Two Sutherlin police officers, Audie Campbell and Tim Goodson, have resigned from the force, Richard Crumal, chief of police, announced.

Air Force's 1st Supersonic Bomber Shown

FORT WORTH, Tex. — The Air Force Wednesday proudly displayed its first supersonic bomber—"It's even better than we expected," a general said—and announced plans to buy more for testing purposes.

Lt. Gen. C. S. Irvine, head of Air Force weapons procurement, said at the official unveiling of the B38 Hustler that the Convair atomic super-bomber as of now is the fastest in the world—"and we plan to buy an additional test quantity."

Irvine told newsmen the Air Force already has ordered 13 B38s for testing and is so pleased with the first ones that it is talking about buying 17 or 18 more.

The plane is being built here by Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp. Gen. Irvine said the Air Force has found it good practice to acquire up to 30 test planes of a promising new type before deciding whether to go on with a production order.

It's a surprisingly small nose-cone, delta-wing craft, with four powerful jet engines. It carries a crew of three. The length is 95 feet and wing span 55 feet.

Irvine said he was unable to give a B38 cost estimate but guessed that it would be close to that of the much larger and slower Boeing B52 heavy jet bomber.

Asked about the speed of the B38, Irvine said he could report only that it was higher supersonic. But he said later that it was designed to approach twice the speed of sound—and we are already to the point where we can make it go faster than it was designed to go.

Segregationists' Trial Jury Picked

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — The jury for the Clinton trial was completed Wednesday with the selection of four alternates and the federal government prepared to present its case against the 16 segregationists.

Selection of two men and two women filled the panel of 12 jurors and four alternates.

On trial in U. S. District Court are Northern segregationist John Kasper and 15 Clinton area residents. They are accused of criminal contempt of court for alleged violation of an injunction prohibiting interference with integration of Clinton High School last fall.

The extent of feeling aroused by the case was evident by answers and statements of the jury candidates during the past three days.

The 50-odd panel of prospective jurors was almost exhausted when the jury was completed. Only six names were left.

An all-white jury consisting of 10 men and two women was completed late Tuesday.

Third Army Commander Rebukes Col. Nickerson

ATLANTA — The conduct of guided missile expert Col. John C. Nickerson was "unlawful and reprehensible," the commander of the Third Army said Tuesday in approving his court-martial sentence for misuse of secret defense information.

Lt. Gen. Thomas F. Hickey delivered the stern rebuke in an official reprimand as he ordered into execution the sentence handed down June 29 after a five-day trial at Redstone Arsenal at Huntsville, Ala.

The case still must be reviewed by the Department of the Army and the Secretary of Defense.

In addition to the reprimand and a \$100 a month fine for 15 months to be deducted in advance, the 41-year-old West Point graduate was suspended from rank for one year.

Operators, Court Slate Timber Sales Discussion

Several lumber operators are scheduled to meet with the Douglas County Court Thursday at 2 p. m. in the courthouse to discuss the Bureau of Land Management method of determining values of timber for sales.

It is only a coincidence that both of them are quitting at the same time.

Campbell has been with the Sutherlin police department for the past 2 1/2 years. He lives at 874 W. Central Ave. with his wife, Francis and one son, Randall, 15 months. He plans on seeking work at Stockton, Calif.

Goodson has been a patrolman at Sutherlin for three years. He plans on going into the trucking business at Porterville, Calif. Goodson lived at Porterville before he came to Sutherlin.

Both men praised Crumal. "I have never worked for a better guy than Crumal, and if I was going to continue in police work it would be for the chief," Goodson said. Campbell and Goodson appeared at a special city council meeting this morning and stated they heard there were rumors being circulated that they were being fired from their positions.

Such is not true and both of them said they wished to go into other lines of work.

Harold L. Forney, who lived at 143 SE Miller Ave., Roseburg, will go to work for the Sutherlin police force July 15, Crumal said. Forney is a member of the Roseburg police reserve and has worked for the city for four years.

Crumal said he is considering two or three applicants for patrolman and announcement of a new man is expected to be made within the next month. The department is allotted four men. The other person is Dave Pichette who has been an employee of the city for approximately nine years.

Symphony Member Tells Travel Story

The two-week travels and attendance of three members of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra at the annual American League of Symphony Orchestras in Monterey, Calif., was outlined to members of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club Tuesday.

William Jelski, a local travel agent and an oboe player in the symphony, discussed highlights of the visit which took place recently. Also attending as representatives of the local orchestra were Charles Steele, conductor, and Mrs. Martha Mulkey, concert mistress.

All three took part in the workshop and actively took part in the orchestra of some 75 pieces which was formed at the conference. A composers' workshop was held in conjunction with the other activities.

Jelski was impressed with the visit to Monterey Peninsula, particularly with such things as the missions, the Spanish structures, the concentration of palatial homes and the Pebble Beach Golf Course.

Crook Grand Jury Gets Bribery Case

PRINEVILLE — A Crook County grand jury will be called because Sheriff Jesse Woodruff said he has been accused of taking a bribe and asked that a grand jury investigate so he can clear his name.

At the perjury trial of Portland Mayor Terry Schruck last month, Sheriff Woodruff testified that Clifford O. Bennett had told him that he had given "a sheriff" at Prineville a \$1,500 bribe to permit the operation of a house of prostitution.

Clark did not give any names in his testimony.

Bennett, a Portland gambler, is under indictment in Prineville on a charge of permitting a house of prostitution to operate on land he was leasing.

Dist. Atty. James Minturn said Tuesday he will call the grand jury because "I feel the sheriff is entitled to have his name cleared if there is nothing to the accusation."

Woodruff has denied any wrongdoing.

Electrical Power Use Down Over Holidays

NEW YORK — Americans reduced their consumption of electrical power in the holiday-shortened week end July 6, the Edison Electric Institute reported Wednesday.

Output of electric energy throughout the nation totaled 11,058,000,000 kilowatt hours, down 8.7 per cent from the 12,111,000,000 kilowatt hours consumed the week before. The total, however, was 6.4 per cent greater than the 10,391,000,000 kilowatts distributed in the like week last year.

All major geographic areas reported greater consumption of electrical power than in the comparable 1956 week. The Pacific Northwest was up 8.7 per cent.

Linn Firm Gets Smith River Job

Morse Bros. of Harrisburg was low bidder for bituminous surfacing of 11,422 miles of the Smith River Road in Douglas County Tuesday. Bids were opened by the Bureau of Public Roads.

In a second bid opening, Umpqua River Navigation Co. of Reedsport appeared to be low bidder for one section of a stockpiling project and F. H. McEwen of Eugene for a second section of the job.

Bids were handled for the Bureau of Land Management and have been referred to the agency for award.

The bid by Morse Bros. was \$28,151 for the surfacing job involving work on a section of the road about 18 miles northeast of Reedsport. The road has been graded under previous contracts. Other bidders were: Central Heating Co. of Eugene, \$32,457; Berry Creek Construction Co. of Florence, \$35,405; and Babler Bros. Inc. of Portland, \$34,473.

The stockpiling project calls for 14,435 cubic yards of crushed rock for spur roads to the Esmond Creek Road and the West Fork of Smith River Road in Lane and Douglas Counties. The work is located approximately 25 miles northeast of Reedsport.

Umpqua River Navigation bid \$40,660 for the largest portion of the stockpiled rock. McEwen bid \$41,088 on the same schedule and \$21,620 on the second schedule. The contract may be awarded as a whole to one bidder or separately by schedule.

Funeral services for Mary Mela-Dee Millsap, 10, who was drowned Tuesday morning in the South Umpqua River north of Myrtle Creek, are scheduled Friday at 11:30 a. m. in the Tri-City Conservative Baptist Church.

The Rev. J. Elbert Nash and the Rev. Johnson Fenderson will officiate. Following services, the body will be taken to Portland for vault entombment at the Portland Memorial Gardens.

The young girl was born at Tillamook, March 2, 1947, and moved to Myrtle Creek with her parents seven years ago from Winchester. She attended the Tri-City church and was a member of the Bluebirds, a Camp Fire Girls subsidiary.

Survivors beside her parents and sister are another sister, Neva, Myrtle Creek, and paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary Millsap of Kliekikat, Wash.

The parents have requested that donations be made to a swimming pool fund for the city of Myrtle Creek, in lieu of flowers.

Lightning Flash Starts Hunt For 'Plane Crash'

BARSTOW, Calif. — A lightning flash high on desolate Clark Mountain set off a chain reaction of erroneous reports that a plane had crashed and some survivors were alive.

The report was received Tuesday afternoon. It wasn't until Wednesday morning that word was sent out by a ground rescue party that it was all an error.

"There was no airplane crash," radioed Officer A. M. Smith of the California Highway Patrol to his headquarters here. "It was only a timber fire."

The search was intensified Tuesday night because of a report that rescue workers had used flashlights to send this message to men below: "There are survivors. Help badly needed."

Apparently signals from this party were misunderstood by officers at the base of the mountain and the rescue effort was started.

The state police report said the car, driven by young Kelly, left the highway at a sharp turn and struck a telephone pole. Its top was peeled back and its right door ripped off.

Myrtle Creek Man Finds Wife Dead

An autopsy is being performed today to determine the cause of death of Mrs. Oliver Earl Bryant, who was found dead early in an apartment at the rear of her ceramics shop in Myrtle Creek, according to Coroner L. L. Powers.

Powers reported that the 43-year-old woman was found on the floor of the apartment at about 4:40 a. m. today. He said she had apparently been dead for "a few hours."

Deputy Coroner Robert Ganz of Myrtle Creek said the woman had been last seen alive at the shop (Rita's Ceramic Shop) at about 8:30 Tuesday night. Her husband said she had been sleeping when he left the shop. He returned to find her today.

Mrs. Bryant was born Oct. 23, 1912, in Montana. She moved to Myrtle Creek in 1943 from Montecano, Wash. She was a member of the Mormon Church in Seattle.

She was married July 28, 1946, at Roseburg, and for the last five years had operated the ceramics shop.

She is survived by her husband and three sons, James Clayton, William Earl and Robbin Dee, all of Myrtle Creek; three sisters, Mrs. George McMann of Hayward, Calif., Mrs. Fred Price of Seattle and Mrs. Virgil Faulkner of Seattle; and a brother, Wayne Bell of Seattle.

Funeral services are scheduled at 2 p. m. Saturday in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary. Interment will follow at the Myrtle Creek IOOF Cemetery.

Fall From Horse Kills Ex-Resident

Edward James Emerson, who had been a carpenter in Roseburg for 15 years, died Monday at a Bend hospital after being thrown from a horse.

The accident occurred Monday at the Calvin Shoemaker ranch in Prineville, where Emerson had been employed for three weeks. He was able to walk at the hospital and died suddenly while waiting to see a doctor. Cause of death was not immediately determined.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Annie E. Emerson, and a sister of Riverside, Calif.; and a brother, and three sons believed to be in California. Emerson is divorced.

His body was removed to the Niswonger and Winslow Funeral Home in Bend pending funeral arrangements.

Myrtle Creek Eyes Water Rate Raise

It was revealed at the Myrtle Creek City Council meeting Tuesday night that an increase in water rates faced water users of the city if expenditures by the water department are not cut during the current fiscal year.

It was reported that under the current operation, the department will face a deficit of \$6,565 at the end of the fiscal year. Three people at the meeting in the City Hall protested a higher consumer rate.

Councilmen said the added funds are needed to provide adequate maintenance for water mains. They said the cost could be covered either by raising the minimum water rates (\$2.50 a month) or increasing the rates above the minimum usage of 7,500 gallons a month. The present rate is 10 cents for each additional 750 gallons over 7,500. The suggested increase is 15 cents for each 750 gallons.

The matter was referred back to committee.

In other action, the council heard the first reading of an ordinance to grant a franchise to Myrtle Creek Television Cable Co.

Jewish Foster Parents Given Okay By Judge

MIAMI, Fla. — Circuit Judge John W. Prunty ruled Wednesday that Hilda McCoy, six-year-old daughter of a Roman Catholic woman, may be adopted by a Jewish couple who raised her.

The judge ruled that Hilda is "suitable for adoption" and that Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Ellis, who have had custody of the child since she was 10 days old, are "fit and proper persons to adopt her."

Attorneys for the state of Massachusetts and for Mrs. Marjorie McCoy Doherty, Hilda's natural mother, are expected to appeal the decision to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Employment Picture Stays Same In Douglas County

The present labor supply in most occupations greatly exceeds the demand in the Roseburg area, according to the Roseburg office of the Oregon State Employment Service.

By the end of June, 849 persons had applications on file for work. Of that number, 333 were female. The economic picture for the Roseburg area, in terms of estimated statistics, remains virtually unchanged as compared to May.

Slight employment gains were noted in the construction field. Lumber, logging and plywood firms continue to operate with only slight curtailments in personnel. Two firms, a handle factory and two small mills discontinued operations during June.

During June, 129 non-agricultural job placements were made which is 42 less than the previous month and 129 less than the same period last year. New applications for employment with the local Oregon State Employment Service totaled 189, of which 113 were female. Total unemployment for the area is estimated to be 800 which is only 20 less than May.

In the construction field, Douglas County, excluding Roseburg, issued building permits for a total valuation of \$369,855. This figure includes ten new dwellings for \$91,816, two additions to dwellings totaling \$800, seven garages, \$3,544, one new church, \$10,000, one commercial building, \$13,595, and one industrial building for the U. S. plywood Corp., \$250,000. Total permits valued at \$44,874.

The city of Roseburg issued 18 permits valued at \$37,200. May's permits were valued at \$37,922, and a year ago \$139,048.

Schruck Vice Count Dismissed By Judge

PORTLAND — One of the charges against Mayor Schruck—that of accepting a bribe from a gambler—was dismissed Tuesday. State Circuit Judge James Crawford threw out the indictment at the request of Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, who is in charge of prosecuting the cases resulting from the vice probe.

The action was not unexpected, since Thornton said after Schruck was acquitted on a perjury charge last month that the bribe charge would be dropped.

The mayor had been accused of accepting a bribe from gambler Clifford O. Bennett and then of lying about it when he appeared before the grand jury.

Charges against Bennett of bribing Schruck and of lying about it also were dismissed at the request of Thornton, since they were part of the same allegation which a jury had found untrue.

Still pending against Schruck are indictments charging him with illegally obtaining recordings of wiretaps, of conspiracy to obtain the recordings, and of subornation of perjury.

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
