## Bob Feller Makes Pitch For Big League Players

WASHINGTON (AP)—Bob Feller, who set major league strikeout records while fastballing for the Cleveland Indians, makes a different kind of pitch today for big league ballplayers.

Feller, now retired from baseball, goes before a House antitrust subcommittee to tell about changes he thinks should be made in baseball operations.

In advance of his testimony, Feller told newsmen he favors putting baseball under the antitrust laws but with stipulated exemptions.

He would exempt the contract reserve clause binding a player to the club that first signs him and also territorial rights which protect a club from encroachment on the area in which its franchise is located.

Feller recommended, however, a maximum of about five years on the duration of a reserve clause. At the end of that period a player could negotiate for himself.

Robin Roberts, Philadelphia Phillies pitcher; Eddie Yost, Washington Senators' third baseman; and Jerry Coleman, New York Yankees infielder, all said at yesterday's hearing the reserve clause is essential to baseball.

Their argument was this: Throwing all players on the market every year would disrupt the sport and enable wealthy clubs to corral the best men. And it would discourage a club from scouting for talent since after developing a potential big leaguer it could lose him to a higher bidder.

Roberts said the majors ought to consider a four-year limit on the clause as proposed by Rep. MacDonald (D-Mass.). But he said it's a boost to club morale for a player to stay with one organization and feel he "belongs."

Yost said some good might come from limiting the effect of the clause but questioned any period less than 10 years.

Coleman opposed any limit on the clause. He said most players accept it as "a calculated risk."

## Oregon Golfers Score 242 At NCAA Meet

COLORADO SPRINGS (AP)—The University of Oregon golf team, led by Bob Prall of Salem, had a 242 score for the first half of the 36-hole qualifying round in the NCAA golf tournament here Monday.

Prall posted 38-40-78. Chuck Huggins had 41-40-81, and Duane Sandberg 42-41-83.

Sunday Prall helped the West win a 6½-5½ victory over the East in the annual NCAA best ball match. Prall played with Ernie George of San Jose State against Jack Freeman of Marshall College and Warren Simmons of Syracuse.

The score was 55-5½ when Prall and George finished with a 1-up victory and the deciding point for the West.

Monday the NCAA Golf Coaches Assn. elected Sid Milligan, University of Oregon coach, vice president.

## Hank Bauer Plans To Sue Store Owner

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Bauer, New York Yankee outfielder and an ex-Marine, planned to take the legal offensive Tuesday against charges he slugged a festive bowler in a New York night spot.

Sidney O. Friedman, Bauer's lawyer, said Monday Bauer would sue the delicatessen owner who caused his arrest for "compensatory and punitive damages." And he may start another action for "malicious prosecution," said Friedman.

The lawyer disclosed the rugged outfielder's plans after Bauer fared better with a New York County grand jury than he did with the management of his own ball club.

The grand jury heard 15 witnesses testify on the charges against Bauer, 34, in a two-hour session. Then it voted "no bill," throwing the case out of court.

Edwin Jones, 42, charged the outfielder, who looks as though he were carved out of granite, with felonious assault. He claimed his nose was broken in a washroom fight at the Copacabana night club May 16. Jones was with a party celebrating the end of a bowling season.

When Yankee President Dan Topping heard the fight story several weeks ago, he fined Bauer \$1,000. Five other Yankees at the night club also were fined a total of \$4,500.

The five others testified before the grand jury. They were pitchers Whitey Ford and Johnny Kuck, catcher Yogi Berra and outfielder Mickey Mantle, Billy Martin, infielder since traded to Kansas City, also appeared.

"Mr. Jones now is automatically liable to Mr. Bauer for damages for false arrest," Friedman said after the decision was announced. "He intends to hold Mr. Jones to strict responsibility for the unwarranted arrest. The question is how much damages Mr. Bauer is entitled to."

"Now Hank can relax and play baseball."

## Contract Reserve Clause Essential, Players Say

WASHINGTON (AP)—Three big league players said Monday baseball's contract reserve clause—or something to accomplish the same purpose—is essential to the game.

The defense of a key element in the professional baseball system came from Robin Roberts, the Philadelphia Phillies' great right handed pitcher, Eddie Yost, veteran Washington Senators' third baseman, and Jerry Coleman, infielder for the world champion New York Yankees.

The three stars, on an 11-day from the ballfield, were the center of attention in the high-walled hearing room of the House Antitrust subcommittee.

They testified as player representatives in the subcommittee's investigation of the legal status of baseball and other pro sports enterprises.

Before they were called, a former big league pitcher, who spent most of his career shuttling back and forth among minor teams, declared club owners "are brutal the way they handle ball players," especially in the minor leagues.

James Prendergast, now a Buffalo, N. Y., brewery salesman, said he believed players in the lower leagues regarded the reserve clause as "a weapon" for use by club owners.

The clause binds a player to the club that first signs him.

Roberts, Yost and Coleman—at ease in the sedate surroundings—said the contract provision has benefited the game.

## Anderson Withdrawn From Meet By Injury

EUGENE (AP)—Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman said Tuesday that Dave Edstrom, star of the university's frosh track squad, will be the only University of Oregon entrant in the national decathlon championships at Kingsburg, Calif., this weekend.

Steve Anderson, who had been entered, was withdrawn because of a pulled muscle, Bowerman said. He added that the injury was not believed serious.

Edstrom, from Sherwood, is capable of making "a very representative score for a freshman" in the decathlon, Bowerman said.

## Sugar Ray, IBC Still At Odds

NEW YORK (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson and the International Boxing Club still were at odds Tuesday over the terms for a proposed middleweight title bout with Carmen Basilio.

Robinson met with IBC officials Monday and demanded 45 per cent of the gate.

"We simply cannot pay over 65 per cent total of the two fighters," said IBC Managing Director Harry Markson. "We already have agreed to give Basilio 25 per cent."

## Pat McMurty Takes Fight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Irish Pat McMurty of Tacoma, the National Boxing Assn.'s ninth-ranked heavyweight, danced and jabbed his way to a unanimous, 10-round decision over veteran Howard King of Reno Monday night.

McMurty, who showed very little to enhance his high ranking among the world's heavyweights, piled up points in the early going with a flicking left jab. King was never in trouble.

The Nevada veteran opened up on the youthful McMurty in the ninth round and belted Irish Pat to the head with a series of left and right combinations.

Referee Frankie Carter saw it 96-95 for McMurty; Judge Jack Silver scored it 97-94 and Judge Eddie James had the Irishman in front 99-95 under the California 10-man system of scoring.

It was the 25th victory in 27 professional fights for McMurty, who has lost once and drew once.

The Tacoma fighter came in at 187 pounds, King at 192.

## Milwaukee Braves, Hobbled By Injuries, Meet Dodgers

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The Milwaukee Braves, hobbled by the loss of power hitting first baseman Joe Adcock, today faced the prospect of three games with the Brooklyn Dodgers without the slick fielding and robust bat work of Red Schoendienst.

Schoendienst, at 307 one of only three .300 or better hitters in the Milwaukee lineup, retired from the action last night as the Braves were defeated 10-4 by the Philadelphia Phillies, fourth in the National League. The loss dropped the Braves from second to third.

Second baseman Schoendienst, acquired from the New York Giants in a three-for-one trade 10 days ago, wrenched his hip before the game when he tripped and tumbled into the dugout. He stayed on through the fifth, collecting one hit in three trips, but finally had to call it a night.

"All I know is that pain shot through me when I twisted around to swing," the veteran Schoendienst said. "And I couldn't even move my toes out in the field."

Trainer Robert Feron said it "was highly doubtful" Red would be ready for the three-game series opening with the defending champion Dodgers tonight in County Stadium.

"There's a possibility he may not see any action against Brooklyn," Feron said. He explained: "He had rather heat treatment for the 34-year-old Schoendienst and taped up his hip 'to keep it in place.'"

Schoendienst was hurt just one day after Adcock broke his right leg sliding into second base. The first baseman will be lost to the club for six to eight weeks.

Reliever Dave Jolly was hit on the right leg by a line drive off Granny Hamner's bat last night, and the severe bruise will keep the right-hander on the sidelines at least until tomorrow.

Frank Torre, first base replacement for Adcock, also is nursing a pulled thigh muscle. He was replaced last night by starting catcher Del Crandall, who played some first base about seven years ago.

## Fisher Says NFLA Attention Turned To 'Hard Money' At Meeting Of Committee

Eugene Fisher of Elkton, chairman of the National Farm Loan Assn. advisory committee, said today the spotlight of the committee in its annual meeting this month was on the present "hard money" condition of the economy.

He related that the matter was discussed at some length at the meeting in Washington, D. C. "The cost of money is one of the matters of greatest concern to our agricultural people," Fisher said. "We are the one segment of the economy which is not in a position to pay the additional cost. But we have been forced to increase our interest rates."

Fisher was re-elected chairman of the committee. He represented the Spokane, Wash., district of the NFLA.

Other matters discussed at the meeting June 5 and 6 were improvement of service to member farmers and ranchers of the cooperative credit system, costs and field patterns, credit life insurance and cooperation between Production Credit Assn. and NFLA. The committee also met with the National Farm Credit board and discussed possible legislation to improve the farm credit system.

While in Washington, Fisher also met with Oregon Rep. Charles O. Porter and Sen. Wayne Morse. Through the efforts of Laura Olson, assistant to Porter and former News-Review reporter, Fisher's wife and daughter, Janet, received special passes to tour the White House.

Other officers elected at the meeting were Joseph H. Warren of Prospect Hill, N. C., vice chairman; and J. E. Storm of Gridley, Calif., secretary.

On the return trip to Elkton, Fisher and his family toured the South. He said he was impressed with the movement of industry from the Northeast to the South. He said the South has made efforts to lure industry. "We must do the same thing here," he concluded.

Fisher is a member of the Douglas County association of the NFLA. Association headquarters is in Roseburg.

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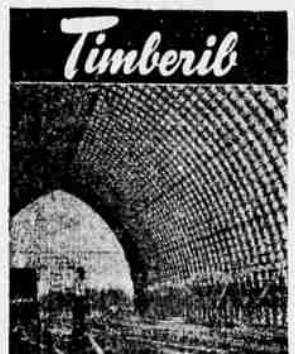
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
