

Court-Martial Is Set Aside

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP)—The court-martial conviction of an 18-year-old Marine who refused to bear arms has been set aside by the commanding general of Camp Pendleton.

Maj. Gen. Reginald H. Ridgely Jr. ordered the charge of willful disobedience against Pvt. Peter H. Green dismissed Wednesday and assigned the youth, who claims the status of a conscientious objector, to noncombatant duty.

Gen. Ridgely tossed out the conviction on the grounds that at the time the order to bear arms was issued, Green's status as a conscientious objector had not been officially determined.

The Evanston, Ill., youth, a Methodist, had the wide support of his church in his stand.

Green's father Harold E. Green, vice president and executive editor of Printers Ink Magazine, came out from Evanston to fight for his son's release after the court-martial.

Girl's Body Found; Youth Held After Confessing Slaying

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The body of pretty 10-year-old Shirley Alice Kyle was found half a mile from her home on the north edge of Kansas City early today and police arrested a 15-year-old neighbor boy they said had confessed to the slaying.

Salvatore Joseph Falbo, who has a record of molesting children, was picked up in Kansas City after an intensive man hunt through the night.

Detective Verda Reynolds of the homicide squad said young Falbo admitted he killed the young girl.

Authorities said his record of sex offenses goes back to 1934 and he has been under the care of psychiatrists. He was described as 6 feet tall and about 200 pounds.

Shirley was about 4½ feet tall and weighed about 60 pounds.

Her body was hidden in the tall grass and underbrush of a ravine near the suburb of Hamilton Heights, north across the Missouri River and about six miles from downtown Kansas City.

Her green shorts and striped shirt were partly torn away. Dr. O. S. Pate, Clay County coroner, said that an autopsy indicated she was suffocated. He said that apparently an attempt had been made to rape her.

A throng of 200 searchers had hunted almost six hours after her mother reported her missing at 7:30 p.m.

Deputy Sheriff John Pitts said an 11-year-old neighbor girl, Carol Clark, told him Shirley and a boy walked off toward a ravine after he asked Shirley to come in to the wood with him because he wanted to show her something. Carol said she started to follow but the boy told her to go back.

O & C Counties Intend To Fight Ruling On Fee

EUGENE (AP)—Lane County said Wednesday that the Association of Oregon and California Counties intends to fight a recent court decision which would grant a "substantial" legal fee to A. W. Lafferty, Portland.

Nielsen said the executive committee of the association at a meeting Tuesday in Portland voted to go to the Supreme Court of the United States in resisting the claim.

Lafferty and Richard Merriek, Washington, D.C., had filed suit against the counties in which O&C lands are located, seeking legal fees for a long court fight for distribution of seven million dollars held by the federal government.

The two claim they were responsible for the ultimate distribution of the money to the 18 Western Oregon counties involved. When the money, which was held back from timber sale receipts, was distributed several years ago, \$600,000 was set aside until the matter of legal fees was settled.

Recently the federal Court of Appeals ruled that Lafferty is entitled to a fee, the size of which would be set by a federal District Court in Eugene.

Nielsen said the executive committee instructed its attorneys Tuesday to apply to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari.

This would permit the Supreme Court to consider the record in the case. Matters of jurisdiction are also involved in such a writ.

900 Civilian Employees Protest Closing Terminal

SEATTLE (AP)—Several hundreds of the Seattle Army Terminal's 900 civilian employees last night joined in protesting the closing of the terminal, calling it false economy.

The group said the closing ordered recently by the Army, should be held up until an impartial study of its costs, compared with other terminals, is made.

They said in a telegram to officials in Washington that "cargo and passenger handling costs at the Seattle Army Terminal are the lowest on the West Coast."

Numerous Seattle groups already have expressed opposition to the change, claiming it resulted from pressure by California interests.

Boeing To Shift Work On Bombers

SEATTLE (AP)—The Boeing Airplane Co. Wednesday announced plans to shift construction of B52 jet bombers at its Wichita, Kans., plant and concentrate military work here on the building of the Bomarc guided missile.

A Boeing statement said the plan, described as an economy measure, already "approved in principle" by the Air Force, will go into effect in about one year, with the start of work on an improved model, the B52G, of the massive swept-wing bomber.

With the change, Seattle division facilities will be used for "support work" in building the B52, for jet transport construction and for work on the Bomarc pilotless interceptor, recently ordered into production here, the company said.

The statement said despite the cutback, employment here is expected to remain at a high level. No major layoffs are planned, the company said, and any reduction of personnel will be accomplished by nonreplacement of persons leaving in the normal turnover.

Nations In Agreement On Hungarian Issue

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The United States and 23 other nations are in unanimous agreement that the U. N. General Assembly should take up the special U. N. report on the Hungarian revolt as soon as practicable.

A five-nation U. N. investigating committee reported June 29 that the Soviet Union brutally suppressed a spontaneous uprising of the Hungarian people last fall and now keeps an unpopular government in power by force.

Some diplomats favor holding a special session to deal with the report a week or two before the regular Assembly session scheduled for Sept. 17.
