That "hot" National League pennant race of last year begins to look like a "runaway" compared to what's going on these days, with no less than six teams scraping and no more than 10 percentage points separating the first four.

The whole league exploded under the pressure yesterday in what was exciting, if not brilliant, baseball—with 20 home runs, one shy of the major league record for a five-game day, 125 hits and 90 runs off 35 pitchers. Of the hits, 53 were for extra bases.

After the shelling, the St. Louis Cardinals retained first place by four points over the Cincinnati Reds. Both were beaten. Third-

place Philadelphia, half a game behind, walloped the Cards 11-3; and the Redlegs were clobbered 17-7 by the sixth-place New York Giants, the latest club to declare itself "in" on the pennant fight.

Braves Beat Bums
The fourth-place Milwaukee Braves, also half a game back and within two points of the Phillies, battered Brooklyn 13-9, leaving the Dodgers in fifth, two games behind—and only 4 1/2 ahead of the Giants.

Pittsburgh quit the cellar in a double-header with the Chicago Cubs, winning 15-5 to plunk the Bruisers back to eighth before a 5-5 tie called after 11 innings because of darkness.

In the American League, where a "whopping" half game stands between first and second, Chicago's White Sox retained the lead with a 7-5 job on Boston while the second-place New York Yankees defeated Cleveland 3-1. Detroit rallied to beat Washington 4-1 and Baltimore defeated Kansas City 1-0 as Connie Johnson out-dueled Arnie Portocarrero in a double three-hitter.

Southpaw Curt Simmons got away with a nine-hitter for his seventh victory as the Phillies unloaded 16 hits, handing Lindy McDaniel a fourth defeat. Rookie Harry Anderson broke a 1-all tie with a homer that triggered a three-run sixth inning. The Phils got four more runs in the seventh, then tagged Bob Miller, an 18-year-old, \$25,000 bonus kid, making his debut, with three runs in the ninth.

The Giants won their 11th in the last 15 games. Bobby Thomson drove in five runs and Willie Mays four. Both were 4-for-6 in a 20-hit barrage that nailed Johnny Klippstein with a seventh loss. Stu Miller won his second in relief.

Milwaukee crunched Don Newcombe with seven runs on five homers, shelling the big guy as Hank Aaron, Eddie Mathews and Wes Covington hit successive homers in the fifth to narrow Brooklyn's lead to 9-7. The Braves bagged it with six in the eighth off Clem Labine. Mathews had two home runs, good for four runs, in a 15-hit spree that gave reliever Gene Conley his first victory.

Fondy Hits
Pittsburgh's Dee Fondy was 7-for-11, taking the league bat lead from Stan Musial (.365 to .353). There were 49 hits in the twin bill, 31 by the Pirates, and 22 were good for extra bases. Bill Maze-roski homered in both games for the Bucs.

Three sacrifice flies won for the Yanks, two by Hank Bauer, Johnny Kucks won his fifth with Bob Grim's relief help in the ninth. Bob Lemon lost it.

Jim Wilson won his eighth for the White Sox, but needed relief help after Bubba Phillips had homered in the fifth to give him a 6-1 lead. Willard Nixon lost his fourth.

A three-run seventh, with Ray Boone's RBI double and J. W. Porter and Ron Samford batting in a run each with singles, won for the Tigers and Jim Bunning. Jim Busby homered in the fifth for Baltimore. Johnson struck out four and walked none. Portocarrero gained his first complete game in nine starts since Sept. 7, 1955.

Dodgers Are Lost, Representative Cries

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Celler, a Democrat from Brooklyn, said today the borough has lost its battle to keep the Dodgers.

Celler sought for 2 1/2 hours yesterday to pin down Dodger President Walter O'Malley on the Brooklyn baseball club's future. O'Malley was testifying before Celler's House Antitrust subcommittee, which is considering legislation on application of the anti-trust laws to professional sports.

O'Malley said he is not committed to moving the Dodgers to Los Angeles—but that people in that West Coast city are "working very rapidly and very intelligently" to get the National League team there.

He said the Dodgers would stay in Brooklyn if New York City would provide a site for a 50,000-seat stadium as well as a big parking facility. But in almost the next breath, he said, "Time is definitely running out on that." At another point, he said he never had asked New York to build him a stadium or parking lots.

Celler asked O'Malley point-blank whether the Dodgers will play in Los Angeles next year, and the Dodger president replied: "I do not know the answer."

But today Celler told newsmen: "He's over the brink. He has made up his mind. He can't very well say now that he'll move—it would ruin attendance this season."

Rep. Keating of Rochester, N.Y., senior Republican on the subcommittee, said in a separate interview he thinks there still is hope for New York City to persuade the Dodgers to stay in Brooklyn—"and I hope the city doesn't miss the boat again."

Celler said he is not urging city authorities to try to come to an agreement with O'Malley "because I don't think it would do any good

a single by Don Frailey. They added an insurance run in the fifth. Mike Acker won the game with a five-hitter.

Joe Zavattaro's bases loaded single in the last of the ninth inning beat the Bears. Ellis Burton and Milt Martin both homered for the Braves in the first inning, Burton with a man aboard.

The Senators clubbed out 17 hits in beating Lewiston. The victory went to veteran Vern Kindsfather, who limited the Broncs to nine hits, including solo homers to Bruce McIntosh and Ron Carlon.
