Chuck Lybeck won the opener for the Senators with a five-hitter. A walk and two doubles gave Salem two runs in the first inning.

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The third run came in the third and Terry Maddox provided the final run of the game in the fourth inning with a home run.

Senator Says TV Channel Switch Is Premature
WASHINGTON — It would be "premature" to switch educational television channel 9 in Eugene to commercial use, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Tuesday. Neuberger made the comment as he filed with the Federal Communications Commission a protest to the proposed transfer.

Oregon has only two other educational channels, at Portland and Corvallis, Neuberger said. No decision on the Eugene channel should be made until it is known how well the other two serve the state, he said.

Langley Files Motion Attacking Indictments
PORTLAND — A former Multnomah County District Attorney, ousted from office for failure to prosecute gamblers, has filed motions attacking five indictments returned against him in this city's long vice probe.

Later indictments have superceded earlier ones charging malfeasance in office and conspiracy to obstruct justice, William Langley said in motions filed Tuesday in Circuit Court.

Three other indictments, Langley said, were biased because, he charged, a grand jury was impeded illegally and was influenced with "forged, false and perjured" evidence.

These indictments include charges of receiving a bribe.

Judge Orders Service Restored To Former Job

WASHINGTON — A federal district judge Wednesday ordered John Stewart Service restored to his job as a State Department foreign service officer as of Dec. 14, 1951—the day he was fired.

This means, in effect, that legally Service wasn't fired at all. District Judge James W. Morris signed an order saying Service was improperly discharged by former Secretary of State Dean Acheson. The judge said Service is entitled to the benefit of "all rights, emoluments and privileges flowing from a continuity of service as a foreign service officer—class 2."

This followed up a Supreme Court decision June 17 holding that Acheson wrongfully discharged Service after the Loyalty Review Board found there was reasonable doubt as to his loyalty.

Negroes Boycott Stores In Vote Right Protest
TUSKEGEE, Ala. — Leaders of the Montgomery bus boycott gave support today to the refusal of Tuskegee Negroes to trade with white merchants.

Outraged by the passage of a legislative act virtually abolishing Negro voting in Tuskegee, members of that race have refrained from patronizing stores here for more than a week.
