You can skip the "Who's on first?" guessing game in the National League for most of this week anyway. It's the St. Louis Cardinals by 2 1/2 games as the majors headed into the All-Star game break with no pennant action scheduled until Wednesday.

Judging by the Cards' five-game winning streak and 9 out of 10 surge, they may be in first place a lot longer than that. They could go all the way too.

The Cards and Dodgers each hit the 77-game halfway mark simultaneously yesterday with the Cards in front and the champion Dodgers down.

That should prove it's a different year for the Nationals. The Brooks haven't been out of the

first division at the midway point since 1948.

The Dodgers whirled out of the first division in a dizzying reshuffle of the standings. The Cards belted the Cincinnati Redlegs twice 3-2 and 9-6, Philadelphia blasted Brooklyn 2-1 and 5-3, and Milwaukee whipped Chicago 4-2. This sent the Redlegs from second to third, the Braves from third to second, the Phils from fifth to third, and Brooklyn from fourth to fifth.

Pittsburgh even got into the act. The Pirates, with Frank Thomas and Dick Groat on a home-plate binge, whaled the New York Giants 10-6 and 8-1 and moved out of the cellar. The Cubs dropped in.

In the American League, the New York Yankees also held a 25-game edge over the Chicago White Sox in the two-team race. The Yanks whipped Washington 7-5, but lost half a game to the White Sox, who bounced Cleveland 9-8 in 13 innings, and 7-2. Baltimore beat Boston 8-4 on Bob Niekman's four homers batted in, and Detroit downed Kansas City 5-2, with Al Kaline and Charley Maxwell driving in all five runs.

Joe Cunningham kept the Cards blazing with six hits—three in each game—to boost his average to .391. The 25-year-old outfielder from Saddle Brook, N.J., hammered home all three runs in the opener, the first two with a homer, and the winner with a single in the 10th.

In the second game, Wally Moon whacked a double and a homer, and Bobby (Gene) Smith sent home four runs with a single.

Nationals Favored In All-Star Contest As Stengel Faces Jinx

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Casey Stengel may pin his hopes on his own New York Yankees as he seeks to end his midsummer jinx here tomorrow when the best of the American and National leagues clash in the silver anniversary of the All-Star game.

The grizzled Yankee pilot selected six members of his own team to the squad to go along with the two Yankee starters picked by the fans. Casey has a profound respect for the awesome power of the National League, which has defeated Stengel-led teams five times in six games.

The odds-makers have established the Nationals a 6-5 favorite to capture their seventh in the last eight All-Star games. The American League leads in over-all games 13-10.

Starting pitchers for both sides were still a mystery. Neither Stengel nor Walter Alston, the Nationals' manager, has given any hint. Logical choices, however, would be Billy Loes (9-4) of Baltimore or Jim Bunning (10-2) of Detroit for the American League against either Curt Simmons (8-6) of Philadelphia or Johnny Antonelli (7-7) of New York.

One thing appears almost certain. The American League will open with a right-hander and the National with a left-hander. Right-handers Loes and Bunning and left-handers Simmons and Antonelli are the most rested.

Loes and Bunning have had no previous All-Star experience. Simmons and Antonelli have appeared in three games, and Antonelli stopped the American Leaguers cold last year.

As it was last year, the National League team will be dominated by the Cincinnati Redlegs with five players in the starting lineup. They are second baseman Johnny

Million Mark
Milwaukee drew 33,616 customers to become the first club in the majors to hit the million mark in attendance. The Braves have drawn 1,008,980. Lew Burdette spun a six-hitter for his first victory since May 18. Wes Covington and Frank Torre's climaxed a three-run first inning with successive triples and that did it for Lew.

The Phils took their first double-header from the Dodgers in nearly three years. Ed Bouchee's ninth-inning homer beat Sal Maglie in the first game and ex-Dodger Chico Fernandez's three-run double in the sixth inning broke up a 2-2 tie in the windup.

Thomas hit three homers for the Giants and was on base nine times in 10 tries in the twin bill. He homered with a mar on the first two times up. Groat collected a homer in each game—and drove in five runs in the nightcap. In all the Pirates clubbed seven homers.

The White Sox ran their winning streak to five. They came from behind a 6-0 count to nip the Indians. Jim Rivera's triple and Luis Aparicio's game-winning single did it in the 13th inning. The Sox clubbed All-Star hurler Early Wynn for three runs in the first inning of the second game to make things easy for Jack Harshman.

Jack Pitched a five-hitter, including Rocky Colavito's homer. Rocky got one in the first game too.

Yogi Berra's three-run double off Chuck Stobbs was the big blow of a four-run rally in the eighth inning which carried the Yanks to their victory over Washington.

Temple, shortstop Roy McMillan, third baseman Don Hoak, left fielder Frank Robinson and catcher Ed Bailey.

Stan Musial of St. Louis, who has played more All-Star games than anyone, will be at first base in his 14th game. Hank Aaron of Milwaukee will be in right field and Willie Mays of the Giants in center. Musial and Bailey are the only starters who have left-handed.

The American League will have four southpaw swingers and four right-handed hitters if the National at starts with a left-hander. Mickey Mantle, the center fielder, bats both ways. The right-handers are third baseman George Kell (Baltimore), shortstop Harvey Kuenn (Detroit) and right fielder Al Kaline (Detroit). The left-handers are first baseman Vic Wertz (Cleveland), second baseman Nellie Fox (Chicago), left fielder Ted Williams (Boston) and catcher Yogi Berra (New York).

Jim Bunning, Detroit righthander, will start for the American League and Curt Simmons, Philadelphia lefthander, for the National League Tuesday in the silver anniversary All-Star baseball game.

Bunning has a 10-2 record and Simmons is 8-4.

Roseburg drivers again nabbed most of the first place awards at the hardtop races held at the Roseburg Speedway Saturday night.

Taking every race but two of the heats and the B-main event, they took at least a second place in every race but one, the second heat race, where three Coos Bay drivers took the laurels.

Winner of the A-trophy dash was Bud Van Osten in car 76. Van Osten, from Roseburg, was followed to the pole by two other Roseburg drivers, Jim Standley in car 22 in second place and Grant Feero in car 26 third.

Lone out of town winner in the four main races was Chuck Roberts, Cottage Grove, who took first in the B-trophy dash. Roberts in car 38 was just ahead of Lou Donelan, Roseburg, in car 90 in second place and Russell Werner, Coos Bay, in car 32 in third place.

Pollard came back to win the A-main event, taking the lead at the end of lap number 34 of the 35-lap race. He trailed all the way, starting from the last position.

Chinook And Steelhead Fish Migrations Lagging Behind

Fish migrations, both chinook and steelhead, are lagging behind normal for the date of June 30, according to the twice monthly report from the Roseburg office of the State Game Commission.

The salmon count has definitely been disappointing, it is stated, inasmuch as it is the first that has

failed to show large increase over the parent run. The current migration is feared to have been damaged by floods which occurred as the fish were en route to the ocean.
