

Roseburg Shut Out, Wins Second Game

For the second time this season Roseburg and Springfield split a district 2 Legion doubleheader baseball game. Springfield won the first game 3-0 and Roseburg came back to nab the second game 3-2 in an extra inning affair at Springfield.

The first game found Roseburg shut out on a two-hitter pitching job by Springfield pitcher Gordon Wright. He also defeated Roseburg the last time he faced them by the score of 4-3.

Tiebreaker Comes Late

In the second game of the doubleheader, Roseburg had to score in the top of the eighth inning to pull its second win of the season in league play out of the fire. Springfield scored all its runs in the second inning of the first game and as it turned out, all the runs of the game.

Ron Nelson led off the inning by reaching first base on an error by Larry Bissonette at shortstop and advanced to third on a single by Rick Herman.

Ted Harper singled to left to score Kelson. Lonnie Shepard then singled to load the bases and a single by Wright brought the two final runs of the game across the plate.

In the second game Roseburg opened the scoring in the top of the second inning as John Livingston led off with a walk and advanced to third on a single by Mac McClellan. Livingston then scored on a double play for the first run of the game.

Springfield tied the score in the bottom of the fourth inning on two hits and a walk, but Roseburg bounced back with another single run in the top of the fifth to take the lead for the second time 2-1.

Byron Baker doubled over the left fielder's head as the first man up in the inning and, after two were out, scored on a single to right by Wes Young.

Roseburg added the final run of the game in the top of the eighth inning on an error on Livingston's ground ball, a walk to Beamer and another single by McClellan.

Springfield threatened to tie the game up in the last of the eighth inning when Herman was safe on an error and was sacrificed to second. Harper then flew out to right.

Ruben Gomez became the first National League pitcher to post 10 victories as the New York Giants defeated St. Louis 5-3 in the first game. The Cardinals came back to win the nightcap 7-1 behind bonus right-hander Lindy McDaniel. Stan Musial hit a three-run homer for the Cards, his 18th of the season.

Brooklyn established a record in reverse when 27 Dodgers struck out as they were held to a split of their doubleheader with the Chicago Cubs. After Chicago had won the opener 3-2, in 11 innings, young Danny McDevitt hurled a five-hitter for his third victory, in Brooklyn's 5-1 triumph.

The Emeralds won the first half championship by a bare, two percentage points, 576 to 574 for the Bears. Eugene won 38 games and lost 28. Yakima was 39-29 for the first half.

The Emeralds, seven and one-half games behind on June 1, fought their way into the lead June 25, relinquished it last Friday night and then swept three games from Lewiston while Yakima gained a 2-1 split with Wenatchee over the weekend.

Eugene will play for the league title, or pick up all the marbles with a repeat of its first half victory.

Emeralds Win Three
The Emeralds dumped Lewiston 8-4 and 9-4 Sunday after bombing the Bronces 26-12 Saturday night. Yakima lost 14-5 to the Chiefs Saturday night and took Sunday's doubleheader, 3-2 and 7-3.

In other league action Sunday, the Salem Senators whipped the Tri-City Braves 8-2. Saturday night, Tri-City won 3-2 and then lost 3-0 in a twin bill.

Ollie Brantley picked up both of Eugene's Sunday victories in relief. He held the Bronces to one run in five-plus innings in the nightcap and in two runs in six-plus innings in the opener.

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Portland Archers Sweep Tourney; 6 Records Set

A total of 87 archers registered for the 30th annual Oregon State Archery Assn. target tournament held in Roseburg on the new city park over the weekend, starting on Friday and ending Sunday afternoon.

Portland archers took home most of the awards with Larry Digby of Roseburg being the only local entrant to get a top prize in the men's division. Digby took first in the men's instinctive round with a score of 1,657 and first in the flight shoot with a distance of 414 yards.

In the women's division, Kathryn Ulrich, also of Roseburg, took first in the flight shoot with a distance of 420 yards. This was a new record, breaking the old record of 402 yards set in 1941.

Top winner in the men's double American round was Dale Fuller, Eugene, with 1,586, followed by Ike Epperly of Eugene and L. D. Hunter, each with 1,538.

Bill Snyder, Portland, was winner in the men's York round with a total of 744. Herb Gifford, Medford, was second with 715 and L. D. Hunter was third with 693.

Digby Wins Instinctive
First place in the men's instinctive round was Digby, Roseburg, with a score of 1,657, followed by Ed Garrouette, Cottage Grove, with 1,565 and John Lankstrom, Springfield, with 1,521.

In the men's clout shoot, Snyder was first with 193, followed by Epperly with 186 and Fuller with 174.

Team honors went to Eugene for the fourth straight year with a total of 2,621. This broke their own record of 2,467 set last year. Second-place with 2,189 was Cottage Grove, followed by Springfield with 2,081. Top individual score in the team shoot was nabbed by Epperly with a score of 683.

Winner in the women's American round was Flo Parsons, Portland, with 579, just edging out Dorothy Fuller, Eugene, who had 572. In third place was Dorothy Vernon, Portland, with 571.

In the women's Columbia round, Marge Hamilton was winner with 508, followed by Elaine Foster, Roseburg, with 504 and Dorothy Vernon with 488.

Hamilton also nabbed first in the women's national round with 410, followed by Parsons and Vernon, each with 380.

Clout shoot winner was also Hamilton, with Dorothy Ballou, Glendale, second with 158 and Beth Harris, Cottage Grove, third with 129.

Portland Gets Team Win
The women's team honors were nabbed by the Solvans of Portland with Cottage Grove second and Eugene third. Dorothy Fuller, Eugene, had the top individual score with 597 in the team shoot.

Kathryn Ulrich was tops in the women's flight shoot with 420, followed by Hazel Ward, Roseburg, second with 388 and Ruth Digby, Roseburg, third with 367.

In the archery golf, held all three days, Stansfield turned in low score for the men with a 53 followed by Snyder and Joel Callison, Portland, with 55.

Only entrant for the women was Dorothy Ballou, who had a score of 54.
