Proposed Patterson-Rademacher Fight Termed 'Gross Mismatch'

SPOKANE — The proposed Floyd Patterson-Rademacher fight in Seattle was branded "a gross mismatch" Tuesday by a member of the State Athletic Commission who said he wouldn't allow it in this part of Washington. The Commission has approved the match by a 2-1 vote for the week of Aug. 19 in Sick's baseball park.

"I love Pete as a great Olympic champion and I may be wrong but I don't think he could go four fast rounds now with Amas Lincoln, let alone Patterson," said Anthony Felice, eastern Washington commissioner.

Lincoln, an unranked bologn-punching Portland heavyweight, has made a hit here with a whirlwind style and some comical antics, mostly as a preliminary boy.

"I definitely would not approve a Patterson-Rademacher fight in my jurisdiction," Felice said when asked for comment on the bout. "It is a gross mismatch. I don't think I have to explain that any further."

Dr. Charles Larson of Tacoma, the chairman, said the commission is "like warm" on the bout and reluctantly agreed to it. Wilbert Lewis of Seattle is the other member of the three-man commission.

Felice said that his opposition to it actually had no bearing since only the western Washington commissioners had to approve.

He said Promoter Jack Hurley first told commissioners that he was considering Rademacher for Patterson at a June 11 meeting in Olympia.

"I told Jack then that I didn't think much of it," he said. "But I will say that Hurley, who knows his boxing, is convinced that Rademacher has the size and the style to make a fight of it."

Felice, an attorney and a welterweight on the Gonzaga University boxing team from 1940 to 1945, said he formed his opinions of Rademacher after seeing him fight for Washington State College and watching films of his Olympic Games matches. Rademacher has never had a professional fight but his backers in Georgia have put up \$250,000 for Patterson to get the title match.

The bout is contingent on Patterson retaining the crown in a fight next month with Tommy Jackson.

Felice conceded the Patterson-Rademacher match "excites my imagination" and that he thought Hurley would draw close to a full house. Would Felice attend?

"Despite what I say and believe, I wouldn't miss it for the world."

House Committee Studies 'Invasion'

WASHINGTON — A House subcommittee studying sports legislation hears today from some key figures on the big question of when — or whether — the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Giants will move to the West Coast.

Dodgers President Walter O'Malley and Giant President Horace Stoneham were called to give the basic story.

The subcommittee probing the legal status of professional team sports, began yesterday to assemble a picture of what the baseball world would look like after a Dodger-Giant migration.

Warren Giles, president of the National League, repeated essentially what Commissioner Ford Frick told the subcommittee last week: there are still many problems to be solved; nobody now knows definitely whether the Dodgers and Giants finally will decide to move.

Giles gave some clues as to how an ocean-to-ocean league might operate.

Mileage traveled would more than double—to 218,300 miles. The 2,500-mile hops would have to be by plane. The extra cost to each club would be \$35,000. To break even would require drawing 125,000 more people in Los Angeles and San Francisco than were drawn in Brooklyn and New York.

Giles said the question of damage to the Pacific Coast League clubs would have to be settled by arbitration if voluntary agreements were not reached, with the "invading" clubs picking up the bill.

Easterners Would Block Boxing Match

NEW YORK — The shock of the proposed Floyd Patterson-Peter Rademacher heavyweight title fight in Seattle, Wash., was beginning to wear off today and from here on it appears that boxing bigwigs will do all they can to block it.

Rademacher, the Olympic heavyweight champion, never has fought professionally, and even Cus D'Amato, Patterson's unpredictable manager, admits the idea is "fantastic."

But he is determined to go through with it, assuming Patterson licks Hurricane Jackson in the first defense of his title July 29. He has been guaranteed \$250,000 for the match.

The first positive action came from Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission and — more important — newly elected president of the World Championship Boxing Committee.

"I'm utterly astounded that D'Amato would be even thinking of making such a match," said Helfand.

He said he had written a letter to Floyd Stevens, president of the National Boxing Assn.

It is obvious that Helfand minced no words condemning the bout in his letter to Stevens. Washington is a member of the NBA and Stevens is a position to tell the Washington commission that the national organization opposes the bout. The NBA, incidentally, recently rejoined the World Championship Boxing Committee, so Helfand's ideas will get a careful hearing.

Hogan (Kid) Bassey 'Fighter Of Month'

NEW YORK — Hogan (Kid) Bassey, the newly crowned featherweight champion and the first Nigerian to hold a world boxing title, Wednesday was named Ring Magazine's "Fighter of the Month."

Bassey's knockout of the favored Cherif Hamia of France in their title fight Monday also dropped the Frenchman to the role of No. 1 contender as New York's Ike Chestnut climbed to second with his victory over Kid Anahuac of Mexico.

Among the heavyweights, Roy Harris' defeat of Willie Pastrano moved the Cut and Shoot, Texas, lad into sixth place behind champion Floyd Patterson. Pastrano dipped from No. 3 to No. 5. Pat McMurry of Tacoma is 10th.

Mortgage On Home Paid Off By Fans

EUGENE — Dave Hefer watched the Eugene Emeralds defeat the Portland Beavers Monday night, 4-2, in an exhibition baseball game that was played for him.

Hefer is the sheriff's deputy who was seriously wounded in a gun battle last February. He has been paralyzed since and viewed the game from a stretcher. Enough fans—3,400—turned out or bought tickets in advance, to pay off the mortgage on Hefer's home. That was the goal of a committee which arranged the benefit.

The Emeralds put their victory safely away with four runs in the sixth inning, three of them on Don Frailey's bases-loaded triple. He scored the fourth run himself on an outfield fly. Norm Tanner won the game with a six-hitter. The Senators clubbed out 13 hits in downing the reinforced Broncos.
