

# Khrushchev Calls Eisenhower 'Stupid' For Talking About 'Clean' H-Bomb

PRAGUE — Nikita Khrushchev Thursday labeled President Eisenhower's talk about a clean H-bomb "a stupid thing."

"President Eisenhower is a talented man of great principles," said Khrushchev. "But look at what a stupid thing he says when he says there is a clean hydrogen bomb. How can you have a clean bomb to do dirty things? It means the destruction of children and women. What a contradiction. They call dirty things clean."

To Meet Tito

At the same time, speaking to workers at the Stalingrad metalurgical plant here, he gave broad approval for the development of communism according to "national peculiarities" and indicated he would hold an early meeting with

President Tito in an effort to heal finally the Kremlin's rift with Yugoslavia.

President Eisenhower told a news conference on June 26 scientists had told him that, given four or five years more of experimentation, they can turn out a hydrogen bomb "absolutely clean" of radioactive fallout—meaning one that can be used to knock out a military target without endangering innocent bystanders far away.

The Soviet Communist boss's comments on Eisenhower came at the end of an hour-long talk on communism to cheering workers. With Premier Bulganin he was being taken on a rain-spattered tour of the factory and a farm. Ad libbing in his favorite fashion after completing his formal

address, Khrushchev made no further reference to Eisenhower.

Endorses Tito Gospel

Khrushchev defended the right of individual Communist nations to develop their "socialist" (Communist) culture, parties and governments on the basis of their own peculiarities. It was a strong endorsement of some of the Communist gospel President Tito has long been preaching.

There were rumors in Moscow a week ago that Khrushchev would fly to Belgrade for a meeting with Tito after the Prague visit. The statement Thursday indicates at least that he plans an early meeting with Tito.

Khrushchev referred to China as "a big original country that doesn't copy anything."

"It follows the Marxist path in its own Chinese way," Khrushchev continued. "But that is no cause for quarrel if China builds socialism on the basis of its own national peculiarities."

# White House To Continue Efforts Against Destruction

WASHINGTON — The White House, hitting back at Nikita Khrushchev, said Thursday the United States intends to continue its efforts to avoid "mass human destruction" by atomic weapons.

The statement, issued with "the full knowledge" of President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles, was put out after Khrushchev had labeled Eisenhower's talk about a "clean" hydrogen bomb a "stupid thing."

Declines At First

The White House at first declined comment on the remark by Khrushchev, Russian Communist Party boss, in a speech Thursday at Prague, Czechoslovakia.

But Press Secretary James C. Hagerty later called newsmen to his office and dictated this statement:

"It is rather amazing that Mr. Khrushchev would think efforts by American scientists to eliminate dangerous fallout from atomic explosions is a stupid thing."

"The avoidance of mass human destruction in an atomic war is and has been a prime objective of President Eisenhower and his administration, no less than the aim of eliminating the possibility of war itself."

"Such efforts to which the United States is dedicated are and will be continued."

Ike, Dulles Informed

Eisenhower and Dulles were informed of Khrushchev's remarks after a White House meeting of the National Security Council.

In referring to a "clean" bomb, Eisenhower has meant a weapon that would not spread radioactive fallout.

At a recent news conference Eisenhower said scientists had advised him that "given four or five years" they could produce an "absolutely clean" hydrogen bomb. He said they also reported that hydrogen weapons being produced at present are 96 per cent free of radioactive fallout.

# Mistrial Called In Bribery Case

WASHINGTON — U. S. District Judge Burnita S. Matthews Thursday ordered the bribery trial of union boss James R. Hoffa to proceed but granted a mistrial to Hoffa's co-defendant, Miami attorney Hyman I. Fishbach.

The mistrial for Fishbach was granted because of a heart ailment suffered by Fishbach's counsel, Daniel P. Maher.

The government asked for the mistrial order. Both Hoffa and Fishbach objected.

This is the fourth week of the Hoffa-Fishbach trial on charges they bribed a Senate racket committee investigator, John Cye Cheasty, to feed Hoffa data from committee files.

Maher's illness brought the case to an abrupt halt Wednesday.

Edward P. Troxell, assistant U. S. attorney, told the court the government was "prepared to proceed to try Hoffa alone and try Fishbach later."

# 2 Negro Men Claim Beating

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Two young Negro men who reportedly were kidnaped by a group of armed white men returned home early Thursday. One said they were taken into the woods and beaten with rubber hoses.

# Beating Charged

Harold Cunningham, 19, said he and Henry Silent, 21, were driven to a wooded area and beaten after being questioned about where they were "two Saturdays ago."

"I don't know what they were talking about," Cunningham said. "Henry and I were working together for a paper company two Saturdays ago."

Cunningham said he didn't know where the men took him because they forced him to get down on the floor of a car.

The white men also threatened first to hang and then shoot them, according to Cunningham. He and Silent escaped when all except one of the men went back to the cars.

# Have Long Walk

Cunningham estimated that he and Silent walked about 12 miles to a bus stop and then rode into town.

Two girls who dated the men Wednesday night said they were stopped by the white men after the Negro couples had driven into a white drive-in ice cream stand, and then left because it was too crowded.

The two girls, Loretta Washington, 17, and Ailene Brown, 23, were questioned extensively by police Wednesday night. They reported the alleged kidnaping happened shortly after 9 p.m.

# State Drops Bribe Charge In Portland

PORTLAND — The state has dropped its bribe conspiracy charge against a Seattle man and plans to call him to testify in the case against Teamster Union official Clyde Crosby, an attorney said Thursday.

Charles Raymond, attorney for Joseph McLaughlin, made the announcement after a conference in the judge's chamber during a recess in Crosby's trial on a charge of conspiring to accept a bribe while he was a member of the Portland Exposition - Recreation Commission.

"We felt that McLaughlin should not be required to testify in Crosby's trial with the indictment over him," Raymond said.

Carroll said Beck is still under subpoena to appear before the grand jury, but it had not been decided whether Beck would be recalled.

# Mock Nuclear Air Attack Test Friday

WASHINGTON — "Enemy" bombers will dump imaginary nuclear destruction on scores of American cities Friday in a grim game of "let's pretend."

The mock catastrophe will signal the opening of Operation Alert 1957, the fourth nationwide civil defense training exercise.

The idea is to prepare citizens and government officials alike for conditions of nuclear war. It will include simulated relief, rescue and evacuation programs, federal government operation in the field, and all-out retaliation on the "enemy."

Sometime during the seven-day period, a fleet of 14 helicopters will whisk President Eisenhower and his staff to an emergency White House, location undisclosed. Eisenhower is expected to spend only one day or less inspecting his hideaway and its operation, then return to Washington.

The cities to be blasted with the mock hydrogen and atomic bombs will not be informed of their fate until just before the exercise. Rescue, relief and evacuation efforts will occupy the first three days.

# State Police Here Plan Participation In Alert

State police in Douglas County apparently will be the only agency to participate in the Civil Defense "Operation Alert" this week.

Sgt. Robert Keefe, supervisor at the Roseburg patrol office, said check points on Douglas highways will be set up in pamphlets distributed to motorists when the exercise is actively under way.

Because the acting Civil Defense director for Douglas County, Sheriff Ira C. Byrd, has been ill, no organized participation in the exercise has been planned in the county.

Byrd, laid low by a case of the flu, is just getting back into the routine of his office, although still on sick leave.

# Christian Meet Hears Speaker

PORTLAND — Those who try to free themselves by breaking with divine authority are laying the groundwork for man's enslavement, Dr. Melvin M. Forney, general secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, told delegates to the International Society of Christian Endeavor Wednesday night.

Freedom, he said, is this generation's watchword, but the big need is a formula for finding it.

There is a threat to freedom, he said, in the awareness of the danger of communism but failure to observe the danger of secularism. Ignorance of this threat aids it, he said.

The delegates Wednesday night reelected Dr. Earle W. Gates of Derby, N. Y., as president.

The associate president position went to an Oregonian, Timothy J. Krebs, a pre-ministerial student at Northwest Christian College, Eugene. It is a non-salaried position, held by one of the younger members annually. It will call him to Columbus, Ohio, for occasional meetings.

# Amendment For Narrowing Bill Now Being Written

WASHINGTON — Sponsors moved today toward narrowing the enforcement provisions of the Eisenhower administration's civil rights bill to the single field of protecting Negro and minority voting rights.

Sen. Francis Case (R-SD) disclosed he is drafting such an amendment. Senators Clifford Case (R-NJ) and Kuchel (R-Calif.) said in separate interviews they support the principle of converting the House-passed bill into strictly a voting-rights measure.

Leaders called the Senate into session early to resume debate on a motion of Sen. Knowland of California, GOP floor leader, to bring

the House measure before the Senate for action.

In opposing this motion, Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) and other Southerners have contended the House bill would permit the attorney general — backed by troops, if necessary — to move into the South to enforce school integration and racial desegregation in public places.

# Opposition Mounts

Russell told reporters that as a result of the Southerners' attack on the terms of what he calls a "vicious" measure, opposition to the bill as it now stands is mounting.

"I have been greatly encouraged by the developments of the last few days," he said. "I have come to the conclusion that the Senate will not pass the bill in its present form."

One of these developments was Russell's conference yesterday with President Eisenhower. The Georgia senator evidently brought away new hope that the administration itself will move toward a compromise.

# Sun Studs Shack Struck By Blaze

About \$500 damage was caused Wednesday night when sawdust near the saw shack at Sun Studs Inc., south of Roseburg on Highway 99BR, caught fire.

Roseburg rural firemen said part of the frame and flooring of the building and "one or two" motors were burned. The fire happened about 9 p.m.

The Douglas Forest Protective Assn. said a shed full of hay was destroyed by fire about 12 miles east of Roseburg on the North Umpqua Highway Wednesday.

Owner of the property isn't known by the agency, and amount of the loss couldn't be established.

# Spectacular Fire Frightens Town

CLAYTON, Wash. — A spectacular fire destroyed the biggest building in town Wednesday and for a time threatened to burn down the entire business district of this Stevens County community of 300 persons.

Fire trucks from as far away as Chewelah, 30 miles to the north, were called in to save other buildings from flames whipped by a brisk wind across Highway 395 that raged through town.

Three hours after the fire broke out in the E and E Mercantile Co. store it appeared the blaze was under control and the post-office and another frame building in its path saved.
