House Foreign Affairs Committee to continue U.S. arms aid to Western Europe. His June 11 closed-session testimony was made public today after security censorship.

Norstad figured total Russian strength at 20,000 planes and 175 divisions, and he advised a "skeptical" — but not "cynical" — approach to Soviet disarmament proposals because of "past failures of the Russians to keep their commitments."

But he also said the NATO defense warning and airfields system mean the Soviets cannot expect to knock out all fields in one surprise attack, and forces in America and elsewhere would have several hours' time in which to launch a counterblow.

"I think our retaliatory forces are capable of destroying whatever Soviet military targets we must knock out," Norstad said.

The sun was bright and the temperature already in the high 70s, and the forecast was for around 90 degrees later in the day.

Eisenhower spent about 10 minutes practicing iron shots before starting his round. Then he stepped up to the tee to watch Allen's first drive—a grass-cutter which didn't travel very far.

Eisenhower said with a chuckle and a nod toward his opponent: "He had a dream last night. He dreamed he shot a 75."
