Musial Won All-Star Spot Without Edict

NEW YORK — Stan (The Man) Musial of St. Louis didn't need an assist from Commissioner Ford Frick to gain his customary spot on the National League all-star team, it developed Monday.

Only three days ago, Frick tossed Cincinnati's George Crowe, Gus Bell and Wally Post off the team and replaced them with Musial, Willie Mays and Hank Aaron after he decided that Cincinnati fandom was stuffing the ballot box.

As things turned out, Stan The Man pulled in 363,792 votes for first base compared to 272,655 for Crowe, even after the last-minute

deluge of Redleg votes. Mays and Aaron needed the commissioner's aid, though, in the battle for center field. Bell drew 471,295 votes to 392,573 for the New York Giant flycatcher. Post collected 445,457 votes to 335,918 in the race for right field with Aaron, Milwaukee's top hitter.

But by executive edict, it will be Mays in center field and Aaron in right field when the National League takes the field in St. Louis on July 9. Frick made no comment in announcing the starting team Sunday.

Nor did he have any answer to the Redleg proposal that Bell, Crowe and Post be made "honorary" members of the team so they can collect the gift that goes to each member of the all-stars.

A further statistical note: Even if the Cincinnati landslide hadn't developed, the only other non-Redleg who might have had a chance of making the starting

team was Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee. He might have nosed out Don Hoak for third base. But of course the exact breakdown never will be known.

So the Redleg fans accomplished five-eighths of what they started out to do, a pretty good average. The fans have nothing to say about the pitchers. Manager Walt Alton will tend to that matter later in the week.

Here, then, is how the National League team lines up: Musial, first base; Johnny Temple, Cincinnati, second base; Cincinnati, left field; Mays, center field; Aaron, right field; Ed Bailey, Cincinnati, catcher.

Robinson had the heaviest score, 745,689 votes.

The American League lineup presented no surprises. The New York Yankees and the Detroit Tigers each had two men on the starting team. Kansas City and Washington were shut out.

In the race for top individual vote collector, Boston's Ted Williams (left field) beat out New York's Mickey Mantle (center field), 255,969 to 253,010.

Here is how the American League starting team shapes up: Vic Wertz, Cleveland, first base; Nelson Fox, Chicago, second base; George Kell, Baltimore, third base; Harvey Kuenn, Detroit, shortstop; Williams, left field; Mantle, center field; Al Kaline, Detroit, right field; Yogi Berra, New York, catcher.

18 Scouts To Attend Valley Forge Jamboree

the Ford plant in Detroit, stop to swim in Great Salt Lake in Utah and tour the nearby open pit copper mine, and tentatively stop over night in San Francisco. They will return on July 27.

Their campsite at Valley Forge will be marked by a plywood cut-out of a log truck about 15 feet long and about 15 feet above the ground. Each troop will have display appropriate for its area of the country. Troop 25 will set up mounted photos of the logging industry and a large working model to explain how logs are loaded and dumped.

The boys will do their own cooking sharing the jobs within eight-man patrols. Food will be supplied each day by the jamboree staff.

Brent Long, a 17-year-old Star Scout from Explorer Post 133, Huecrest, will be senior patrol leader in charge of the scouts. He attended the 1953 jamboree held in California, and has twice been to the Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico. His stepfather, Jim Walker, is scoutmaster at Oakridge. Brent's brother Bruce, 13, also a Star Scout in Troop 133, will go to the jamboree with the troop from Oakridge and Springfield.

Steve Bowman, 14, of Roseburg Sea Scout Ship 237 will be Horton's assistant. He is the stepson of L. L. Harpole. Dale Foster, 13, son of George T. Foster, will be leader of the troop's Beaver Patrol. He is a Star Scout in Roseburg Troop 92.

Steve McCarthy, 14, an Eagle Scout of Troop 11, Fullerton, will lead the Eagle Patrol. He gathered fossils to use in the large-scale trading of souvenirs between boys at the jamboree while he was at Camp Hancock in Eastern Oregon this summer. He is the son of Gerald McCarthy.

Many of the scouts from Douglas County will carry items like handmade neckerchief slides, camp emblems, agates and shells, and various collections to barter with the scouts they meet.

Jon Horton, 15, of Ship 237 will accompany his father Les Horton, one of the leaders. Others participating include Don Johnson, 12, of Troop 133, son of Emil Johnson; Steve Moody, 13, of Troop 114, Fullerton, son of Everett O. Moody; Gary Hart, 14, Star Scout of Post 29, Oakland, son of Carl Hart; and John Todd, 14, Star Scout of ship 237, son of John Todd Sr., president of the Boy Scout Oregon Trail Council.

Also in Jamboree Troop 25 will be Gary Meyer, 14, Eagle Scout of Post 133, son of Alfred Meyer; John Verberkmoes, 12, of Roseburg Troop 4, son of Dr. J. G. Verberkmoes; Floyd Wilson, 12, of Troop 92, son of Floyd Wilson Sr., who will go with the scouts; Alan Hemerich, 13, of Troop 92, son of Albert A. Hemerich; and Perry Pearson, 13, Star Scout of Winston Troop 82, son of Cliff Pearson; and Arthur Elliot, 13, of Troop 114, son of Bruce Elliott.

John Brady, the Eagle Scout who will go to the jubilee in England, earned about half of the \$1375 he needed for expenses for the trip. The deficit was made up by contributions from the Roseburg Lions, Elks, Rotary Club, Kenneth Ford, the lumber and sawmill workers union, and a benefit dinner.

John will travel to the jamboree at Valley Forge with the scouts from his district but will camp with a separate troop of scouts who plan to go on to England for the jubilee. There he will camp with jubilee troops from other parts of the United States and visit with scouts from other nations.

He will leave for England from Quebec on July 22. After the jubilee, August 1 to 12, he will be taken on a tour of Europe. He will visit London, Utrecht, Amsterdam, Munich, Vienna, Venice, Genoa, the French and Italian rivers, Monte Carlo, Nice, and Paris. In Paris he will have over a full day of free time to do as he pleases in addition to conducted tours. He will return to New York

Army Engineers Award Hills Creek Dam Jobs

PORTLAND — Army Engineers Saturday announced award of a \$20,572,366 dam construction contract to Texas and Iowa firms.

The job goes to the Green Construction Co. of Des Moines and the Tecum Corporation of Dallas. They submitted a joint bid for the Hills Creek Dam in Western Oregon.

It is the main contract for the 34 1/2-million-dollar dam on the middle fork of the Willamette River near the headwaters.

Work started last year on the dam, which is related to another dam, the Lookout Point project, for flood control and power generation.

The Hills Creek Dam will be a dirt and gravel barrier 1,920 feet long and 335 feet higher. It will have a generating capacity of 30,000 kilowatts.
