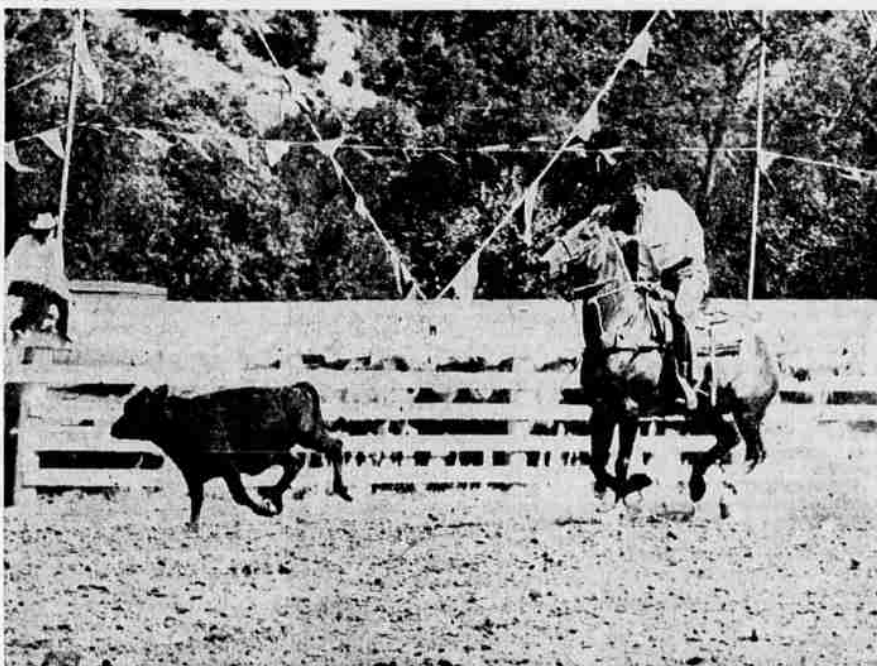


# Rodeo Events, Festivities Caught By Camera

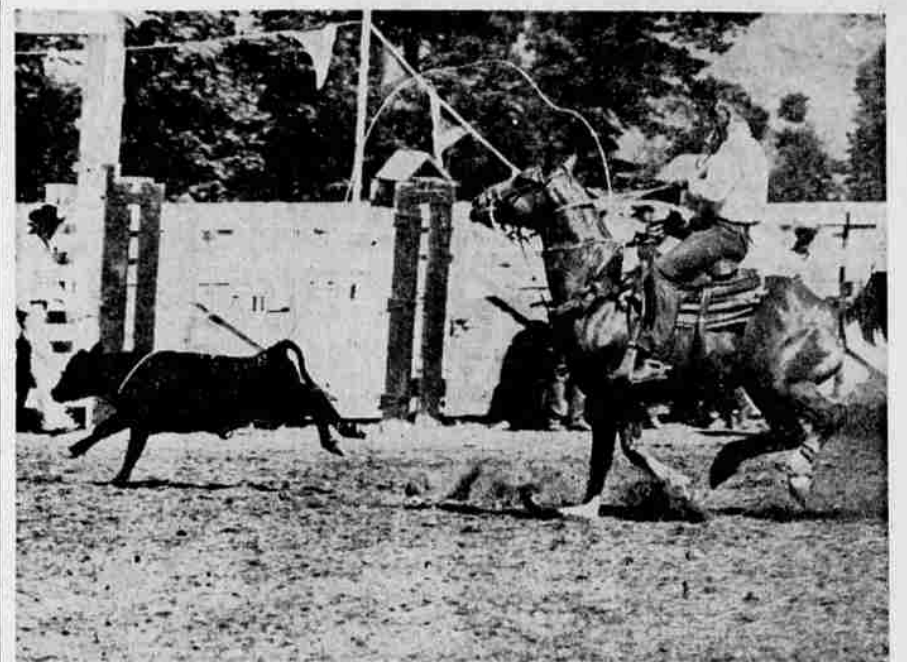
**TRACK**

**FLINT, Mich.** — Paul Harney won the \$37,000 Flint Open with a 72-hole score of 275.

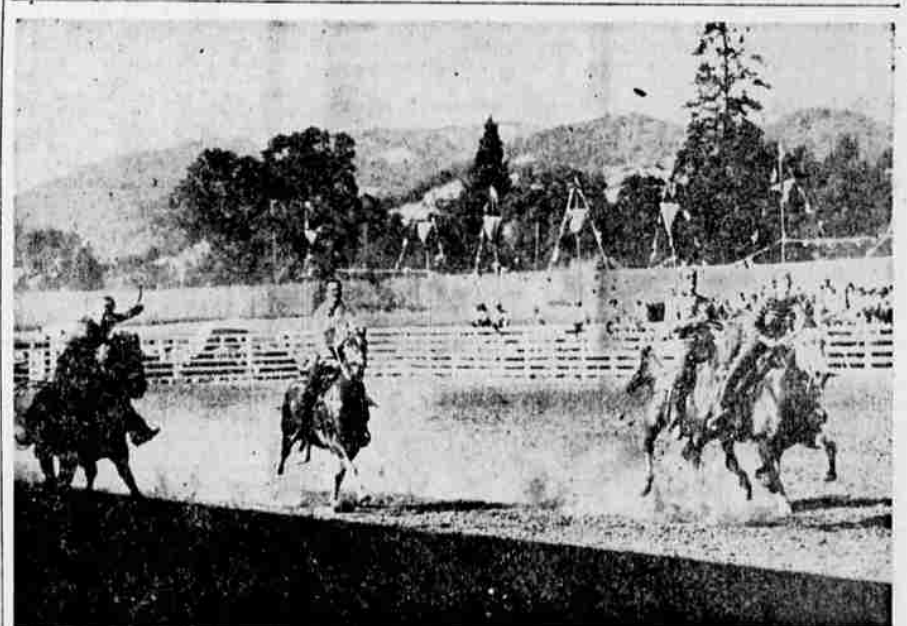

## AUTO RACING

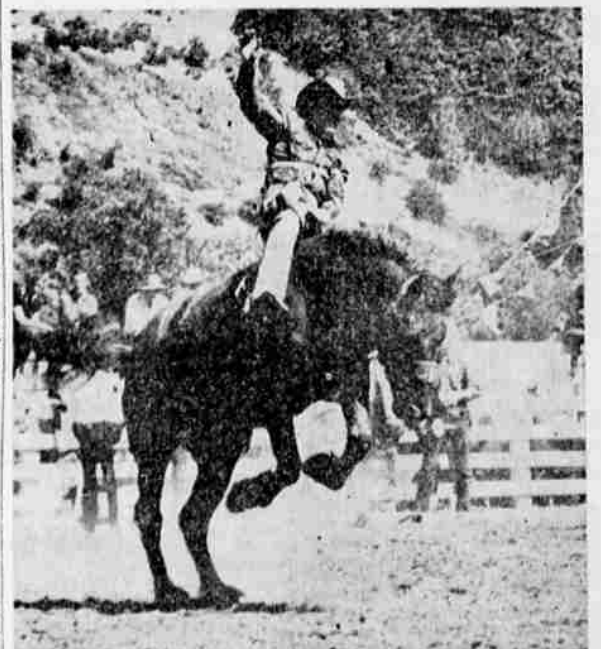
