Theater Season Open at Ashland

America's first Elizabethan theater has officially opened its 17th season here at Ashland for the Oregon Shakespearean Festival.

A cast and crew numbering more than 60 persons have registered for the summer production scheduled for 1955 by its present producing director, Angus L. Bowmer, the festival annually attracts actors and audiences from all parts of the world. This year's staff is drawn from 17 states and England.

William Patton, general manager for the event, reports that advance ticket sales are three weeks ahead of last year, and new attendance records are anticipated.

Scheduled for production this year are "As You Like It," "Othello," "Two Gentlemen of Verona," and "Henry VIII" offered in nightly rotation throughout August, together with two special stagings of "Pericles, Prince of Tyre" on Aug. 23 and 29.

In addition to Bowmer, this year's directors include James Sandoe of the University of Colorado and Robert B. Loper, staff director of the Stanford University Drama Department. All are veteran directors on Ashland's famed open-air stage.

Patterning after the Fortune Theatre of late 16th-Century London, the Ashland theater enables true Elizabethan staging of Shakespeare's plays. Multiple acting areas allow an unbroken flow of action from beginning to end. Strolling musicians entertain the audiences with Elizabethan music prior to each performance.

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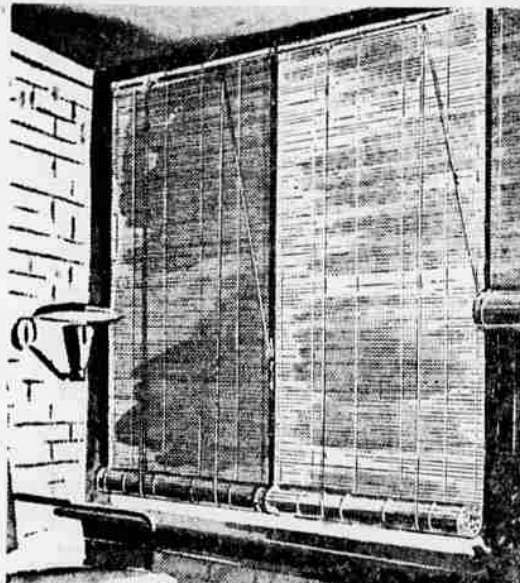
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
