Cost Of Living Again Goes Up Records Show

WASHINGTON — The cost of living rose three-tenths of 1 percent in May to its ninth consecutive record high, the Labor Department reported Tuesday.

The increase, combined with a shorter work week, resulted in a drop of one-half of 1 percent in the real earnings of factory workers last month, the department's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) reported.

Almost one million workers will receive wage boosts under union-management contracts gearing pay scales to the consumer price index.

Some 750,000 men and women in the metals industries—steel, iron mining, aluminum, and metal containers—qualified for 4-cent hourly increases under their semi-annual cost-of-living adjustments; 115,000 meat packing workers won 3-cent hourly increases; 83,000 aircraft workers gained 2 cents under their contracts, which are adjusted quarterly; and 22,000 additional aircraft workers gained one cent an hour.

The consumer price index last month stood at 119.6 percent of the 1947-49 average, or 3.6 points above a year ago.

The average of prices paid by city families, as measured by BLS, has risen steadily in each of the last 15 months with the exception of last August.

BLS Commissioner Ewan Glavin told reporters the index probably is still rising this month because food prices normally rise at this season of the year. It may level off in July, he said, and may show some dip in August because of the harvest-time drop in foodstuff prices.

Food prices advanced seven-tenths of 1 percent between April and May. If these were omitted from the index, Glavin said, the cost of living would have shown no change for the month.

Commodity prices dropped four-tenths of 1 percent while the price of services—housing, transportation, medical care, laundry, repairs and the like—rose an offsetting four-tenths of 1 percent.

High Winds Whip Alaskan Blazes

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — High winds are whipping fires over an estimated 500,000 acres of forest land in the interior of Alaska, Russ Hanson, district fire dispatcher here, reported Monday.

Largest of the fires is a 100,000-acre blaze near Sleetmute, 225 miles north of Anchorage. It is burning along a 10-mile front and the winds have been spreading it over more than 1,000 acres an hour.

An attempt to fly in firefighting tools to Katagot on the Yukon River some 350 miles northwest of Anchorage failed because the smoke of a fire there was so great a landing could not be made.

Near McGrath, 300 miles northwest of Anchorage, a number of fires cover 170,000 acres.

More than 30 fires are reported in the Fairbanks area, largest being a 50,000-acre blaze near Beaver Creek.

Hanson said no relief is in sight as the hot, dry weather and high winds continue in the territory.

Card Dealer Tells Of Try To Get Gambler To Help Beat Schunk For Mayor

PORTLAND — A card dealer, employed at one of the gambling clubs backed by racketeer Big Jim Elkins, testified Monday he heard another gambler directed to come here from Great Falls, Mont., to help beat Terry Schunk in his race for mayor.

Schunk is on trial on a perjury charge in circuit court. He has labeled the whole affair a frame-up by gamblers.

State attorneys protested strongly when Tom Board, blackjack dealer, said that at Great Falls, he overheard Raymond Clark, an Elkins employee, tell Clifford O. Bennett, a gambler financed by Elkins, to come here and help against Schunk.

Despite the state objection that this was hearsay, Circuit Judge James W. Crawford allowed it to stand.

Board said he, Clark, Bennett, and a couple of other men he didn't know, were in Clark's home at Great Falls at the time.

Doctor Optimistic Over Arthritis Cure

TORONTO — A New York doctor has expressed "optimistic, guarded enthusiasm" over the effectiveness of triamcinolone in the treatment of rheumatoid arthritis. Triamcinolone is the newest member of a group of synthetic drugs developed from cortisone. Its chief advantage was said to be that it gives any more relief than drugs such as cortisone, but that it gives the same relief without many of the undesirable side-effects.

Dr. Richard H. Freyberg reported on the new drug Monday at the ninth International Congress on Rheumatic Diseases. Delegates were told the drug does not cause retention of sodium, which puts patients receiving cortisone on a low-salt diet, and it does not cause weakening of the bones.

Dr. Freyberg estimated that triamcinolone would be effective in treating 75 per cent of chronic rheumatic cases.

Comptroller Issues Call For Statements Of Banks

WASHINGTON — The comptroller of the currency Tuesday issued a call for a statement of the condition of all national banks at the close of business Thursday, June 6.

The Federal Reserve Board issued a similar call for state banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. called for statements from insured banks which are not covered by either the comptroller's or the Reserve Board's request for condition statements.

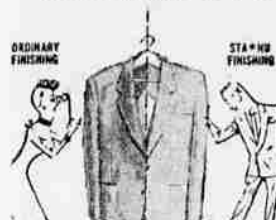
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
