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Ott Hearing Set In Court Tuesday

A hearing to determine the fitness of Mr. and Mrs. Howard B. Ott of Roseburg to continue having custody of three foster children will be held in juvenile court here Tuesday starting at 9:30 a.m.

The three youngsters—one of them a Korean war orphan—were taken from the Otts June 28 following the filing of a dependency petition by District Attorney Avery Thompson. The children were placed in the custody of the Douglas County Public Welfare Commission by order of Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

The Korean child, Timothy, is 19 months of age. The others are Michael, 6½, and Rebecca, 5. Timothy was adopted by the Otts through World Vision, Inc., best known by its Oregon representative, Harry Holt of Creswell.

Thompson's petition alleges mistreatment of the children including these charges:

1. That the atmosphere of the home is characterized by the beating of minor children with instruments unfit for disciplinary purposes.
2. The home has been characterized by neglect of medical care which has resulted in serious diseases resulting from bruises.
3. That the home is characterized by the conduct of Edith Ott by barbarous, unjustified and senseless acts, supposed to be acts of discipline, without mature reflections or judgment.
4. That the children have received innumerable and severe bruises and abrasions without the concern and with the complete indifference of Edith Ott.

When Judge Woodrich issued his temporary order removing the children from the Ott home at 1912 NE Commercial Ave., officers from the sheriff's office accompanied by a representative of the juvenile office served the papers and took the children. Tuesday's hearing is to determine if permanent removal of the children should be made.

Three Drown, Car Kills 1 On Sunday

The long Fourth of July holiday and weekend cost 15 lives in Oregon.

Ten persons drowned and five others died in traffic.

The final day saw three drownings and a fatal highway collision.

Near Central Point Sunday evening, 2-year-old Donald Wolf fell into an irrigation ditch and drowned. He had toddled after his father and brothers, who did not immediately notice his disappearance.

An unusually large wave washed Earl Booth, 23, Tillamook, to his death in the ocean at Terra Del Mar Beach, near Pacific City, Sunday.

Three Escape Wave
Booth was in ankle-deep water, with his wife, Ardie, 20; Jack Hulbert, 21; and Hulbert's brother, Mervyn, 19. The Santiam River wave knocked all of them down. All except Booth managed to make their way to safety. He was swept to sea.

Another Sunday drowning victim was Lester Burleson, 16, of Turner, who went under while swimming in the Santiam River, about 15 miles south of Salem.

William C. Saville, 18, Eugene, was injured fatally in the Sunday collision of his motorcycle with an automobile near Disston, southeast of Cottage Grove.

Seven other persons drowned earlier in the holiday period and traffic mishaps had taken four lives.

Chorus Of Charges Rises Upon Fallen Russ Heads

MOSCOW (AP) — Ominous-sounding charges piled up Monday against former Premier Georgi Malenkov and the so-called anti-party group ousted in the latest Kremlin purge.

But Communist Party boss N. S. Khrushchev and Premier Nikolai Bulganin flew off to Red-ruled Czechoslovakia in an atmosphere of confidence and gaiety.

The latest charge against Malenkov came from a Leningrad party leader who accused Stalin's former right hand man of trying to force him to sign a forgery. This was only one voice in a swelling chorus of condemnation which already has branded Malenkov the chief organizer of Stalin's 1939 Leningrad purge. For participation in that, a group of security officials were executed in December, 1954.

Liquidation Hailed
The Communist parties of the Soviet orbit joined the chorus of denunciation in Prague, with Khrushchev and Bulganin due, the official party newspaper Rude Pravo hailed "the liquidation of the anti-party group" headed by Malenkov and V. M. Molotov. It added:

"The Soviet comrades come to a country which will never leave the barricades of Communism, where the Red flag is raised by the Soviet Union... Our meetings with the Soviet leaders will result in absolute agreements which will demonstrate a strengthening of the partnership of the socialist states on all fundamental questions."

Czechoslovakia's Communist leadership has been considered the most persistently Stalinist of the entire East European bloc.

Originally, Khrushchev and Bulganin were to have gone to Prague by train, a 36-hour trip. They shifted plans and went by plane, a matter of a few hours. They may stop over in Warsaw, Prague Radio said they are due in Prague Tuesday.

Serov Present
With the Soviet leaders was their security chief, Gen. Ivan A. Serov. Seeing them off Monday morning at Moscow airport were most of the members of the newly expanded Presidium which rules the Soviet Party. Former economy czar Mikhail G. Pervukhin, dismissed as a deputy premier and demoted from full to alternate member of the Presidium in the purge, was among those on hand, but he was the only one of the purge targets present.

Khrushchev and Bulganin went down the line, shaking hands and chatting cheerily before their departure.

Behind them in Moscow, the party piled up its case against Malenkov, Molotov, Lazar Kaganovich and the other targets of the purge. Former President Nikolai Shverin joined Khrushchev in the top-level condemnation. In the wake of this, a Leningrad party official insisted Malenkov tried to force him to be party to a forgery.

The alleged coercion attempt took place in Leningrad in 1949 and apparently was part of the case in which several top Communists were illegally executed. Lavrenty P. Beria and Victor Abakumov, one of Beria's main assistants in the Soviet secret police, were subsequently shot for their part in framing the case.

I. N. Turko charged in a Leningrad speech made public Monday that Malenkov "persistently endeavored to force me to sign a forgery, a statement I knew was a forgery."

When all Malenkov's efforts failed, Turko said, "I was threatened and accused of every mortal sin."

"Everything the Central Committee said about him and his character was correct from beginning to end," Turko said. "Malenkov was rude and ruthless, a man without honor and conscience."

Shverin, in a speech made public Sunday, accused Malenkov, Molotov and Kaganovich of being linked to Stalin's bloody purges of the 30s.

Washington Toll Counted At 8

Washington Monday counted an accidental death toll of eight persons for the long Independence Day weekend. Three died in traffic mishaps. Five drowned in water.

The traffic toll was well below the seven persons the State Patrol predicted would die on Washington's highways and streets during the 102-hour holiday, which ended at midnight Sunday.

Idaho Homestead Open To Canyonville Veteran

A Canyonville man became eligible for a homestead in Idaho Friday during drawings for a portion of the Minidoka project near Rupert, according to The Associated Press.

Ted B. Pohl was one of 13 Oregonians named. Some 51 Idahoans became eligible. They were among the first 140 names drawn.

The Bureau of Reclamation is awarding the homesteads to veterans who qualify. Some 20,000 acres were covered by Friday's drawings, with 10,000 acres remaining.

Russia Rejects Atom Proposal

LONDON (AP) — British officials said Monday Russia apparently has rejected the West's plan for an expert study to devise a system for controlling a ban on nuclear weapon tests and production.

They said Soviet delegate Valerian Zorin told Monday's United Nations Disarmament subcommittee meeting here.

"To bring experts together is a waste of time," Zorin said.

Britain, the United States, France and Canada last week proposed that an expert group of scientists should meet to work out details of a control system.

The task of the controllers would be to insure that the United States, Britain and Russia respect any agreement to stop atomic and hydrogen bomb testing. Russia has accepted the need for an international control system.

Jap Woman Lured, Supreme Court Told

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government told the Supreme Court Monday the Japanese woman fatally injured by GI William S. Girard on a firing range in Japan was enticed to come forward and pick up scrap metal.

Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin said "enticement and inducement" had an important bearing on the government's decision to turn over Girard for trial in Japanese courts on a manslaughter charge.

A Rankin, however, told the court Girard himself has denied he injured the woman and other Japanese to come forward to gather scrap.

The eight justices hearing arguments which will determine whether Girard will be tried by Japan showed considerable interest in this question: Was there, as Chief Justice Warren phrased it, actual inducement for the Japanese to come forward "and pick up scrap?"

Overdue Adventurers Cross Pacific In Amphibious Jeep

SEATTLE (AP) — Two adventurers attempting to cross the periphery North Pacific in an amphibious jeep arrived safely Sunday night at Shemya Island, six days overdue from Japan, Northwest Airlines reported Monday.

The airline, which maintains a station at Shemya in the outer Aleutians, said the jeep, dubbed the Half Sea, reached the island at 8:30 p.m. Sunday.

Aboard were Ben Carlin, 45, an Australian who began a round-the-world trip in the jeep seven years ago, and Boyde de Mente, 28, Phoenix, Ariz., who joined Carlin in Japan.

Holiday Death Record 736; Road Toll Below Forecast

Violent deaths killed at least 736 persons during the long Independence Day holiday period.

As always, traffic accidents accounted for the greatest portion of the staggering toll, but in this holiday period the toll came far below the predicted 535.

Late reports increased the count slightly, showing there were at least 426 persons killed in motor vehicle accidents between 6 p.m. (local time) Wednesday and midnight Sunday. Drownings during the 102-hour period took 211 lives and another 98 died in miscellaneous accidents.

California led the nation in highway deaths with 50.

The relatively low traffic toll evoked this comment from Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council:

"Drivers and traffic enforcement agencies now have demonstrated that extra traffic volume and danger can be offset by extra care and effort. Motorists and traffic officers deserve a big pat on the back for a splendid job of efficient teamwork."

Such an achievement just can't help but make things safer on the highways the whole year round."

Crosby Trial Begins Today

PORTLAND (AP) — The conspiracy trial of Teamsters Union official Clyde Crosby opened in state court here Monday.

The union's international representative for Oregon is accused of arranging for a Portland site, and then of trying to get the site selected for an eight-million-dollar city sports center.

This happened, the indictment charges, when Crosby was a member of the city's Exposition Recreation Commission. Crosby was in charge of site selection.

He is accused of conspiring in this with Joseph McLaughlin, Seattle cardroom operator, and James Elkins, Portland gambler.

Crosby also has been indicted on several other counts in the Portland vice investigation.

7 Die In California

SAUGUS, Calif. (AP) — Seven persons, including five members of one family, were killed yesterday in one of the worst auto crashes of the holiday weekend.

Court Orders Closure Of Parks At Night

County parks will be closed from 10:30 p.m. to 4 a.m. each night according to new rules adopted by the Douglas County Court.

Exceptions will be parks designated as overnight camping areas and individuals or groups granted permits to be in the parks after closing. The new rule may be enforced by prosecution of violators for trespass.

Another addition to park rules requires that fires must be only in stoves, fireplaces or other proper places in the parks.

State Police Sgt. McCullum Transferred To Milwaukie

After 13 years with the Oregon State Police here in Douglas County, William McCullum has been promoted to the rank of sergeant and is being transferred to Milwaukie where he will be assigned to the department's arson squad.

McCullum's promotion and transfer were announced by H. G. Mallon, superintendent. He is to report for his new assignment by Aug. 1.

The arson squad to which McCullum has been assigned is a select group composed of three lieutenants, one captain and one sergeant—McCullum.

The new sergeant made application to join the state police while living at Umatilla. Upon acceptance, he was assigned to the office here in the traffic division. In addition to regular duties, McCullum has figured in many major investigations conducted by the department including temporary assignment to the Portland vice probe.

McCullum was born and reared in Eugene and worked nearly eight years for the Eugene Water Board as a lineman before enlisting in the Navy in World War II. Upon receiving his discharge with the rating of first class electrician's mate, he went to Umatilla where he worked for a trucking firm until joining the state police.

McCullum and his wife June have four children ranging in age from 8 months to 8 years. Thomas is 8 months; Sally, 4; Suzanne, 6, and Johnnie, 8.

Spying For Reds Charged To Two

NEW YORK (AP) — A one-time Army intelligence officer and his wife, former New Yorkers now living in Paris, were indicted Monday by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiring to transmit vital U. S. secrets to the Soviet Union and its agents.

U. S. Atty. Paul W. Williams identified the couple as George Zlatovskii, 47, and Jane Foster Zlatovskii, 45.

A five-count indictment against the couple charged that they had conspired with a group of Soviet nationals and with Jack and Myra Sobel and with Jacob Alham to transmit to Russia secrets vital to the defense of the United States.

The Sobels and Alham, all of whom were arrested last Jan. 25 on spy charges, have pleaded guilty to conspiring to obtain secret U. S. documents with the knowledge that they were to be transmitted to the Soviet Union.

They are now awaiting sentence.

Williams said the Zlatovskis were living in Paris as late as 1955, but he had no information as to their whereabouts.

French authorities are being asked to locate and extradite them.

If convicted under count one of the indictment, they could receive the death penalty. The other counts embrace lesser charges and penalties.

Sutherland Budget Meet Set Tonight

A preliminary to Tuesday's vote on Sutherland's streamlined city budget is scheduled tonight preceding the City Council meeting.

The hearing on the 1957-58 budget is scheduled at 8. The council will take up its regular business following the hearing.

The second test of the special levy above the 6 per cent limitation will be held Tuesday from noon to 8 p.m. Voters in the city's three precincts will go to the polls to determine the fate of \$28,929.18 outside the 6 per cent limitation. Total expenditures estimated are \$241,426. Only \$132,964, however, will go toward operating expenses. The rest is to be used to retire water and sewer bonds.

Voting places are the City Hall for precincts 1 and 2 and the Douglas County Housing Authority office for precinct 3.

The budget figure amount up for a vote is the same submitted June 4. It was defeated by 17 votes.

Since then, city officials have been campaigning vigorously. They point out that the amount outside the 6 per cent limitation is 23 per cent below the figure approved a year ago. It also means a decrease of 7.7 mills in the city tax rate.

Postmaster Nominated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) has recommended appointment of Mrs. Ethel G. Paul as acting postmaster at Winchester Bay, Douglas County, Ore. She would succeed Mrs. Lois A. Grubbs, retiring July 31. The position pays \$3,880 a year.
