Chinese Writes Hot Criticism On Communism

HONG KONG — Red China has published a statement by a university lecturer that China's masses do not believe in Communist leadership because "during the past eight years, the Communist Party has been perfidious."

This unprecedented attack on communism was printed in the May 31 and June 8 issues of the authoritative Peking People's Daily, copies of which have just reached Hong Kong.

"To kill Communists and overthrow you (the Communists) cannot be called unpatriotic, because you Communists no longer serve the people," Professor Ko Pei-chi of the People's University wrote to the paper.

This extraordinary attack and others like it make clear there have been serious differences between the Chinese Reds and eight non-Communist minor parties.

Professor Ko said there is a shortage of food and materials, but that Communists still insist that the standard of living is high. Profiteers, he said, are "party members and cadres, who before wore worn-out shoes and who now ride in small sedan cars and wear woolen uniforms."

Ko warned: "It will be very dangerous for the Communist Party if it does not take care of itself."

He added: "Since the Communist Party is unfaithful to me, I am unfaithful to the Communist Party. China belongs to its 600 million people, including counter-revolutionaries. It does not belong to the Communist Party."

Senators Hold Economy Line On Interior Bill

WASHINGTON — The Senate Appropriations Committee Thursday held the economy line of a \$458,252,600 money bill for the Interior Department, Forest Service and some minor government agencies.

The committee, approving the measure, cut some items proposed by the House when it passed the bill, added \$6,700,000 for a mineral purchases program, and came up with a bill only \$3,856,900 above the House-passed measure.

This was \$58,937,100 or about 12 per cent below budget estimates. Funds for the Reclamation Bureau, a major portion of Interior Department expenditures, were not included in this bill. These are in the public works construction bill passed by the House Wednesday.

Bids Called To Build Nuclear Reactor Building

PULLMAN, Wash. — Bids were called Wednesday on construction of a nuclear reactor building at Washington State College, to cost more than \$300,000. The sealed bids will be opened July 10 and submitted to the WSC regents at their meeting July 22. The Atomic Energy Commission recently granted the college \$105,000 to equip four teaching laboratories in the proposed building. Also included will be offices, research laboratories and space for a "swimming pool" type atomic reactor which would be built at a later date.

Grange Masters Take Opposing Views On Dam

SPOKANE — Two Pacific Northwest Grange masters with opposing views on Hells Canyon sat next to each other at a press conference for national Master Herschel B. Newsom Thursday.

W. E. Adams of Eagle, master of the Idaho Grange, said his group opposes a proposed federal high dam on the stretch of the Snake River because it fears the state might lose water rights.

Elmer McClure of Portland, master of the Oregon Grange, said his group favors the high dam because it feels the federal project would produce the most efficient multi-purpose structure.

"But we're still friends," said Adams, and both masters grinned.

Commissioner Upholds Migrant Farm Workers

PORTLAND — Migrant farm workers save much of Oregon's crops and they are entitled to decent living conditions, Norman O. Nilsen, state labor commissioner, said Thursday.

"If it were not for the migrant workers our potatoes and sugar beets would rot in the ground, our fruit would rot on the trees and our berries on the vines," Nilsen told a conference here on migrant labor problems.

Nilsen said that in view of the workers' contributions they should receive fair wages, suitable housing and reasonably continuous employment.

Housing should include a pure water supply, and bathing, cooking and sanitary facilities, he said.

Glen Hardman of Independence, who employs much migrant labor, said he thought the 4 cents a pound offered to strawberry pickers was too low. He said it should have been 7 cents.

Western Pine Assn. Reports Shipments Up

PORTLAND — The Western Pine Assn. reported Thursday that orders, shipments and production of western pine were up last week, compared with the previous week.

But all were down, compared with the same period last year, the association said in its weekly report.

Orders totaled 85,698,000 feet, compared with 74,579,000 feet for the previous week, and 99,028,000 feet for the corresponding week last year. Similar comparisons of shipments were 87,288,000 feet, 80,774,000 feet, and 92,282,000 feet. Production figures were 89,940,000 feet, 83,111,000 feet, and 99,510,000 feet.
