Minister's Driving License Suspended

PORTLAND (AP) — A minister Thursday had his driver's license suspended for 30 days. The Rev. Luther C. Baker also was fined \$25 for failure to yield right-of-way to a 10-year-old boy his car struck in a school crosswalk May 31.

He was told by Municipal Judge J. J. Quillan that "as a minister you may be competent but as a driver you are not." The judge said the 37-year-old minister's record shows two speeding arrests within three years and a previous arrest for failure to yield the right-of-way.
Stephen Jeske suffered serious injuries in the Portland accident and is still confined to a wheel chair.

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Unsatisfied Customer Seeks Punitive Damages

A unsatisfied customer who claims Pal Motors misrepresented a used car to him filed suit in circuit court this week for \$25,000 punitive damages.

The plaintiff, Melvin C. Wetherell of Roseburg, also asks \$1,000 compensatory damages for the value of the car he says he traded to Pal Motors. He claims that he bought a 1956 Oldsmobile last June after being told that it was a new car which had been used only as a demonstrator.

Wetherell's complaint states that he later found that the car had been sold and had been in an accident. He says that he returned the car and was refused payment or return of the 1950 Chevrolet he had traded for it.

Taft-Hartley Violation Charge Hearing Slated

PORTLAND (AP) — A hearing will be held in Portland next Tuesday on a National Labor Relations Board charge that a contract between the Associated General Contractors and the Teamsters Union violates the Taft-Hartley Act.

The complaint was filed by Thomas P. Graham, regional NLRB director, who said the contract gives the union power to determine eligibility of job applicants.

As parties to the contract, both the union and the association "are discriminating with respect to terms and conditions of employment to encourage membership in the labor organization," the complaint said.

He filed the complaint after a truck driver said he was denied work on the West Dam Project near Cougar, Wash., because he was not a member of local 501, although he was a member of another local.

Sheldon Sackett Tries For Five Million Suit

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Sheldon F. Sackett, West Coast newspaper publisher and radio executive who recently bought the equipment of the defunct Portsmouth Times, is attempting to sue the Merchants and Farmers Bank of Portsmouth for \$5,010,000.

Sackett's suit was in the form of a letter to Federal District Judge Walter E. Hoffman. He said he had dismissed his attorney and was filing a "citizen's complaint." Sackett claimed in his letter that the bank injured his standing "in the local and national community" by returning a \$59,000 check he had tendered as part payment for the equipment of the defunct newspaper.

Judge Hoffman ruled the suit was not worded properly, but permitted it to be filed pending an amended form. He gave Sackett 30 days in which to file an amended complaint.

Gov. Knight Has Signed More Than 2,000 Bills

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Gov. Knight is nearing the end of his bill-signing job with a new record already established.

His office reported yesterday only 478 bills remain to be acted on before the July 17 deadline to complete action on 1957 legislation.

Knight has signed 2,168 of the 2,669 bills sent to him during the recent legislative session, surpassing the record 1,966 he approved two years ago.

He has vetoed 23 bills.

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Bills For Prosecuting Portland Vice Approved

PORTLAND (AP) — Payment of \$1,000 in bills for prosecuting cases in Portland's vice investigation was approved Thursday by Multnomah County commissioners.

Commissioners left unpaid bills totaling \$226. They want more explanation of them from Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, they said.

Under a recent state Supreme Court decision, the state is required to pay salaries of the attorney general's staff, but the county is required to pay general expenses.

State Fair Zoo Exhibit Tentatively Approved

PORTLAND (AP) — A plan for exhibiting 35 animals from the Portland Zoo at the state fair next month was tentatively approved Thursday by the Portland City Council.

A circus tent and cages will be provided to house the animals. The Portland Zoological Society will be in charge of arrangements.

'False Swearing' Case Nears Jury

PORTLAND (AP) — The jury is expected to get the case Friday of Portland Police Sgt. Robert W. Sprague, charged with false swearing.

His principal accuser, patrolman Jack Olsen, was called back to the stand as a rebuttal witness Thursday and testified that he had been told that former Mayor Fred L. Peterson and former police chief Jim Purcell were "behind the vice set-up in the city of Portland."

Peterson and Purcell have denied such charges.

Sprague is accused of lying to a grand jury when he denied Olsen's accusation that Sprague had given bribe money to Olsen for protection of vice establishments in the Williams Avenue district. Earlier, Lt. Carl R. Crisp, testifying as a defense witness, said that he had headed the vice squad at the time Sprague is accused of making the payoffs. Crisp said that the administration of the police department was such that it would have been impossible for Sprague to give protection to vice establishments.



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
