Down in San Diego, Rudy Regalado ran his hitting streak to 26 consecutive games to help his Padres, currently in fourth, 3 1/2 games behind, dump last-place Sacramento, 6-1. Seattle's Charley Rabe broke a four-game losing streak for the Rainiers by tossing a 2-0 winner at Hollywood, in third 2 1/2 games behind. Seattle is in sixth, 5 1/2 games behind the Seals.

Ray Ortiz's double drove in two Seattle runs in the fifth and the final game across in the sixth on a double, a wild pitch by Ben Wade and an infield out. Three Mountie double plays erased scoring threats by Portland, the seventh-place team. The lone winning run came on singles by Jim Marshall, Kai Seigrist and Len Green.

Ring Chairman Scores NBA Refusal To Sanction Fight

TACOMA (AP)—The National Boxing Assn. "is going way out on a limb" in refusing to sanction the Floyd Patterson-Pete Rademacher heavyweight boxing match scheduled at Seattle Aug. 22, the chairman of the State Boxing Commission said Friday.

Dr. Charles P. Larson said he was "pretty mad" about the NBA's refusal to sanction the fight. He said the commission vetoed the fight and would veto any such action when the three-member board meets here Sunday.

The NBA moved Friday to try to head off the bout between Patterson, the world professional champion, and Rademacher, Olympic Games heavyweight titlist who never has had a professional bout.

Floyd Stevens, NBA president, announced at Grand Rapids, Mich., the NBA would not sanction the fight and said in a telegram to Dr. Larson that "it is desired that your commission be guided by the ruling."

Decision Ires Larson
Dr. Larson said he was "pretty mad" about the NBA decision. "Speaking for myself and not the entire state commission I'm for the fight. But the official position of the state commission will be decided by the ruling."

Cincy Votes Flood All-Star List; Redleg Trio Dumped

NEW YORK (AP)—Sweeping changes in the selection of baseball's All-Star team loomed today in the wake of a fantastic situation that would have sent the entire Cincinnati team excepting the pitcher against the American League had not Commissioner Ford Frick wielded his veto power.

Some baseball officials wanted the game "given back to the managers," meaning that the 16 pilots would select the starting teams. This was tried once, but discharged the game away from the fans.

As the voting now stands, a fan can vote hundreds of times, so long as he fills out the official ballot in the newspaper that has been designated as the regional vote-counter.

Redlegs Get Ballots
Just before the voting deadline at midnight Thursday, the Cincinnati Times Star deposited more than a half million votes in the league office. Virtually all of them named the entire Cincinnati lineup.

Frick acted quickly yesterday. He dumped first baseman George Crowe, center fielder Gus Bell and right fielder Wally Post. In their places, he named, respectively, Stan Musial of St. Louis, Willie Mays of New York and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee. These three had been leading at their positions before the Cincinnati deluge.

There still will be five Redlegs in the starting lineup in St. Louis July 9—catcher Ed Bailey, second baseman Johnny Temple, shortstop Roy McMillan, third baseman Don Hoak and left fielder Frank Robinson.

Five Named Last Year
"They were leading even without the avalanche from Cincinnati," said Frick.

Last year, too, five members of the Redlegs were named on the starting team. That caused some grumbling and there were scattered calls for a revision in the manner of selecting the team. But nothing was done.

"I don't question the honesty of the poll," Frick said in explaining his action. "But something had to be done."

Braves Back In First
In that National League race, Milwaukee regained first place by a half game with a 4-2 victory over Pittsburgh as the St. Louis Cardinals skidded to second with a 1-1 defeat by the ambitious New York Giants, who now have won 13 of 17 Cincinnati games to third, pasting Philadelphia 7-1. Brooklyn and Chicago Cubs were rained out.

Moore, a 31-year-old right-hand-

In tying the league record set by Cleveland in 1907 and also tied by the 1955 Yankees and 1948 Indians—the Orioles have strung together 41 shutout innings, beginning with Moore's five against Detroit Sunday. Then Brown, picked up from Seattle, beat the Tigers 6-0 with a five-hitter. Loes, an ex-Dodger, three-hit Kansas City 5-0, and Johnson, one with the White Sox, three-hit the A's 1-0.

Crandall
Milwaukee took first place for a third time this season as Del Crandall backed up Warren Spahn's five-hitter with a three-run double in the third against Bob Friend, who has lost time. Spahn, winning his eighth, struck out six and hit his 18th career home run a record for NL pitchers.

The sixth-place Giants tagged nine-game winner Larry Taggart with a fourth defeat as Daryl Spencer rapped a two-run double in the first. Rookie Curt Barclay gained a 4-5 record with Marv Grissom's relief help as the Giants moved within three games of fifth-place Brooklyn.

The Redlegs, two points back of the Cards and also a half game out, bagged it with three home runs—a three-run shot by George Crowe, a two-run job by right-handed Ifal Jefferson, who had three RBIs while winning his seventh with a four-hitter, and a solo blast by Gus Bell.

Junior Legion Squad Wins Sixth Tilt, Stops Medford

Roseburg Junior American Legion baseball team nabbed its sixth win of the season against one loss by defeating Medford, 13-4, in a non-league game played at Medford Friday night.

Medford had won four straight games before its sad meeting with Roseburg. The Medfordites are favored to win the District 3 crown.

Coach Bill Harper of Roseburg used three pitchers in the game, and only Dick Meredith, the second hurler of the evening, permitted any runs or any hits.

Allows None
Allen Smith opened on the mound for Roseburg and went four innings without allowing either a hit or a run and striking out seven batters. Meredith went the next two and gave up three hits and four runs, all of them in the fifth inning.

The final pitcher of the day was Mac McClellan, who went the final inning without allowing either a hit or a run. Three walks loaded the bases in the seventh for Medford, but McClellan picked off opposing pitcher Dennis Barr on second base to end the game.

Roseburg opened the game with three runs. Larry Bissonnette hit the first pitch of the game over second base for a single and then went to second on a walk to John Arana. Roseburg third baseman, Beamer Singles.

Ron Beamer then stepped to the plate and slashed a single into left

to score Bissonnette. After Wes Young struck out for the first out of the inning, Lee McLarty singled into right to score both Arana and Beamer.

Roseburg added seven big runs in the second inning, the most runs the team has scored in any inning so far this year.

Mike Hatfield led off the inning with a single into right and advanced to third base when Bissonnette beat out an infield hit. Bissonnette went to second on an error by the Medford third baseman.

Arana walked for the second time to load the bases, followed by another walk to Beamer that forced one run across the plate.

Young then singled into center field to score in two more runs. He then scored himself on a fielder's choice by John Livingston.

After two were out, Byron Baker stepped to the plate and drove the ball down the left field line for at least a double, but the Medford infielder, Frank Peterson, crashed into the fence and Baker came all the way around the bases for an inside the park home run and the final two runs of the inning.

Stitches Taken
Peterson was knocked out on the play and after an examination,

four stitches were taken in his head above the left eye and just under his nose. His nose was badly bruised, and it was not known if it was broken or not.

The locals added a single run in the third inning on an error, a walk to Arana and a hard line drive by Young.

The fourth and fifth innings were one-two-three for Roseburg, but Medford grabbed four runs in their half of the fifth.

With Dick Meredith on the mound for Roseburg, George Lee drilled the second pitch into center field for the first Medford hit of the game. Bob Pond then followed with a walk, and both runners scored on a triple by Dick Monroe.

Ron Peery then walked, and Monroe scored on an infield out by Wayne Allen. The final run of the inning and the last run of the game for Medford was scored by Peery on an error by Don Wells at third base.

Adds Two More
Roseburg added its final two runs of the game in the sixth inning as Beamer led off with a triple to center, followed by walks to Livingston and Wayne Kennady. Beamer and Kennady then scored on an error by the pitcher.

Leading batter for Roseburg was Bissonnette with 3-5, all singles, followed by Beamer with 2-3, including a triple.

Ron Peery was the top Medford batter with 1-1 and three walks. Monroe and Lee each had 1-4 for Medford.

The three Roseburg pitchers struck out nine batters and walked 11, while two Medford pitchers struck out eight and walked six.

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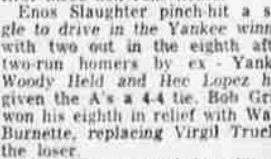
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
