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Five Braves Named To All-Star Lineup; Musial Named 14th Time

CINCINNATI — Manager Walter Alton of the Brooklyn Dodgers dipped deep into the ranks of the Milwaukee Braves today to complete a 25-man National League squad that will meet American League stars in the annual major league All-Star game at St. Louis July 9.

Alton, as manager of the 1956 league champion Dodgers, will pilot the All-Stars. He picked five Braves, including All-Star veteran pitcher Warren Spahn.

Hank Aaron of the Braves already had been named by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick as the starting third baseman in place of Wally Post of the Cincinnati Reds, who led a fans' vote which Frick said was "unbalanced" by an avalanche of votes from Cincinnati.

Alton's selections, plus the fans' vote for Don Hoak of Cincinnati as the starting third baseman, gave the National League eight "freshmen," as far as All-Star competition is concerned.

But the National League also had the "All Star" of All-Stars in first baseman Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals, named for the 14th time.

Five Tabbed
Milwaukeeans named by Alton, as announced from National League headquarters, were pitchers Lew Burdette and Spahn and infielders Eddie Mathews, Johnny Logan and Red Schoendienst.

Alton named four right-handers and three southpaws on his hurling staff and, among them, they had a combined 47 win and 29 lost record through games of last Friday.

Spahn of the Braves is the most seasoned All-Star veteran. He has been on eight previous All-Star squads.

Curt Simmons of the Philadelphia Phils and Johnny Antonelli of the New York Giants will be the other southpaws while the right-handers will be Burdette, Larry Jackson of the St. Louis Cardinals, Clem Labine of Alton's Dodgers and Jack Sanford of the Phils.

Burdette, Jackson and Sanford are first timers.

The starting outfield will be Aaron, Willie Mays of the Giants and Frank Robinson of the Cincinnati Reds. They will be joined by Alton's pick of the Cardinals, Gus Bell of the Cardinals, and two newcomers to All-Star play, Gino Cimoli of the Dodgers and Wally Moon of the Cardinals.

Supporting the starting infield of Hoak, Roy McMillan and John

ny Temple of Cincinnati and Musial of the Cardinals will be Alton's selections of Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs, Gil Hodges of the Dodgers, and Logan, Schoendienst and Mathews of the Braves.

Alton picked Hank Foiles of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Hal Smith of the Cardinals, both first year men in All-Star competition, to back up starting catcher Ed Bailey of the Redlegs.

Gibson Leads Three U. S. Ladies To Semis

WIMBLEDON, England — Top-seeded Althea Gibson of New York defeated Sandra Reynolds of South Africa 6-3, 6-4 Tuesday to lead three American women into the semifinals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

Other U. S. winners were 21-year-old Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., who upset second-seeded Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., 6-2, 6-7, 6-4, and Mrs. Dorothy Head Knodel of Forest Hills, N.Y., who won over Rosa Maria Reyes of Mexico, 6-4, 6-0.

An all-American women's sweep was prevented by a 16-year-old British lass, Christine Truman, who defeated Mrs. Betty Pratt of Jamaica, B.W.I., 5-7, 6-4. Mrs. Pratt is the former Betty Rosenquest of South Orange, N.J.

The unseeded Miss Truman upset third-seeded Shirley Bloomer, British Wightman Cup star, in the previous round.

Miss Hard, 21, is one of the bright new crop of young female tennis players being developed in America. She was seeded No. 5 in this tournament.

Miss Brough, 34, won at Wimbledon in 1918, 1949, 1950 and 1955. The veteran tennis pair of Gardnar Mulloy of Denver and Budgie Patty of Los Angeles and Paris upset third-seeded Ashley Cooper and Mal Anderson of Australia, 6-3, 6-0, in the quarterfinals of the men's doubles.

The American couple—Mulloy is 42 and Patty 32—outplayed and outmaneuvered the young Aussies. Cooper is only 29 and is tipped as the future men's champ. Anderson is 22.

The Australians paired Anderson and Cooper in the doubles at Wimbledon with a view to trying them out as a possible Davis Cup team. They probably will forget those ideas now.

Granted Stay
NEW YORK — The International Boxing Club was conducting business at the same old stand today and will continue to do so until at least Nov. 1, courtesy of Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan.

Judge Ryan yesterday ordered Jim Norris and Arthur Wirtz, the two top wheels in the IBC, to break up the club, but immediately granted them a four-month stay to enable them to appeal to the Supreme Court.

"Our present thinking is that we will appeal," said Norris.

Judge Ryan said the IBC must file for the review within 60 days or the government could nullify the stay he granted. Norris agreed to have his attorneys ask for the review.

Most of the final judgment comprised findings that Judge Ryan had previously announced when he found the IBC guilty of monopoly.

Three American Sailors Killed In Ship Fire

MARSEILLE, France — Three American sailors were killed Wednesday in a flash fire that started on a small French harbor craft and spread to the U.S. aircraft carrier Lake Champlain. A French dockhand perished.

The blaze raged around the stern of the 40,130-ton 6th Fleet carrier for 45 minutes before it was extinguished.

The 30-foot harbor boat had pulled up alongside the Lake Champlain to unload automobiles and other equipment needed ashore by the carrier crew. The three American sailors were aboard the boat when the fire broke out.

Within minutes, harbor fire-fighting boats steamed out to the Lake Champlain and pumped heavy streams of water on the landing craft and the carrier.

SPOKANE — The Pacific Northwest Golf Assn. extended the entry deadline for 42 hours Monday in an effort to fill up the field for the PPGA amateur tournament here next week.

6 Soldiers, Two Others Die As 2 Autos Crash

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo. — Eight persons were killed in the head-on crash of two automobiles on a sweeping curve in Wyoming's Red Desert Monday night. Two others were seriously injured.

A witness, Buddy Mills of Rock Springs, said a convertible carrying six soldiers was "pushed together like an accordion. The engine was pushed right into the front seat and the steering wheel went out of the convertible roof."

The second car's front end was pushed into the front seat and the whole back seat was tossed against the front seat," Mills added.

The soldiers were on leave from Ft. Lewis, Wash., for trips to their homes in Southern states after completing their basic training. They were identified as Pvt. Willis R. Army Engineers Award Contract For Big Dam

PORTLAND — Army Engineers awarded a contract for work at the Cougar Dam site and called for bids on a bridge across the North Santiam River at the Detroit Dam Tuesday.

The contract went to Newton & Co., Portland, on a bid of \$11,100 to clear 75 acres downstream from the proposed Cougar Dam on the south fork of the McKenzie River.

The North Santiam bridge is to replace one that failed last summer, and now is used for foot traffic only. The new bridge will make use of four 96-foot long girders from the old Deschutes River Highway bridge, removed because of construction of The Dalles Dam on the Columbia River.

Bids will be opened July 23.
