

Morse Proposal On Civil Rights Backed By Democratic Leader

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic leader Johnson of Texas said Thursday the Senate "probably would" be "the saving time" by sending the House-passed civil rights bill to its Judiciary Committee with orders to take some action within two weeks.

Veteran Voter Finally Becomes U. S. Citizen

CHICAGO (AP) — William C. Marchant, 85, who cast his first ballot in a presidential election for William Jennings Bryant in 1896, became a United States citizen yesterday.

Marchant, it was disclosed, voted in many other elections until 1940, when he learned he was not a citizen. He had believed that service in the Illinois National Guard from 1890 to 1893 made him a citizen.

His parents had brought him to Chicago from London as a child in 1879 but his father neglected to have the family naturalized.

National Guard Military Academies Ready To Accept Cadets From Oregon, Washington

CAMP MURRAY, Wash. (AP) — Washington and Oregon have established their own military academies for training National Guard officers.

The first group of cadets—43 from each state—recently completed the first two weeks of intensive training at this National Guard camp adjacent to Ft. Lewis.

Morse conceded the Senate put the House bill on its calendar because the Judiciary Committee, after months of sessions, had not acted on any bill. He said this could be remedied by a time limit of 10 days or two weeks for action.

Sen. Javits (R-NY), disagreeing with Morse, said the problem of proponents of civil rights legislation "is to get it to a vote." If the bill is referred to the Judiciary Committee, he said "we will have to go through all over again just what we are going through now."

Johnson said the Senate action on June 20 had the effect of "throwing into the ashcan" all of the hearings, testimony and suggestions of its own Judiciary Committee on the subject.

Johnson also told the Senate that talk of a possible compromise on the controversy is "both premature and inaccurate."

Sen. Clifford Case (R-NJ) and Richard B. Russell (D-GA) said in separate interviews they support that idea in principle.

Qualifications Made
To qualify, a man must be an American citizen between 20 and 27 years of age, a high school graduate, an active member of the National Guard, physically fit, morally straight and capable of winning approval of a screening board of officers.

A rigid training schedule was maintained during the initial two weeks of the joint Washington-Oregon officer-candidate course here.

The cadets took turns acting as their own company commander, executive officer, platoon leader, first sergeant, etc. There was no rank among students at the school. All were cadets.

Breakfast was at 6:30 a.m., and by 7:30 a.m. the cadets were in class. The classes lasted until 5 p.m. daily and until 9 p.m. two nights a week.

Army Teaches Cadets
The cadets were taught by regular officers from the 41st Division. Instruction covered a variety of military subjects, including organization of the armed forces, drill and command, map reading, combat formations, tactics at squad and platoon levels, leadership, patrolling, camouflage and concealment.

Evening free time after dinner usually was devoted to studying for the next day's classes. There were little actual field exercises. Operating on the honor system,

academy rules call for dismissal of any cadet who lies, cheats or steals.

Demerits Meted Out
The cadets were given demerits for being late to class, sleeping or being inattentive in class, being unprepared for assignments, wearing brass and leather that was not shined, appearing in a soiled or wrinkled uniform, needing a shave or haircut, moving while at attention in ranks, talking in ranks or class room, smoking during unauthorized period, failing to salute an officer, and so on.

If any had been absent without leave or used liquor intemperately, he would have been dismissed.

Some of the cadets said the initial phase should be longer—from four to six weeks instead of two. They said too much was crammed into two weeks.

The Oregon Military Academy is headed by Col. Edward C. Snow, commandant, and Lt. Col. Fred C. Rice, assistant commandant.

Marshall For Oregon Recommended Again

PORTLAND (AP) — Harold Sexton is being recommended for another term as U. S. marshal for Oregon, Robert T. Mautz, Republican national committeeman, said Thursday.

Sexton, first appointed early in the Eisenhower administration, has the endorsement of Mrs. Col. Moore, national committeewoman, James F. Short, state Republican chairman, and Rep. Walter Norblad, Mautz said.

He made the announcement after Sheriff Paul Kearney of Clatsop County withdrew his candidacy for the position. Kearney said he was withdrawing in the interest of party harmony.

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Ballot Titles Being Referred To People Are Outlined By Attorney General's Office

SALEM (AP) — The attorney general released ballot titles this week for measures which the last Legislature referred to the people to vote on in November, 1958.

Repealing death penalty — "To eliminate the death penalty for first degree murder."
Salaries of state legislators — "To amend Oregon Constitution by increasing salaries of state legislators from \$600 to \$1200 a year."

Hospital Discontinuance
Authorizes discontinuing certain state tuberculosis hospitals — "To permit the Board of Control to discontinue using the Eastern Oregon and University state tuberculosis hospitals, in whole or in part. The board could designate the use for any other state institution or agency."

County home rule amendment — "Authorizes the voters in any county to adopt a charter to provide for the exercise of authority over matters of county concern. Initiative and referendum powers are reserved to the legal voters of counties adopting a charter."

Authorizing different use of state institutions — "Authorizes the Legislature to alter, reduce, enlarge or terminate the use or purpose of any state institution located outside Marion County any time after ten years from the date of the election which located the institution."

Petition Stage Not Reached By Tax Program Opposition

SALEM (AP) — Opposition by several groups to the state's tax program continues to be reported but none of the groups said to be ready to ask for initiative petitions have done so.

However, a Klamath Falls group said Thursday it was organized to provide the state with a "broad base tax program." The group calls itself a nonpartisan tax league.

Planned Soon
Mrs. Oscar Kittredge, Klamath Falls, spokesman, said an initiative petition is planned as soon as things can be worked out. She said the tax plan would "embody property tax relief and income tax relief." She would not commit herself to the sales tax, but it is a possibility.

Mrs. Kittredge said, "A non-partisan tax league is being organized in Klamath County with the idea of developing a broad base tax program for the state which will embody property tax relief and income tax relief."

She added, "However, consideration is being given to suggestions from labor, agriculture, business, education and the general public before the program can be outlined completely. No tax program will be written until much more study has been given all phases. An initiative petition is planned for that time."

Rumors Heard
Rumors have been heard repeatedly that several groups are talking of attempting to refer part

of the tax program passed by the last Legislature to the people in 1958.

Mrs. Kittredge says she knows nothing about a group organized to fight the higher income taxes and that there have been no commitments on any phase of the proposed nonpartisan league tax program yet.

The group expects to get fully organized and plans worked out later this month.

Veteran Vector Hunter Retires From Trapping
BEND (AP) — Sam Shaver, who killed more than 5,000 coyotes and bobcats, is retiring after 20 years as a federal, state and county trapper here.

Eastern Oregon's coyote population has been cut sharply in the past two decades, Shaver said, because of trapping and large migrations into the western part of the state.

State Tax Commission Names Research Leader
SALEM (AP) — Paul W. O'Day, Salem, was named research director for the Oregon State Tax Commission Tuesday.

O'Day fills the vacancy left by Thure Lindstrom, Jr., who became director of the income division in the recent Tax Commission reorganization.



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
