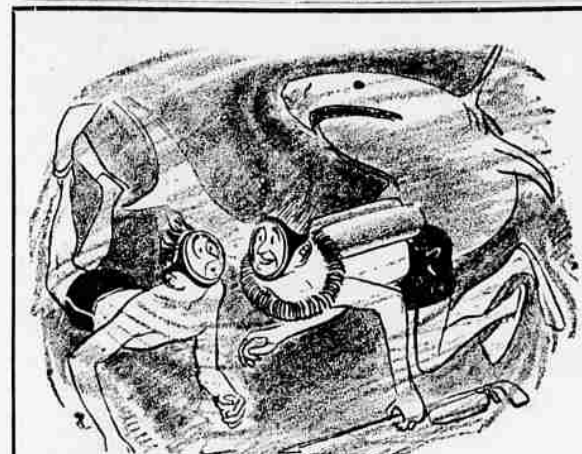

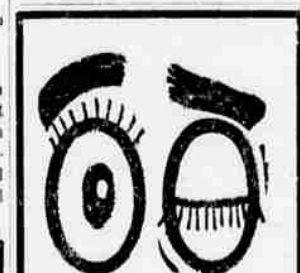

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Musicians Attend Workshop Session

Three Roseburg residents have returned after attending a workshop for conductors, musicians and composers at Asilomar, Pacific Grove, Calif.

They are Charles Steele, conductor of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra, William Jelski who plays the oboe in the orchestra, and Martha Mulkey, a violinist.

Funds for the trip were furnished by the Rockefeller Foundation. This was the second time in the seven-year history of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra Society that the organization has been represented at the conference. Two years ago, the organization's conductor attended the event.

Purpose of the program is to improve musical standards. Among 13 conductors at the workshop were Dr. Richard Lert, conductor of the Pasadena Symphony and Chorus,

and Dr. Ermo Daniel, conductor of the Wichita Falls Symphony. Persons at the conference worked on new compositions with the composers.

BURMA ACCEPTS

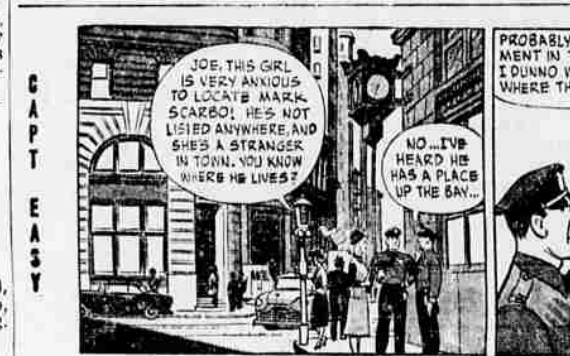
