 A triple play and the five-hit pitching of Charley Benmon carried the Vancouver Mounties to a 6-1 victory over the Portland Beavers in the Pacific Coast League Thursday night.
 The win enabled Vancouver to remain in second place, two games behind leading San Francisco.

The triple play came in the fourth inning, when Portland trailed only by a 2-1 count and was attempting a rally. Luis Marquez and Bob Borkowski were on base after singles when Ed Winceniak slammed a hot grounder at third base.

Third baseman Kal Segrist nabbed it for Vancouver, stepped on the bag to retire Marquez, threw to second base in time to catch Borkowski, and the relay beat Winceniak to first base.

That seemed to wilt the Beavers. They didn't get another hit the rest of the game.

Owen Friend, Vancouver second baseman, smashed his third home run in three games. It came with a man on base in the fifth inning.

Three Star
 In other games Hollywood beat Seattle, 7-1, but the standout plays involved Rudy Regalado of San Diego, Steve Bilko of Los Angeles and Leo Kiely of San Francisco.

Red-hot Rudy's homer Thursday night stretched his hitting streak to 25 straight games and opened the way to an 8-4 Padre triumph over Sacramento.

Bilko, the league's leading home run hitter, smashed No. 20, his eighth in his last 11 games, but the Angels dropped an 8-6 contest to the San Francisco Giants.

Leo Kiely, relieving for the Seals in the eighth inning, notched his second win in as many nights, his 10th consecutive victory in relief and his 11th of the season, tops in the league.

Bilko's smash over the center-field wall at the 415-foot mark opened the scoring in Los Angeles—and ended his scoring for the night. He struck out the next two times up and was thumbed out of the game when he threw his hat in the air in disgust after the second strike-out. The thumping umpire, Earl Lennon, sent Angel Manager Clay Bryant along with Bilko for protesting the call.

Jim Baxes walloped Kiely's first relief pitch for a home run with two aboard to tie the score in the eighth. Kiely doubled in two runs with two out in the final inning to win for the Seals.

Hollywood's Hugh Pepper hurled seven-hit ball at Seattle, whose lone run crossed in the seventh and the Stars had piled up a 6-0 lead featuring a three-run spurge in the fourth inning.

Outboard boating has become popularized in recent years in this country—more than ever before. Clubs such as the Umpqua Boat Club have sprung up; something like flying clubs. There always have been yacht clubs and sailing clubs and the "fishing fraternity." The boat club is a new twist here.

NOW THE BOAT CLUB people are even distributing their own literature. Just the other day a four-page pamphlet entitled "Heave Anchor" fell into our hands. It was referred to as "the nation's newest and smallest syndicate."

It's all about "pleasure boating," the U.S.A.'s fastest growing sport. The syndicate quotes some revealing facts: Pleasure craft ownership is up from two and half-million to six million in the past ten years. There are 28 million persons in today's "pleasure navy," the book says.

The new, sea-going feature yarn is meant for wide readership. On the cover, the issue calls attention to such readers as "offshore sailors," "armchair admirals," "landlubbers with dreamboats," "salts who cross yachtclub bars," and "small boat and big shipping men."

That the outboard boating public is on the increase is apparent from such scenes as can be seen, on most fishing lakes around the

country. But outboard boating is actually a sport in itself. **THE OUTBOARD BOAT** people take part in such things as "club cruises." They have special signals much like the automobile driving public. Outboard boating people also have common bond in such things as state and federal legislation which affects such things as safety equipment, maximum and minimum horsepower, seaworthiness of the craft, etc.

Outboard boating has an interesting set of signals for making contact between the cruise master and pilots taking part in club cruises. As a matter of fact they'd probably be as useful in normal cruising.

THE LEFT TURN signal for the boat cruiser is the same as the left turn signal made by most automobile drivers when they actually intend to turn left. It's done with the left arm extended straight out.

There is a difference, however, in the structure of the boat that makes it differ from the automobile when driving. At least the picture shown in the issue of "Outboard Boating," we are looking at puts the driver's seat on the right side of the boat.

This puts the "pilot" in the position of being able to make a right hand turn signal in the standard left hand turn method—arm extended to the right.

OTHER SIGNALS imposed by the outboard boater are a clenched fist for indicating more speed, both arms extended to indicate a "skirmish line" to right and left of leader, arm raised up to indicate caution. The signal to indicate a complete stop could never be used effectively in auto driving. It was made for boat cruising. Both arms are extended over the head and the hands are crossed.

Stop to think about it, no other automobile driver may know what was intended by such a signal, but it looks like a dead-end way of stopping the car. Particularly in the powerless—steering models like we are prone to drive.

The stop boat signal holds no water for the auto club.

The Salem Senators whipped Lewiston's last-place Braves, 16-6, in Thursday night's game to take over third place from the Chiefs, who dropped into fourth, four and a half games off the pace.

Yakima's win over the Braves was the first victory for the Bears in the three-game series. Bob Roberts, the starting pitcher for Yakima, sent the game into extra innings with a three-run homer that tied the score at 5-5. Ed Zander's single, scoring Whitely Phillips from third, was the game-winning hit.

New Sport Called Sacket Catches On

Several hundred Roseburg boys and girls are learning a new team sport called "sacket" this summer through the YMCA Summer Fun Club.

The game is much the same as baseball and according to Bob Keady, coach at Central Junior High and Director of the "Y" Summer Fun Club, the game has aroused more interest than any other sport he has instructed or taught during his teaching.

A flat bat is used with a soft breather ball in the game and only a first base and a last base are used, leaving out second base. At the home plate a net racket is used in place of a catcher and balls thrown into the net are considered strikes and balls falling out of the net are considered balls.

The specially designed equipment makes it easier to teach and learn the basic skills of pitching, throwing, catching, fielding and batting a ball. Children are not hesitant to catch the ball upon a hit with the soft ball so therefore they can concentrate on developing ball skill.

According to Keady, the game is easily learned, but requires a lot of practice to become proficient. The "Y" is using the game this summer both indoors and outdoors here in Roseburg at Winston-Dillard and at Green where the "Y" is conducting Summer Fun programs.
