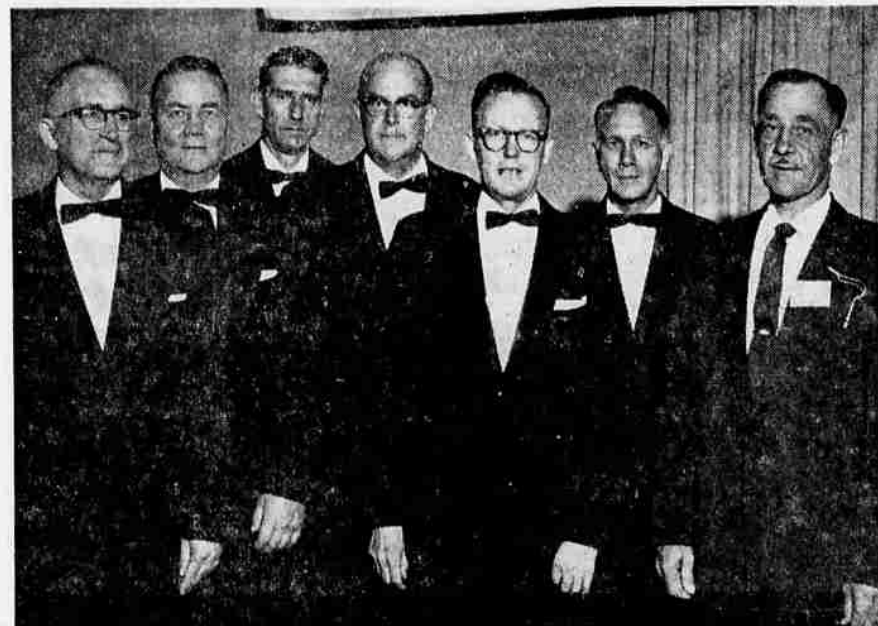

Plaque To Adorn Floyd C. Frear Bridge On Umpqua

A plaque designed by Frederic F. Lattman, one of Oregon's foremost sculptors, will be attached to the new Floyd C. Frear bridge during dedication ceremonies at 2:30 p.m. Sunday.

The bridge spans the North Umpqua River about 1 1/2 miles west of Glendale. The \$150,000 concrete and steel bridge completes the 17-mile cutoff between Wilbur and Glendale and is named after Frear who retired from the county road department in 1956 after 36 1/2 years as an employee. The bridge is the last link of a route from Wilbur to Glendale.

John Lundstrom, West Coast Steel representative, will present the plaque, which has a metal relief view of Frear's face. Lattman's galleries and museums of Budapest, Paris, Brussels, New York, Portland and other cities. The sculptor has studied in Budapest and Paris.

Activities will get under way at 2:30 with an invocation by the Rev. George Knox, pastor of the Westside Christian Church. Lundstrom will then present the bridge and plaque to Douglas County. Next on the schedule are acceptance and dedication of the bridge by County Judge V. T. Jackson.

Former Judge Carl C. Hill will deliver the featured address. Frear, assisted by Lundstrom, will open the bridge to traffic. Commissioner Huron Clough will serve as master of ceremonies.

Court To Rule On Manslaughter Case Of Youth

The hearing on whether juvenile court will have jurisdiction in the case of a 16-year-old Roseburg boy charged with manslaughter will be continued in circuit court here Monday.

The charge is against Gerald Wayne Anderson, Rt. 1, Box 970, accused in the death May 11 of Edward A. Shirliff, 50, Myrtle Creek. Shirliff was killed in a traffic accident near Roseburg in which Anderson also was involved.

Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich, after hearing arguments on a petition for defense counsel to take the matter into juvenile court, ordered the matter continued until juvenile officer Julian Hellock could make a report on the boy and the case. The report has been completed, Judge Woodrich noted in an order setting Monday as the date for the continuance.

The hearing will be at 1:30 p.m.

Judge To Rule Monday On Bribery Trial Motion

HILLSBORO — Circuit Judge Carl Dahl will rule Monday on a motion for a directed verdict of acquittal in the bribery trial of former Washington County Judge Harry Seibold.

The motion was made Friday after the prosecution rested following the appearance on the stand of its 15th witness.

Seibold, 64, is charged with sharing in profits of timber on land the state says he acquired from the county's foreclosure list.

Hurricane Death Toll May Hit 250

Debris Probed For Victims After Storm

LAKE CHARLES, La. — The Lake Charles American Press predicted today the death toll from Hurricane Audrey in Louisiana's Cameron Parish would reach 250.

Managing Editor Ken Dixon said his newspaper's estimate, well above the 150 set at present by civil defense officials, was based on a survey of the entire area, still lying under tide waters from the Gulf of Mexico.

Mayor Sidney Gray clarified his earlier estimate that the death toll now stands at 150. He reasoned that the figure might not include the 61 bodies already recovered.

At Gettysburg, Pa., the President told newsmen he had received a report that 211 persons were known dead in Louisiana. He did not elaborate on the report, but said the situation "is worse than they thought."

Civil defense workers said food and water are no longer problems in Cameron where some 400 persons still await evacuation. The major task now, they said, is moving heavy equipment into the area to aid in clearing away heavy debris.

There was still no information on damage at Black Bayou, the civil defense office said. No figures were available on the tiny fishing community which isn't even on the official state map.

A late report on the missing, not including in the death toll estimates, was 200 to 300, made by the regional civil defense office at Dallas.

President Eisenhower designated the battered sections of the Texas and Louisiana coasts as major disaster areas and expressed his "deepest sympathy" to the people left without homes, their families scattered and missing.

Major Joe Carroll of the Lake Charles Air Force Base, directing helicopter operations at Grand Cheniere, told AP staffer Stan Meisler some of the area was difficult to reach.

Only Minor Changes Made In County Budget After Hearing Held Here Friday

A public hearing on the 1957-58 Douglas County budget was held Friday but no changes other than those agreed upon earlier by the budget committee were allowed. Several last minute pleas for department increases were made.

In an all-day session Tuesday, the committee had heard most of the same requests and in a few places had made adjustments in the budget which had been approved earlier. No changes were made in the road department budget but in the general county budget alterations boosted total appropriations to \$1,843,950. The published total had been \$1,831,538.

The county's joint venture into tree growing apparently had been overlooked when the budget first received approval. The county had bought land from Norman Compson for a state-operated tree nursery near Elkton and is to receive rentals from the state which will ultimately buy the land.

Money Added

For part of this land purchase, an item of \$20,497.71 was added to the Lands Department budget. Partially offsetting this is a \$5,000 item under revenues for tree farm rental.

A major change was made in the Veterinarians budget. Under provisions of a new state law, this work is to be taken over by the state, Judge V. T. Jackson explained, but until the state program gets rolling the county is providing some money for the operation. The total budget for this work — \$15,000 — was cut to \$5.

Fire Destroys Motel South Of Sutherlin

Fire destroyed a motel, located two miles south of Sutherlin on Highway 99, about 6 a.m. today.

A house attached to the one-story frame and stucco building was also destroyed. The 130-foot building belonged to Elmer H. Olsen, who estimated his loss at \$30,000.

The blaze was discovered by a passing motorist. One couple was staying overnight. They were up and getting ready to leave when the fire was discovered. The travelers said they thought they smelled smoke about 5 a.m.

Cause of the conflagration which started in an end unit of the motel was not determined this morning. Two units of the motel were completed and about four were under construction.

Several fire trucks from the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. headquarters at Roseburg answered the call. A service station located near the motel was not touched by the fire.

ELEVEN FRENCH KILLED

ALGIERS, Algeria. — Eleven French gendarmes were killed and their bodies burned Friday night by a rebel band near Orleansville.

In an ambush of a military convoy near Tiarret seven French soldiers lost their lives. The French killed seven of the ambushers.

Glendale Voters Approve Budget

Glendale voters passed the school budget Friday by a vote of 178 to 41. The amount voted on was \$12,871.15 outside the 6 per cent limitation.

The budget figure passed was \$13,054 below the amount of \$12,925 above the 6 per cent limitation which was turned down in two previous elections.

After the election school board members held a meeting to open bids on replacement of a boiler for the grade school heating plant. A decision on the bids was tabled so that one of the board members can investigate the possibility of cutting costs.

Mrs. Robert L. Fisher, senior member of the board, will take office as chairman at the next board meeting scheduled for July 10, at 8 p.m. in the high school. Bernie Halverson, who was recently elected to replace the retiring chairman, Louis Brady, will be seated on the board.

Judge Orders Temporary Moving Of 3

Mistreatment Charged To Couple In Petition Of District Attorney

Three children — including one of the Holt Korean orphans — were taken away from a Roseburg couple Friday afternoon because of alleged mistreatment.

The children, living in the Mr. and Mrs. Howard B. Ott's home as fosterers, were put in the custody of the Douglas County Public Welfare Commission by order of Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich. Ott manages Douglas Supply Co.

The action was a result of a dependency petition filed by Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson.

The Korean, whose father was a white American serviceman, is Timothy, 19 months old. Another boy, Michael, 6 1/2, and a girl, Rebecca, 5, are the other children.

Timothy was the first of two Korean-American children to be adopted by the Ott family under the World Vision Inc. program, whose representative is the well-known Harry Holt, Creswell.

The second child adopted through World Vision was Wendy Kay, 22 months, who died of suffocation during a choking spell June 14.

Mrs. Ott (Edith) was referred to specifically twice in four allegations made by Thompson in his petition to the court to have the children removed from the home. However, both Mr. and Mrs. Ott

Mayor Schruk Acquired By Trial Jury

PORTLAND, Ore. — "Now we can get down to work," Portland Mayor Terry Schruk said Friday after a State Circuit Court jury acquitted him on a charge of perjury.

The jury deliberated less than two hours before deciding that Schruk had not lied when he denied taking a gambler's bribe.

"I feel wonderful," the 44-year-old mayor said. "I'm tired but I'm very happy. I've said ever since this fight began that I knew what the facts were and the Good Lord knew. That gave me strength to go ahead."

But Schruk still faces four other charges.

It is believed that the charge of bribery against Schruk may be dropped now, but State Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, who is in charge of the prosecution of Portland's vice cases, could not be reached for comment immediately.

Three other charges, stemming from the year-long vice probe of this city of 415,000, have been filed against the mayor, accusing him of illegally copying a wiretap, conspiracy to obtain a wiretap, and subornation of perjury. Trial dates for these charges have not been set.

Schrunk maintains that the accusations against him are part of

James A. Christensen, 751 NE Alameda Ave., pleaded guilty to driving while his operator's license was suspended. After a lecture, Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff sentenced him to 15 days in jail and fined him \$100 and \$5 costs.

Christensen also lost his driver's license for another year in addition to the remainder of a six-month suspension imposed by the judge a few weeks ago. The year's suspension is mandatory.

Friday's conviction was the 20th on a traffic charge against Christensen since October 1952. State police arrested him Thursday.

Herring Takes Over Watershed Management Work



H. G. HERRING — watershed management specialist arrived this week to organize and carry out a new program of research for the Siskiyou-Cascade Research Center of the Forest Service office in Roseburg.

The new forester, H. G. Herring, is the first watershed management specialist employed in the center and one of about six such specialists in Washington and Oregon.

His first duties will be to set a plan for research activities and to determine the source and quantity of erosion problems on forest land. He will investigate local soil types, rainfall, water runoff on various kinds of slopes, amount of soil moved by water runoff under various conditions, the effects of soil movement on stream silting, and the relationship between various runoff slope conditions and streamflow.

One of the goals of the new studies will be to develop recommendations for logging methods which will maintain adequate waterflow and prevent stream silting.

Herring completed his Master of Science degree in forestry this spring at Michigan State College. He is a graduate of Ann Arbor and served four years as a Navy officer. His wife and three children will come from Michigan to join him soon. He is originally from Illinois.
