Are New York's Giants for real? They're still in sixth place in that hectic National League race, but they've won 12 of their last 16—with half of the victories against Milwaukee and Cincinnati.
And they've been doing it with only one .300 hitter (Willie Mays, .317) and just three pitchers who have won more than they've lost (Rubeen Gomez, 9-5; Al Worthington, 7-4; and Ray Crone, 4-2).
Mays and southpaw Johnny Antonelli, two leftovers from the 1954 pennant team, and rookie catcher Valmy Thomas moved the Giants within 3½ games of fifth place last night with a 7-2 victory over Cincinnati, which fell from second to third.
The St. Louis Cardinals retained first place, by half a game, as young Von McDaniel, the \$50,000 bonus right-hander, won his third in a 6-4 decision over fourth-place Philadelphia. Milwaukee took over second place, beating fifth-place Brooklyn 2-1 on Bob Buhl's four-hit performance.

Hammer's single and Ed Bouchee's double ended his shutout string at 19 2-3 innings in the third. The kid also was tagged for a Stan Lopata homer, and finally gave way to Hoyt Wilhelm in a two-run eighth after Hammer tripled.
Buhl won his fifth in a row for a 9-2 record, losing a two-hit shutout in the ninth on singles by Gil Hodges, who had two hits, and Gino Cimoli and an infield out. Hank Aaron's two-run triple in the eighth did it against Don Drysdale.
Frank Malone drove in five runs for the Red Sox, counting three with a home run in a four-run nightcap first against Billy Pierce, who lost his fourth in a row for a 10-6 record. Mike Fornieles won it.
A one-hit, four-run first paid off in the opener too. Frank Sullivan won it, with relief help.
Wynn and Tommy Byrne, both 37, had a pretty fair duel, but the Tribe right-hander grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Al Smith "walked" to second on a wild pitch, went to third on a fly and scored on an infield out. Dick Williams' second single came ahead of Bobby Avila's triple in the seventh for the other run.
Washington had a 6-0 lead against loser Paul Foytack and a Billy Hoeltz as the Senators cracked 9 of their 10 hits in the first three frames. Camilo Pascual won it, Jim Lemon homered and drove in two runs.

Althea Gibson, Three U. S. Men Stars Gain 4th Round

WIMBLEDON, England, (AP)—Althea Gibson, the top-seeded woman, and three Yank Davis Cup players, Vic Seixas, Herbie Flam and Mike Green, gained the fourth round Thursday in the Wimbledon tennis championships.
A leading U.S. woman contender, Marion (Mimi) Arnold, was beaten and so was a pair of the second-line men entries, Sidney Schwartz and Hugh Stewart, as the world's biggest tennis tournament entered the fourth day.
Defending champion Lew Hoad of Australia, still not in the best form, had trouble outlasting unranked John Lesch of Los Angeles, 6-3, 9-7, 6-4.
Miss Gibson of New York, her game nearing its full potential, erased Mary Hoolyer of Australia, 6-4, 6-2. Miss Arnold, U.S. girls junior champion and recent winner of the Queen's Club title, bowed to Rosa Reyes of Mexico, 6-3, 6-3.
Seixas, 33-year-old Philadelphia who won this title in 1953, gave an impressive display of his volleying ability in beating Kosei Kamo, Japanese Davis Cup ace, 6-2, 6-2, 5-7, 6-3.
Flam, second-ranked U.S. performer from Beverly Hills, Calif., ousted Jackie Brichant of Belgium 1-6, 6-1, 6-1, 6-4. Green, 21-year-old Davis Cup hopeful from Miami, Fla., won over Stewart, who had to retire with a sore shoulder in the second set.
Schwartz, from Long Beach, N.Y., fell before Sven Davidson, of Sweden, seeded fourth, 6-1, 6-4, 7-5.

Wide-Open Competition Prospect Of Decathlon

KINGSBURG, Calif., (AP)—A gruelling two evenings face a field of 22 track and field athletes who Friday night open the National AAU decathlon competition.
This small Central California community, host for the national event, had hoped to see its hometown star, Rafer Johnson, repeat as national champion. But Johnson, who placed second in the Olympics, was advised by physicians not to compete because of a knee ailment.
Johnson will participate in four or six events in an exhibition. He's not entered in the decathlon.
Although wide open competition appeared in prospect, most attention was being given to Bob Lawson, University of Southern California hurdler from Aberdeen, Wash., Dave Edstrom, University of Oregon freshman, and Ken Kelley of the Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, Tex. Kelley won the decathlon title at this year's Kansas Relays.
Friday night's events include the 100-meter dash, broad jump, shot put, high jump, and 400-meter run. Saturday night the 10-event program winds up with the 110-meter high hurdles, discus, pole vault, javelin and 1500-meter run.

New York Council President Calls For Investigation

WASHINGTON (AP)—New York City Council President Abe Stark, bitterly protesting the contemplated move of the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers, called on Congress Wednesday to investigate "the unholy alliance between the baseball barons and the pay-television forces."
In testimony before the House Antitrust Subcommittee, Stark said the mayors of Los Angeles and San Francisco, prospective new homes of the Dodgers and Giants, "think that piracy is the proper way to develop the national sport and to serve as an example for children to follow."
But, he went on, "there is an even worse monopoly in the making. And that is the corrupting alliance between baseball and pay television."
The motive behind the transfer of the two teams to the West Coast—which the subcommittee has been told is not settled—seems to be "the prospect of easy money and windfall profits from toll TV," Stark said.
Stark said Dodgers President Walter F. O'Malley is reported negotiating with "a pay TV syndicate" and President Horace C. Stoneham of the Giants "has admitted buying its stock."
The subcommittee received testimony Tuesday that O'Malley is seeking a contract with Skiatron, Inc., a closed-circuit television company, but that pay-television of Dodge games is contemplated whether or not the club moves from New York to San Francisco.
Stark also criticized Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick for not vetoing the proposed move.
"I respect the integrity of Ford Frick, but baseball needs a commissioner with courage enough to protect the public from this type of piracy," Stark said. "A man as strong and forceful as the late Judge Landis."
This was a reference to the long-time commissioner, Kenesaw Mountain Landis.
Stark said it is "a delusion and an oversimplification" to say that a transfer to the West Coast would reduce the danger of monopoly in major league baseball. Instead, he said, a transfer could "side-track plans for the creation of a new major league on the Pacific Coast."

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
