

Timber Cruise Under Way In Northwest Area

A timber cruise to survey outdated boundary lines and determine new boundaries in a 765.7-acre section of northwestern Douglas County is being made by county court order.

The county has hired Gene Johnson to complete the cruise by July 15. At that time the county can complete its contract with E. G. Whipple and Jim S. Whipple of Drain for sale of the timber stand.

The original contract between the county and the Whipples was made Feb. 3, 1949, when the two men acquired the holdings by auction. The lands were originally foreclosed because of delinquent taxes.

Location of the tracts is a few miles southeast of Yoncalla, south of Billy Creek and northeast of Yellow Butte.

School Children To Get Second Shots For Polio

School children from five communities will receive their second shots of the Salk vaccine series Friday and early next week from the county health department.

Dr. Mary Soules, public health officer will administer the shots at the new primary school building at Canyonville Friday from 2 to 4 p.m. Other clinics scheduled are at Riddle elementary school, July 2 from 10 to 11:30 a.m., and Days Creek school for children from Days Creek and Tiller 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. On July 3 the clinic will be at the Camas Valley school from 10 to 11 a.m.

Shots are administered free to children up to 19 years old. The series includes three shots.

Bankers Asked To Help Cure Lumber Ailment

PORTLAND (AP) — A leading lumber company executive called on Oregon bankers Tuesday to help cure the industry's ailments. Owen R. Cheatham, president of Georgia-Pacific Corp., asked the bankers to discourage the present overproduction of lumber and plywood and encourage research and development of new products in the industry.

Cheatham said unless present overproduction is curtailed, it could be detrimental to Oregon's economic health in the next year or two.

He recommended financial aid for small, sound lumber operators and understanding by the bankers of long-term problems of timber ownership.

While emphasizing problems of present overproduction, he said the demand in the next 20 years will bring a "golden age" to Oregon timber industries. The growing need for housing will be a major factor in this, he said.

Cheatham spoke at the Oregon Bankers Assn. convention, which closes Tuesday night.

Soil, Water Management Division Being Set Up

PORTLAND (AP) — A soils, water and watershed management division is being established July 1 in the Forest Service's Pacific Northwest region.

In making the announcement Tuesday, J. Herbert Stone, regional forester, explained its creation was because of complex problems resulting from "increased use of forest and range for production of wood, water, forage, wildlife and recreation."

He said these problems will be studied by the Forest Service organization and in co-operation with others.

Kenneth W. Lindstedt, regional fire control chief for the past eight years, will head the new division. He will be replaced by Alfred E. Spaulding, present fire control chief in the northern regional office at Missoula, Mont.

Local Insurance Agent Wins Trip To Seattle

Chou Paints Bright Economic Picture For Red China

HONG KONG (AP) — Premier Chou En-lai painted a bright picture Wednesday of Red China's economic outlook.

Production, wages and purchasing power all are rising, he declared in a speech to Parliament broadcast by Radio Peiping. But some fields are still operating in the red.

He gave this picture: Steel output under the first five-year plan (1953-1958) will total 16,300,000 tons, or more than double the amount produced in China in 49 years prior to Communist control of the mainland.

Steel, cotton yarn and cloth production recorded increases greater than the combined rises of the previous three years and work was begun on jet aircraft, heavy motor vehicles and high capacity power generators.

Gains were made in the past year, despite natural disasters affecting land areas supporting 73 million persons. The biggest toll came from floods.

Industrial output of 1957 will be 220 per cent and the agricultural output will be 126 per cent of those of 1952.

The Soviet Union supplied designs and equipment for 156 projects, Chou did not describe the Soviet-backed projects, but he said more than 5,000 miles of railway construction will be completed by the end of the five-year plan this year.

Though reporting a greater achievement in 1956 than in previous years, Chou admitted there had been "some faults."

These included overspending of 1½ to two billion yuan on capital construction, taking on too many new employees and raising wages too much in some cases and enrolling too many students in schools.

MEASURE PASSES

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed by a voice vote here a bill exempting Klamath County, Ore., from repaying of federal expenditures for education of Indian children. The measure now goes to the Senate.

Oregon's Suicide Rate At Record Low In 1956

PORTLAND (AP) — The state Board of Health reported Tuesday that Oregon's 1956 suicide rate was a record low.

There were 205 suicides, a rate of 11.8 per 100,000 population. The previous low was 12.1 in 1917.

However, the national rate last year was estimated at 9.7, and the board said Oregon traditionally has one of the nation's worst suicide rates. In 1954, the last year for which national figures are available, only Washington, Idaho, Nevada and Vermont had higher rates.

The board also noted that spring is the worst season for Oregon suicides, and that four times as many men take their lives as do women.

HEAD FOR GIBRALTAR

VALLETTA, Malta (AP) — The Soviet cruiser Mikhail Kutusov and two escort destroyers which sailed through the Bosphorus into the Mediterranean last week are steaming toward Gibraltar, The Times of Malta reported Tuesday.
