

Premature Infant Celebrates First Year

Jeanne Marianne Gilbert, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gilbert of Grants Pass, celebrated her first birthday June 23, although she shouldn't have been able to dip into her first birthday cake until some time this fall.

She was born so tiny that her survival made medical history. She weighed in at the Josephine General Hospital in Grants Pass at 1 pound, 14 1/2 ounces, and physicians did not dare to measure her before placing her in an incubator. Only much later was an identifica-

tion bracelet placed on her arm. Recently, her father, Joe Gilbert of Grants Pass, was looking at that bracelet and could not draw it over his own little finger.

Physicians believe the infant was somewhere from three to four months premature at birth. Rarely does a child less than seven months old survive, even with today's modern hospital incubators.

Jeanne, grown to 5 pounds, 11 ounces, came home after two months and three weeks in the hospital. At one year of age she weighs 19 pounds and is 25 inches tall. She crawls, pulls up at the side of her play pen and other furniture and walks, with assistance. She has three teeth. Her parents say

she is normal for what her age "should be."

Jeanne has had two close calls during her short life. One was an attack of flu for which she was hospitalized for a week soon after arrival at home. The other was a fire which gutted the family home early this year. The baby, her parents, and an older sister were able to reach safety through a bedroom window.

Judge Throws Out Contest Suit Over Will

PORTLAND — Federal Judge William C. Mathes, sitting here, threw out a suit Monday contesting the will of the late Mrs. Maria C. Jackson.

It involved the ownership of the Oregon Journal, of which her husband was a founder.

Mathes said he lacked full jurisdiction. But an attorney who helped prepare the case for Peter Crockett Jackson, 15, great grandson of Mrs. Jackson, said there will be further legal action.

The suit said that a will filed after her death in February, 1956, did not reflect her wish to give her property to Peter Jackson.

The Journal's ownership was put in a foundation administered by William W. Knight, publisher; David Lloyd Davies, corporation attorney; and the U.S. National Bank.

In an 8,500-word decision, the judge ruled that the federal court does not have jurisdiction because the case has to do with probate matters over which Oregon probate courts have jurisdiction.

Mrs. Jackson's estate has been estimated at more than \$2,400,000.

Young Jackson now lives in North Hollywood, Calif., with his mother.
