Sutherlin tightened its hold on third place in Cascade League baseball action with a double win over winless Creswell 12-4 and 6-3 in games played at Sutherlin Sunday.

Creswell opened the scoring in the top of the first inning of the opener with a big three-run rally. Bryant walked to open the inning, Zilkoski reached first on an error and Walker tripled to right field. Walker then scored on an error on the Sutherlin third baseman.

After getting two runs in the bottom of the first, Sutherlin denied the plate with five runs in the bottom of the second inning to take a

lead that they held the remainder of the game.

Ayers, who replaced Myers in the lineup, then stole home for the final run of the inning.

Leading batter for Sutherlin in the first game were Carl Bay, with 2-3, including a triple, Avery with 3-4, including a triple, and Arana with 2-4, including a home run.

For Creswell, Walker was leading batter with 2-3, including a triple.

In the seven-inning second game, Creswell jumped into a 2-0 lead in the top of the first on an error and a long home run by Zilkoski, but Sutherlin picked up one in the first and added three more in the third to salt away the win.

Former Duck Hoop Star To Learn To Walk Again

PALO ALTO, Calif. — Bon Peterson, the 1951 University of Oregon basketball player, has spent the past five months in a hospital here encased almost completely in a cast.

When the cast is removed, he will wear a full-length metal brace for an indefinite period of time and will have to learn to walk again.

Peterson, now 25, lost the use of his legs in an operation to correct a painful back injury which occurred in 1955 when he was knocked to the floor in a professional basketball game.

His hospital bills are being paid by the California Compensation Fund. It also is giving him \$40 a week to help support his wife and their two small children.

Bauer Charges Being Probed By Grand Jury

NEW YORK — A New York County grand jury Monday began an investigation of the night club incident in which Yankee outfielder Hank Bauer is charged with beating a delicatessen store operator.

Bauer was charged with felonious assault by Edwin Jones, 42, who claims he suffered a broken nose and other injuries in an attack at the Copacabana night club May 16. Bauer has denied he hit the man.

Bauer and five other baseball players went to the criminal courts building to testify before the grand jury.

Bauer was accompanied by his wife, Charlene, and his lawyer. The other players were Whitey Ford, Mickey Mantle, Yogi Berra, Johnny Kucks and Billy Martin.

The Yankee players were at the Copacabana the night of May 16 to celebrate Martin's 29th birthday.

Bauer waived a hearing in magistrate's court Friday and elected to have the grand jury investigate the case. As he was leaving the courthouse, Jones' attorney served the ballplayer with a summons in a suit seeking \$250,000 damages from Bauer and the night club.

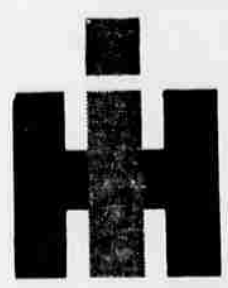
