WSC Agronomy Farm Dedicated Wednesday

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — The new 200-acre Washington State College agronomy farm was dedicated Wednesday with a special salute to the state's wheat farmers who taxed themselves to help buy it.

The farmers voluntarily assessed themselves a quarter of a cent a bushel on their 1953 wheat crop and raised almost \$80,000 for the farm, located 2½ miles south of here.

Most of the cereal research work of the WSC extension department has been transferred to the new farm in the last 12 months.

Joseph D. Dwyer, state director of agriculture, will be a principal speaker at the dedication ceremonies. Vern Barbre of Ephrata, president of the Washington Assn. of Wheat Growers, will present the farm to WSC President C. Clement French.

The farm was acquired in 1955. State funds were also used in the development.

J. S. Carver, acting director of the extension service, took the occasion Tuesday to announce that commercial firms, foundations and state commissions supported agricultural research in the amount of \$74,250 during the first six months of 1957.

The money is being used in research work by WSC scientists at eight experiment stations in the extension system throughout the state.
