The Portland Beavers broke a 13-game losing streak — one of the league's longest in recent times — and edged their San Diego host, 6-5. At Los Angeles, it was an 11th inning home run by Joe Taylor that gave the Seattle Rainiers a 6-5 victory. The homer was one of four in the game for Seattle.

NEW YORK (AP) — A couple of winter baseball buddies are chums again after they had tried to take each other's head off at the Polo Grounds.

The brawling craze baseball is undergoing infected Sad Sams and Jones of the National League leading St. Louis Cardinals and Ruben Gomez of the New York Giants Friday night. They exchanged beanballs three times during a game won by the Cardinals, 5-1. Jones allowed only two hits for his best performance of the season.

Gomez shaved Jones high and inside in the third inning. Jones grazed Ruben's chin with his first pitch before striking him out in the bottom half of the same inning.

The pitchers glared at each other until the fifth when Gomez hurled the ball over Jones' head. Plate umpire Tom Gorman ordered managers Fred Hutchinson of the Cardinals and Bill Rigney of the Giants to a home plate conference and cautioned both pitchers against further wildness.

Rigney trotted to the mound, put his hands on Gomez's shoulders. After the brief heart-to-heart talk, the game continued without further high pitching.

"When he (Gomez) throws me a little high, I throw him a little high," Jones said softly after the game. "We played winter ball together. I don't hold any grudges against him."
"I got a little angry when he high pitched me," explained Gomez, 30. "We're good friends."

Vertebra Fracture Found On Hartack

CHICAGO (AP) — A fracture in the "wing" of a vertebra was disclosed Thursday in new X-rays of jockey Bill Hartack's spine, but doctors said the injury was considerably less serious than at first believed.

The nation's leading rider was thrown in a spectacular fall Thursday at Arlington Park.
Dr. Paul Tobin, one of the leading physicians at St. Joseph's Hospital in nearby Elgin, said:
"After studying new spot pictures of the vertebra, it is my opinion that the injury is not real serious. One of the wings of the vertebra in the small of the back is fractured. He will need no cast."
"I would say that he may be ready to work again in a week or 10 days."

Ticker Tape Parade Overcomes Althea

NEW YORK (AP) — Althea Gibson, the Harlem girl who became a tennis queen, almost was overcome with emotion Thursday as she received New York's traditional ticker-tape parade up Broadway and a City Hall welcome.

"It's amazing, it's wonderful," repeatedly said the 29-year-old garage man's daughter who was the first Negro to win Wimbledon's famed tennis championship.
Althea smiled and waved to the thousands of persons who lined the parade route during the noon hour. Crowds cheered and applauded as ticker tape and torn bits of paper floated down from the tall buildings.

But the ball took an unusually hard bounce directly back to Baisch, who snatched the ball, ran up and tagged Regalado.

Fodge had to make only one more pitch to strike out Ed Kazak and end the game.
Reliever Gene Hayden pitched seven hitless innings for Seattle. Despite three home runs, the Rainiers needed Taylor's 11th inning smash to whip Los Angeles, Bill Glynn, Hal Best and Ray Ortiz hit the first three circuit clouts. The game was a tense, see-saw struggle all the way.

Called On Account Of . . . Power Cutoff Shortens Lively Roseburg-Bend Go

A hard line drive by Byron Baker in the last of the fourth inning that hit a power wire knocked off all the power on one side of the field, cut short a seven-inning game between the Roseburg and Bend legion teams Friday night on Friday Field.

At the time of the power shortage, Bend had a 3-1 lead, but Roseburg had runners on first and second with only one out.

Bend had opened the game with two runs in their half of the first inning, when after two were out, Gary Jonas drew a base on balls followed by a double by Sid Bauer that gave them the first run. A recommendation that October 12 be the opening of the 1957 deer season for Oregon, was made this week by Stuart Muir of the Oregon Game Commission in behalf of the Western Forestry and Conservation Assn.
Muir states in a press release that since the latter part of September is hazardous from a forest fire viewpoint, an opening date earlier than the 12th is inadvisable.
He also states that if a fire hazard should exist on the date scheduled for opening, the governor may exercise his authority to postpone the opening until the hazard is erased.

HONOLULU (AP) — Records fell Friday in the second session of the annual Keo Nakama swim meet here.
Australia's Lorraine Crapp broke her own world 800-meter freestyle record as she churned to a 10:24.3 clocking.
Second was Sylvia Hutaska, 16, Berkeley, Calif., whose 10:35.8 was a new American record for the distance.

This was after Nancy Ramey of Seattle, bettered the world and American records in the 100-meter butterfly by four-tenths of a second, narrowly beating Shelley Mann of Washington, D. C., Olympic champion for this distance. Miss Ramey's time was 1:10.1.

World Mark Set
