Idaho Governor Objects To High Dam In Canyon

SUN VALLEY, Idaho — The fight over Hells Canyon dam was injected this week into the annual convention of the National Association of Attorneys General.

Mentioning the controversial project on the Snake River, along the Idaho-Oregon border, Idaho's Lt. Gov. J. Berkeley Larsen said: "We don't want a federal Hells Canyon dam. We are fearful that it would be ruled over by some federal bureaucrat."

Larsen said the "mighty Snake River" provided Idaho with one of its most important resources, water. "We have neighbor states, both on the south and west, who would like to appropriate those waters," he said. "We're jealous of this water, and we intend to guard it with our lives if necessary."

Potato Surplus, Price May Cause Bid For Aid

WASHINGTON — The lowly spud appears to be headed for price troubles that may again win government help.

Carry-over supplies of potatoes from last year's late crop have been competing with this year's new crop for consumer markets. The result has been a drop in prices to the lowest level for this time of year since 1941 and only about half of the prices of a year ago.

As a consequence, supplies in the months ahead are expected to be larger than market requirements. Agriculture Department officials expect grower appeals for a program under which a part of the supply would be diverted into livestock feed, starch and other by-product uses. Under similar program in the past, the department has offered payments on potatoes diverted from food markets.

Corvallis Man Succumbs To Accident Injuries

SALEM — Floyd Spurlin, 75, Corvallis, died early Tuesday at a Salem hospital from injuries suffered in an auto accident here June 14.

He was admitted to the hospital suffering from broken ribs and head lacerations, the hospital reported. He was the 13th traffic fatality in Marion County this year. Spurlin was the owner of a hardware store in Corvallis. Survivors include his widow and a daughter.
