## Atomic Bomb Proves Dud; Disarming Job Necessary

### Sec. Dulles Denounces Red China

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles denounced unprovoked, hostile regime and Communist China Friday as an "it would be folly" to establish relations "which would enhance" the Reds' ability to hurt this country and its friends.

In his first major speech on Red China policy in three years, Dulles rejected every argument for major change in the United States policy of non-recognition, trade embargo and cultural isolation.

He said U. S. policies are based on the assumption that Communist rule in China is "a passing phase."

This country intends to do all it can to speed the passing, Dulles said, and ruled out arguments that change would be promoted by U. S. diplomatic, trade and cultural relations with the Reds.

"There are occasions when others, and not we, should provide the change," Dulles said, but he did not hold out any hope that the Communists are about to revolutionize themselves.

The hope he did hold out was that the Chinese people, to whom he said communism is as "repugnant" as to the people of Soviet satellites in Europe, will eventually bring about the end of Red despotism in China.

### Failure Said 3rd Misfire In History

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. (AP) — An atomic test weapon failed to explode Friday—and the darkness and silence were more stunning than the expected flash and roar.

It was the third misfire in the history of nuclear tests at this southern Nevada site.

The failure sent a team of scientists into the area to undertake the tricky job of disarming the powerful device.

A five-man team completed the job of making the weapon harmless within 2½ hours.

The Atomic Energy Commission said a power failure was responsible.

Nearly 2,000 Marines crouched in trenches 4,300 yards from the detonating tower and about 150 newsmen and official observers swarmed over Nevada as the hour arrived at 3:45 a. m. (PST).

Ten seconds before blast time the ominous count down began in the pre-dawn darkness.

"Ten seconds," boomed over the public address system on Nevada, eight miles from the tower.

"Nine seconds," boomed over the system.

### Auto Crash Kills Woman Early Today

A 22-year-old Roseburg woman was killed early this morning when she lost control of her car and went over a Highway 99 embankment about nine miles south of Roseburg.

Dead is Evelyn Joyce Kachel, who had lived in Roseburg only two days. She apparently had moved from Salem.

The wreck was discovered about 7:30 a. m. by a passerby who noticed skid marks on the highway and damage to a guard rail. Time of the accident was set at about 2 a. m. The woman's smashed watch had stopped at 2:11 a. m.

Police measured skid marks of 318 feet before the car hurdled the guardrail. Mrs. Kachel had been driving south, and the car skidded from the west side of the highway to go over a 68-foot embankment on the east side of the roadway.

Police speculated that she either was speeding or had fallen asleep.

She was thrown from the car, Coroner L. L. Powers said. Death came from multiple skull fractures and shock.

The death was the 13th in traffic in Douglas County this year, compared to nine of the comparable date last year.

Surviving are three sons: Alvin Wayne Wisenand, 6; Thomas Dwight Hunter, 4; and Claude Warren Kachel, 2. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Martin, Salem, also survive.

The body was taken to The Chapel of the Roses, where funeral arrangements are being made.

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## Idaho Doctor Cracks Up Plane

### Pilot Loses Way In Dark At Tri-City

A Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, flier, lost in the darkness over Western Oregon, made a crash landing on a lighted road construction project near Myrtle Creek Thursday night.

Dr. Harrel Don Mosley suffered bruises and chin cuts when the light plane nosed over a three-foot embankment.

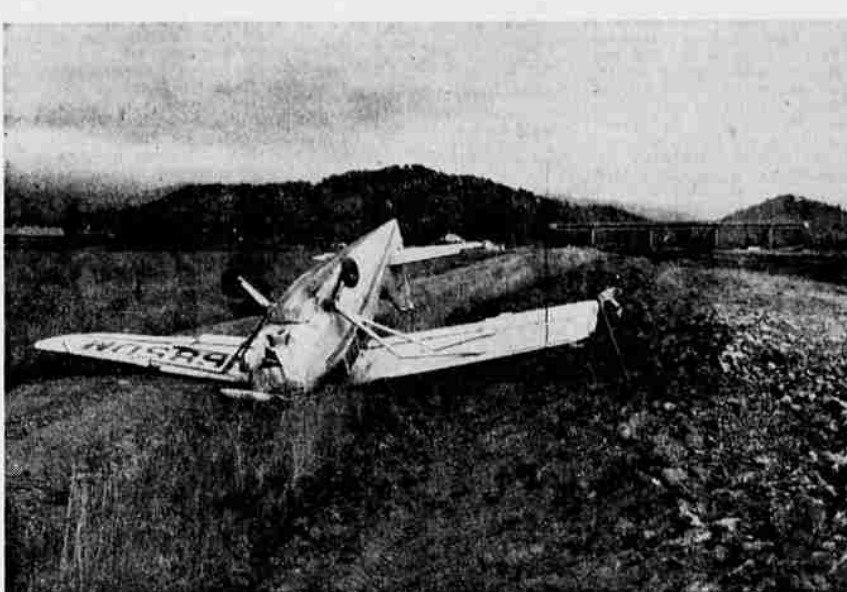
He said later that he thought he could have kept the plane upright, but the floodlight that illuminated the work project blinded him, and he swerved over the embankment.

John Cullet of Myrtle Creek pulled the bleeding Mosley from the plane. The pilot refused to go to a hospital. He spent the night at a hotel here.

He became lost at 10,000 feet over Myrtle Creek, south of Roseburg, spotted the floodlight road project, where grading machines were at work, and decided to land there.

Dr. Mosley was returning from a business trip in Grants Pass, planning to stop at Spokane, Wash., on his way back to Coeur d'Alene. He estimates \$1200 damage to the plane, which he owns. It was not insured.

He plans to continue to Coeur d'Alene by airline today.

## Uncertain Fate Held For Many

### Storm Continues To Lash Area, As Floods Take Toll

LAKE CHARLES, La. (AP) — Hurricane-battered southwest Louisiana counted a mounting death toll Friday with official and unofficial estimates ranging from 200 to 4,000 fatalities.

Official sources have accounted for 104 dead, 87 of them in storm and wave-ravaged Cameron Parish. But one Cameron Parish deputy said he believed the toll would reach 3,000 to 4,000.

The Weather Bureau in Washington said its latest reports from the battered area indicated 200 to 300 persons had been killed in the Cameron area since hurricane Audrey smashed into southwest Louisiana Thursday.

Capt. W. L. Price, skipper of a New Orleans rescue boat that brought 400 refugees to Lake Charles earlier Friday, said Cameron Parish Sheriff G. B. Carter told him "at least 200 persons are dead in Cameron."

The death toll took another jump when Stephen Broussard, 40-year-old oil field worker, said three of his children drowned during the night. They ranged in age from three and one-half years to nine months old.

The hurricane roared into the Texas and Louisiana coasts Thursday.

Weary rescue teams probed the marshlands for victims or survivors. Some reports said bodies were located floating on debris miles from Cameron.

Although there was no official estimate of casualties, the Red Cross here said they knew of at least 1,000 people in the Cameron area who did not evacuate as Audrey moved toward the coast.

### Shippers' Group Delays Electing Officers At Meet

This brought about the association which is dedicated to improving all types of transportation in Southwest Oregon.

At the Grants Pass meeting, a committee to conduct a membership drive was elected. Chairman of the committee is William (Bill) F. Forrest, Pacific Plywood Co., Dillard.

Serving with him are Tom Reynolds, Spaulding & Son, Inc., Grants Pass; Bernard Parent, Gulf Red Cedar Corp., Central Point; Robert Fennell, Double D Lumber Co., Central Point; Homer White, Menasha Plywood Corp., North Bend; Ray Martin, Martin Brothers Container and Lumber Co., Medford; and Fred Sohn, Sun Studs.

Following the drive for members, the association will hold an organizational meeting August 5 in Grants Pass. At that time a board of directors will be elected.

### 69 Give Blood For First Time

Sixty-nine persons donated blood for the first time during the three-day visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile in Douglas County.

A total of 281 pints of blood were collected, a shortage of 199 pints of the 480-pint quota. Twelve persons became gallon donors, three became two-gallon donors, and one a three-gallon donor.

William Buckley of Roseburg is the three-gallon donor. Don Brown, Hildred Chapman and Mayme Hasbargen, all of Roseburg, reached the status of two-gallon donors.

The 11 Roseburg gallon donors were: Elmer Hunter, Elizabeth Bowers, Vern Jeffries, Juanita Elliott, Leo E. Young, Albertina Perry, Anna Brenda, Olga Barnes, Eva Craig, Lester Cingcade and Thelma Hatcher. Rudy Black of Myrtle Creek also became a gallon donor.

Fifty-eight people were deferred for various reasons.

During the visit, 339 people contributed. Mrs. Walter Britnell, Red Cross blood recruitment chairman, praised Blue Star Mothers, Grey Ladies and other volunteers who helped staff the bloodmobile.

### Drain Logger Killed Friday

Stokely Jacobs, about 30, Drain, was killed about 9 a. m. today in a logging accident on Yellow Creek about eight miles northwest of Oakland.

Coroner L. L. Powers said Jacobs, working for Woolley Logging Co., was crushed between two logs. One log was broken loose by a tractor. It rolled, pinning him against another log.

Jacobs died while en route to a hospital. The death was the fifth in logging this year in Douglas County.

The body was taken to Stearns and Little Mortuary, Oakland. Names of survivors weren't learned immediately.

### Portland Mayor's Trial Nears Close, To Go To Jurors

PORTLAND (AP) — Final arguments began Friday in the jury trial of Portland Mayor Terry Schunk.

The case is expected to be in the hands of the state circuit court jury by nightfall.

The maximum penalty for conviction is five years in prison.

The 44-year-old mayor is accused of lying when he denied that he accepted a gambler's bribe.

The prosecution, handled by a staff of special assistant state attorneys general, put 23 witnesses on the stand in the 10-day trial, asserting that Clifford O. Bennett, operator of the \$212 Club, placed \$500 in an envelope, walked across the street and dropped it by a drinking fountain the night of Sept. 11, 1955.

Several said they saw Schunk walk across the street a few minutes later and pick up the envelope.

Schunk denied this and said it was a political plot, launched last year and aimed at defeating his 1956 campaign for mayor. He said that gamblers feared his election because he would drive them out of town.

The defense, handled by attorney Edwin Hicks, attempted to show that many of the prosecution witnesses were indebted in (Continued on Page 2 Col. 1)

### Subcommittee Votes To Put More Than Billion Back Into Defense Money Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 34½ billion dollar defense money bill, increased nearly a billion dollars over the House total, went to the Senate Appropriations Committee Friday for expected approval.

A subcommittee voted unanimously Thursday to restore most of the \$1,220,000,000 in cash cuts the House had voted. The administration had protested that the reduced total would not be enough to meet defense needs in this cold war era.

Well placed sources, declining to be named, said most of the \$971,504,000 increase recommended by the subcommittee—about \$66 million dollars—would go to the Air Force.

The subcommittee itself, however, refused to give any details beyond the bill's proposed overall total of \$34,534,229,000 for the Army, Navy and Air Force in the fiscal year which starts Monday.

Chairman Chavez (D-NM) told newsmen it was up to the full committee, meeting behind closed doors, to announce any further details.

Chavez voiced confidence the full committee would accept the subcommittee recommendation.

The subcommittee released a letter in which the Air Force backed away from its original "stretchout" in armed forces buying ordered by Secretary of Defense Wilson might involve some drastic cutbacks in its current program.

With the new fiscal year only three days away, the Senate completed congressional action on two appropriations bills, and several (Continued on Page 2 Col. 3)

### Teamsters Adopt New Constitution; Brewster Remains

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The Western Conference of Teamsters adopted a new constitution Thursday night but left Frank Brewster, 60, of Seattle, as head of the big labor organization.

The name of his office was changed from chairman to president, and he was automatically continued to hold it. He was reappointed conference head Monday by international President Dave Beck.

Other officers were made elective—for the first time in the conference—and a 16-man executive board was created which will hereafter have a big say in conference affairs.

William Franklin, Seattle, director of the conference's Dairy Council, was elected new secretary-treasurer. His signature, as well as Brewster's, must now appear on union checks.

### Roseburg Youth In Army Killed

A Roseburg youth serving in the U. S. Army was killed Wednesday in an auto accident in Eselon, Calif.

Particulars on the accident which killed Frank Bork, 18, Roseburg, have not yet been received.

The body will be brought to Roseburg. Funeral arrangements will be announced later by the Chapel of the Roses.

Young Bork is survived by his wife, Jani, and son, Ronnie, both living at Eselon. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Bork of Roseburg, and a sister and nine brothers.

### Convicted Oklahoman Takes Issue With Remark Of Wimberly

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly's famous remark referring to a Roseburg judge as an "Okie" has come to life again.

James Darrel Fenty, who is serving six years in the Oregon State Penitentiary for assault with a dangerous weapon, has been granted a hearing in Marion County Circuit Court Monday to plead a petition for a writ of habeas corpus.

He claims that during court action leading to his sentencing, "a Roseburg judge used the language in referring to Oklahoma and 'Okies'."

Fenty was arrested in Oakland about two years ago after he held his wife at gunpoint for several hours.

### Scientist Named To Start North Douglas Soil Study

Assignment of a soil scientist to the North Douglas Soil Conservation District recently signaled the start of a soil survey project which had been postponed until personnel was available.

Robert C. Paeth, assigned to the job, has been with the Soil Conservation Service since 1951 and has carried on other surveys in the state. He has been assigned in the Hawaiian Islands for the last three years.

The survey is planned to cover the entire district and eventually fit into a nation-wide survey.

### Donald McDonald Faces Probation Revocation

Donald A. McDonald, 34, of Willow Creek, Calif., was arrested today by a sheriff's deputy to face a charge of probation violation. He is charged with violating his probation by passing bad checks.

He is on probation from Douglas County Circuit Court. He was sentenced to serve two years in the state penitentiary in June 1956 after pleading guilty to a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

### Douglas Youths May Attend New Life Youth Camp

Applications to attend the free New Life Youth Camp sessions to be held at McCready Springs will be sent to some Douglas County youths this week by juvenile authorities.

Two-week sessions will be held for boys and one session for girls this summer. The camp is a non-profit project by Eugene businessmen. It is open to youths from 9 to 16 years old without restrictions as to race or religion.

The camp will take youngsters from both Lane and Douglas counties this season. Limited facilities kept Douglas County enrollment to 14 last year.

Construction started in May on a permanent camp with a capacity of 150 persons on Dorena Lake. The camp will be completed next summer, and the sponsors hope to open it to youngsters from the entire state. Land, lumber, and cabins have been donated to the camp.

The camp group will hold a fund raising drive in Roseburg on July 13. The camp is financed entirely by donation.
