Portland ran its string of consecutive defeats to 12 Wednesday night, taking a 6-2 licking from San Diego in a Pacific Coast League baseball game watched by 1,803 fans at Portland.

The other fast-fading team, Los Angeles, lost its seventh straight, being shaded 5-4 by Seattle in 12 innings.

Dick Brodowski went the distance for San Diego in downing Portland and chalking up his seventh triumph against one defeat. The Padres won the game in the fourth inning by bunting four runs on five hits, including a two-run homer over the right field fence by Bob Lennon. The Beavers used four pitchers.

Dick Marlowe started for Portland and was doing well until Bob Lennon knocked the ball over the right field fence, the fourth time that has been done at Multnomah Stadium. One was on. After two more hits, Gene Fodge came in. He walked the bases full, then gave up a single to pitcher Dick Brodowski. That brought Ray Bauer to the mound. He lasted until Bill Shore took over in the eighth.

Hollywood's Ben Daniels has pitched himself to within one game of the 13-2 record of Leo Kiely, the Pacific Coast League's winningest hurler, and Ben did it at the expense of Kiely's San Francisco Seals.

The movie land southpaw spun a four-hitter Wednesday night to win his 12th contest 4-1 and snap the league-leading Seals eight-game winning streak. The San Francisco run 3½ games ahead of second-place Vancouver, whose

game with Sacramento was rained out.
Daniels walked four and struck out one in notching his dozen. The Seals' only marker came on a walk, a bloop single and an infield out combination that gave them a brief 1-0 lead. The Stars erased that in the following inning when Leo Rodriguez singled and Joe Duham sent him home with a long double, the only extra base hit of the game. The Twinks went ahead to stay on a hit batter and two singles.
To round out his performance, Daniels singled across the final tally, one of a pair in the ninth inning.

Seattle touched Angel relief hurler Jim Hughes for two 12th inning runs and the ball game after the Los Angeles fireman had held the Rainiers hitless from the time he came on in the eighth.

Steve Bilko's 24th homer featured a brief Angel lead but they couldn't stay on the winning track. Jim Baxes homered in the eighth to bring the Angels from behind, tie the count at 3-3 and force the contest into extra innings. Jim Dyck and Eddie Basinski belted home runs for the Rainiers.

Young Bob Purkey, Pittsburgh's chubby-faced right-hander, looks as though he may be following in the footsteps of teammate Bob Friend, the Pirate ace who gave the pennant contenders all sorts of troubles two years ago while leading the National League in earned run averages.

Friend, a bit battered these days, was the guy who almost owned Brooklyn's champs in '35. He was 14-9 that season for the last-place Bucs, with a 9-5 mark against the first division, while finishing with a 2.84 ERA.

At the moment, Purkey is 9-7 and leads the league with a 2.70 ERA, gaining his second victory over Milwaukee 5-2 last night. It was the only game scheduled in either league.

Six Hitter

Purkey stopped the Braves with a six-hitter, striking out seven and walking two. A single by Red Schoendienst came ahead of Ed Matthews' 18th home run in the first inning, but Purkey then kept the Braves in check while the Pirates battled back against Bob Buhl. Bob Skinner hit a two-run homer and Gene Baker bagged it with a three-run single.

Purkey, a Pittsburgh kid who spent most of last season in the minors after wrenching a knee in spring training, has picked up seven of his 107 victories against the NL's five-team first division. He's beaten Brooklyn three times, Cincinnati twice. Only St. Louis has given him trouble, beating him twice in two decisions.

PORTLAND, Ore. — John Swann of Vancouver, B.C., the third-seeded player, barely survived his match in the Oregon State tennis championships Wednesday.

Swann, figured to win easily from 15-year-old Ramsey Earnhart of Ventura, Calif., was pushed to the limit before winning 14-16, 6-4 and 6-2.

Other top seeds in the men's singles won easily.

Bill Rose of Portland, No. 1, brushed aside Tom Edlefson of Oakland, Calif., 6-3, 6-1; Gordon Davis of Santa Monica, No. 2, whipped Henry Doyle of Portland, 6-4, 6-2; and Ron Schoenberg of Los Angeles beat Mike Hynes of Seattle, 6-2, 6-0.

Moore-Anthony Fight Promoted

LOS ANGELES — Two rival fight clubs have joined forces to co-promote a 15-round light heavyweight title bout between champion Archie Moore and Tony Anthony on Sept. 11.

It will be the first time in 32 years that the Olympic Auditorium of Los Angeles and the Hollywood Legion Stadium have gone in together on such a promotion. The proposed site for the nationally televised fight is Gilmore Field in Hollywood.

The unique situation developed Wednesday when singer Frank Sinatra and his associates withdrew as the proposed promoters. Promoter Cal Eaton of the Olympic and matchmaker Jack Leonard of Hollywood Legion had raised objections to a Sinatra promotion.

With Sinatra bowing out, Eaton and Leonard agreed on the co-promotion. Leonard said Moore would get a \$90,000 guarantee or 40 per cent of the gate and Anthony 20 per cent.
