1900 Hurricane Killed 6,000 At Galveston

The worst hurricane in American history occurred at Galveston, Tex., in 1900, when 6,000 persons lost their lives.
A 1928 hurricane took a toll of some 2,500 lives in the Lake Okechobee and Palm Beach areas of Florida. Sweeping up from the south, this hurricane killed another 1,000 persons in the Caribbean.
In 1938, Long Island and New England were hit by a hurricane which caused 600 deaths and 250 million dollars in property damage.
In 1926, the Miami, Hollywood and Fort Lauderdale sections of Florida reeled under a hurricane which cost 400 lives.
In 1954, two hurricanes smashed at northeast United States and Canada. In August of that year, Hurricane Carol caused 68 deaths. In October, Hazel caused 17 fatalities.

Inmates Of Penitentiary Study All Subjects But The One They Most Need

SALEM — Inmates of the Oregon State Penitentiary study many of the same subjects taught in all public schools, but the one course they should take is not among the more popular ones.
William Kennedy, director of education at the prison, said sociology draws only a handful of students and there is always a great difficulty in finding an inmate to be the instructor.
Instead, he added, mathematics and English rank as the most popular subjects in the prison school, which teaches most every-

thing from algebra to Spanish. Physics and chemistry are not included.
Kennedy stated that up to 250 inmates have been enrolled in the school, but at this time of year the number is down to around 70.
In addition to the elementary and high school subjects, as many as 180 have been enrolled in college correspondence courses. The director said the average grade for the teaching staff, but a few of the men go to college courses is about B plus.
A few of the men go to college when they are released. At the present time four are planning to, Kennedy said. Some of the older men refuse to attend classes because they "bunch of kids," but they are the ones who ask that their lessons be brought to their cells.
The school is all convict-taught and inmates do almost all the work in making lesson plans and charts. Kennedy pointed at one complex chart and said the man who was making it was paroled and now there is no one to finish it. He added that the man has agreed to finish it on the outside.
Naturally there is a turnover on the teaching staff, but a few of the men can be counted on to remain there for some time. One of the instructors has already made two escape attempts.
The school has about 4,000 texts, some bought and some donated. The library has about 9,000 books.
Thursday was graduation day for 34 inmates with 17 graduating from high school and 17 from grade school. Graduation is determined by test grades.
After receiving their diplomas, many of the men immediately asked that the diplomas be sent home so their families can see them.

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\$930,000 Grants Given By Ford Foundation

PORTLAND — Some \$930,000 in Ford Foundation grants have been apportioned to Oregon colleges the past week.

The grants: University of Portland \$160,500, Lewis and Clark, \$135,500, Reed College \$133,500, Willamette University \$128,500, Linfield College \$95,500, Pacific University \$74,500, Marhurst College \$28,000, Cascade College \$24,500 and Mt. Angel Seminary \$5,000.

In addition, Reed received an additional \$103,500 in recognition of its teacher salary schedule.

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
